HAMMONS FUNERAL HELD MONDAY

Funeral services for Guy Hammons, 50, of Flomot, were held at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon in the Wallace Funeral Chapel at Tulia with the Rev. Denzil Leonard, pastor of the Hart Baptist Church officiating.

Mr. Hammons died early last Sunday, April 17 in Swisher Memorial Hospital following an illness of about a month. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery in Tulia.

Mr. Hammons was born February 11, 1916 at Cedar Hill. He was married to Thelma Allen at Childress on March 6, 1949. He had lived at Flomot since 1949. He was a farmer.

WORK PLAN AND PROGRAM COMPLETED FOR CAPROCK SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

The Cap Rock Soil and Water Conservation District recently completed a new District Work Plan and Program and signed a revised memorandum of Understanding with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman signed the document for the U.S.D.A. Donald Williams, Administrator of the Soil Conservation Service, was also present.

The work plan and program of the Cap Rock Soil and Water Conservation District is an analysis of conservation problems in the district and a plan of action for present and future conservation work in the district. This work plan and program was prepared by the Cap Rock Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Supervisors with assistance from local agricultural leaders and the Soil Conservation Service.

The U.S.D.A. will cooperate with and assist the District in carrying out this work plan and program. Assistance consistent with the Department's statutory authority and available resources will be provided through its various agencies.

ANDY ROGERS WRITES TO VOTERS ABOUT CAMPAIGN ISSUES

Due to the Federal Courts ultimatum your Texas Legislature was forced to re-district. The old 30th District I have represented for nearly 14 years has been greatly enlarged—300 miles across.

This job of State Senator belongs to YOU, the people, not to me or any other candidate. The whole object of filling this post is that YOU elect the person best able to serve you—not necessarily the most popular, best known and certainly not just the one who can spend the most money in a campaign.

I wish very much to see and visit personally with everyone, and will do so, as much as is humanly possible.

However, the huge size of our district, very limited money resources and the work and responsibility my Seniority places on me limits this personal contact by me, quite severely.

Therefore, I sincerely request you to examine my record, satisfy yourself and help me spread the word to others.

I am a farmer, stockman and small businessman, 41 years of age, have been active in church, lodge, civic work and farm and veterans organizations. My wife, myself, two daughters and one son are native West Texans, of the area including our Senate district. I served three years in the United States Army during World War II and have seven years of college—Texas A&M and the University of Texas.

It is dangerous in our State Legislature not to be a "go along to get along" person. It is dangerous to speak loudly and firmly against some big officeholders when you do not agree with them 100 percent of the time or oppose some of their programs you believe harmful to your District or State. It is dangerous to seek to really stop pollution of our surface and ground waters. It is, perhaps, even more dangerous to raise your voice against corruption in high places when it arises or oppose the great out-of-state owned corporations who have so much power in Austin—those who seek to evade their fair share of taxes and seek to shift an ever greater burden to the worker, farmer and Texas-owned businesses.

Andy Rogers has done all of these and therefore is on their list for extermination.

When I first ran for the State Senate in 1952—there was then a great hue and cry to clean up the "mess in Washington". I was an oddity among candidates

THEN, as I charged that "Austin is as rotten as Washington" and that "moral integrity is needed most."

I further demanded a law to require state officials and legislators to file for public record, a statement showing their income and its source.

This wasn't, and still isn't the way to be very popular in Austin and certain other circles.

In 1954, I, and a few others, urged investigations into several matters, including the Insurance Commission, certain land transactions and certain state contracts. For our efforts we were slandered.

A few months laater the lid blew off.

I have authored and passed legislation against obscene, dirty literature, pep pills and narcotics.

Yes, I have made many good friends among those who work for the interests of our District. I have also made many good enemies of those selfish minority blocs whose interests conflict with those of our District.

In two of my more recent races they have used every trick: deceit, slanderous anonymous mail and threats to me and my closest friends.

During this race they have, so far, at least, been more subtle. But their money and power behind my opponents become more obvious each day.

This is not to say that my two opponents would employ or use these tactics—they both seem like nice guys—but they don't have to use them—some others will gladly and freely do this for them if they think it will work.

These methods of deceit, etc., have been perfected to an art. And, as it has been said, "the perfection of art is to conceal art". But look closely—it is obvious they are at work—not necessarily because all of them love my opponents, but because the seek to destroy old and proven enemy, Andy Rogers.

Meanwhile, my opponents readily seek and accept campaign money from various ones of these these enemies of the people.

I and my family and some friends have suffered economically, socially and politically at the hands of some powerful lobbyists and others. But, I have not run for them in the past—I will not do so now, or in the future.

Issues
 1. So the first real issue in this race for the 30th Senate District post is, can those who deceive the people and try to manipulate the people and try to manipulate the Legislature and other state officials to their advantage, finally succeed with their tactics and limitless money.

2. In Wichita Falls, the main population center of our district, a group there, several of their number extremely wealthy, pretty well control their city and county. Now they intend to control your Senate representation in Austin. Recently, a banker and very rich oil man among their number called a "SECRET" meeting in Wichita Falls to rant and

rave about how horrible Andy Rogers was and to raise money for one of his opponents. He didn't bother with the facts. MORE IMPORTANT, he didn't tell why he was really against me.

The truth is that in 1959 your then Senator George Moffett and other leaders in Wichita Falls asked me to sponsor a law creating a pollution authority to control oil field pollution as Wichita Falls HAD to seek a new water supply and the proposed new lake would be worthless until a firm pollution control was initiated.

I passed this bill for Wichita Falls and neighboring towns and it has brought wonderful results.

But the banker and oil man who called the "SECRET" meeting did not explain how he had been and still is considered one of the worst violators of pollution control.

Most of our oilmen, including the major companies have cooperated wonderfully with the pollution authority—but not this gentleman.

He regularly contacts our legislator and other state officials to try to destroy the pollution authority. He is regularly known to be one of the major political contributors to candidates on every political level.

Shall we let him destroy Andy Rogers, who passed the bill to protect our water for all our citizens?

3. The "Iron Curtain Press." In my eighteen consecutive years in politics I have never encountered any news media as slanted and biased as the Wichita Fall newspaper.

They have persisted in making "news" for their favorite son and denied every opportunity possible to let their readers know there are even other candidates running.

They have so arrogantly and flagrantly denied the public of its "RIGHT TO KNOW."

Shall the voters reward this un-American-like institution?

4. Seniority. If a candidate has a voting record to please most of the voters, the next most im-

portant thing in his ability to represent them, is his Seniority. Andy Rogers now ranks 6th in Seniority in our Texas Senate by virtue of 4 years in our House of Representatives and nearly 14 years in our State Senate.

Nothing else can take the place of experience and Seniority—it can't be purchased at the Supermarket or acquired by taking a pill.

This job belongs to the people, not me or any other candidate.

The people of our area have an 18 year investment in the experience and seniority of Andy Rogers. To elect either of his opponents would mean at least a 12 year wait to again have another Senator with this important asset.

Should the voters throw away this most valuable asset they already own?

There are many other subjects I would like to discuss, but I will close by saying it has been a privilege to co-author and work for the bill that made Midwestern a four year state-supported school, to co-author and work for the bill that changed the name of West Texas State to a University and to have a vital role in the efforts to place Texas Tech where it stands today.

Yes, check my record — ASK THOSE WHO KNOW.

Andy Rogers' long record of service for the people of our area is clear. You can know where he stands—while many have been known to falter and wilt in the terrible heat and pressure of Austin politics.
