Generally speaking, the rules will be as follows: Fish to be counted will be catfish, crappie and bass; your catch must be registered at the local grocery stores or at The Tribune. Any time you have fish that you want photographed, come by The Tribune office and we will make a snapshot for you.

The Tribune would like to have fishing news and pictures, not only of our own area lakes, but any time you go fishing, and especially when a notable-size or number of fish are caught, let us know about it.

More details of the area contest will be forthcoming. Watch for the announcement.

## Counties To Vote On Sale or Lease Of Cotton Allotments

Growers in about two-thirds of the upland cotton producing counties will vote during the period of May 16 through May 25 on whether to permit transfer of cotton acreage allotments to other counties by sale or lease. If any in county at least two thirds of growers voting favor transfer, growers will be permitted to transfer allotments by sale or lease to farmers in other counties within same state. Allotments may not be shifted to other states.

Where approved by at least two-thirds of growers voting in county, transfer of allotments to other counties for period 1967, 1968 and 1969 will be permitted. Transfer of allotments authorized in Food and Agriculture Act of 1965.

First vote on transfer of allotments was held on November 23, 1965. At that time growers in 349 upland cotton producing counties voted to permit transfers. There are a total of 1,059 cotton growing counties in the U. S. Only those counties which did not approve transfers last November will vote this month.

The May 16-25 referendum will be by mail, first time a referendum of this type has been conducted by mail. Ballots will be delivered to all cotton growers of record in counties holding referendum this month. Officials said a mail vote should be much more convenient for growers rather than having to appear in person at their polling place, particularly during busy season. USDA officials hope for good turnout in voting and will regard it as a sign growers approve mail method of holding referendums. To be counted, all votes should be in office of the county ASC committee before office closing time May 25.

The American Cancer Society Control dollar will be spent in Texas for fiscal year September 1, 1965 to August 31, 1966 as follows:

33¢—For Cancer Research in Texas Research Institutions. 14¢—For Professional Education, Fellowships and Services—keeping physicians informed of up-to-date developments in care and treatment of cancer, providing clinical fellowships, supporting tumor clinics and cancer registries, supporting professional conferences.

13¢—For Services to Patients providing cancer patients with dressings, loan closets and comfort items, and other volunteer services on the local level.

25¢—For public Education—informing Texans of Cancer's Seven Danger Signals in order that they may guard themselves and their families against cancer.

8¢—For Development of Program and Administration.

7¢—For Campaign - to provide Crusade materials for 265 Unit Campaigns which reach more than three million Texas families during the April Crusade. To develop memorial, legacy and special project programs and provide Crusade Staff assistance.

A total of \$676,057.00 was received in Texas in 1965 for research alone.

While in high school she was a member of FHA for 4 years, and she served as chapter vice-president this year. She has held the office of class reporter one year and class secretary-treasurer for three years.

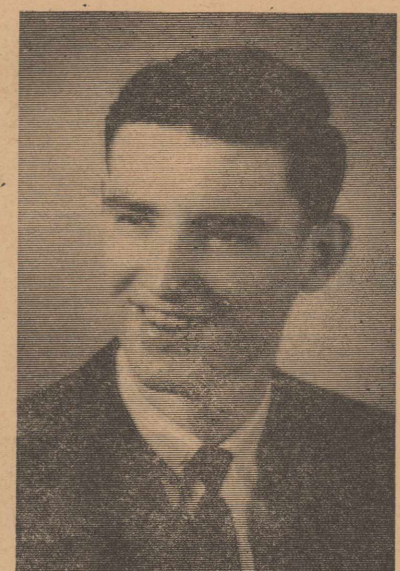

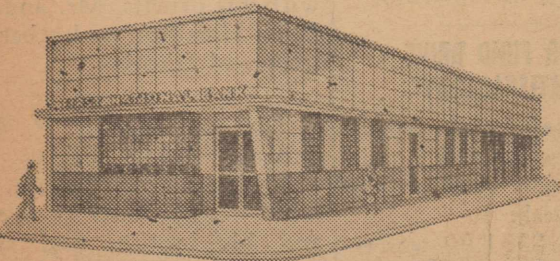
Mr. Kay has been associated with LCC since 1960, when he became Professor of History and Government at that institution. He is presently doing Public Affairs work for the college.

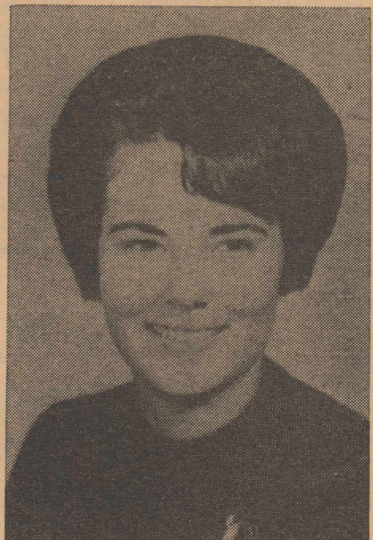


