TILT PIN ADJUSTMENT

The outboard motor is designed to

minimum effort and resistance. In-correct tilting in either direction changes the angle of hull attack with a resultant loss of efficiency. Improper tilt angle can reduce boat



"Great confusion exists, even among some doctors, about the distinct difference between 'support hose' for tired legs, and elastic stockings

for therapy of serious circulatory problems," explained William O. Elson, director of the Kendall Company's Bauer & Black health and medical research laboratories in Barrington, Illinois.

"It is important that both doctor and patient understand," said Elson, "that the fuller compression of properly-made elastic stockings is essential to the task they are required to do — help defective valves in the veins support a column of blood and assist in its upward motion towards the heart.

Much Greater Compression "Thousands of women wearing support hose really need some thing with much greater compression - elastic stockings. They are probably not aware that elastic hose now is available in attractive

weights and beauty. "We have no ax to grind," said Elson, "since our company is one of the nation's largest manufac turers of both support and elastic stockings. But we do feel a strong responsibility to do what we can to clear up dangerous misunderstandings about the distinctly different functions of the two."

"Support hose serve a wonderful purpose," the research scientist stated. "They are excellent in conserving energy and in relieving tired legs. However," he empha-sized, "when it comes to varicose points which should prove extremely helpful to those with legvein problems:

1. Elastic stockings should be put on before getting out of bed in the morning. Any delay, he emphasized, will contribute to leg swelling and the gathering of blood which injured valves cannot handle—and to a feeling of constriction when the stockings are later put on.

. Elastic stockings, contrary to popular belief, do not give any sensation of tightness. Properly constructed and applied elastic stockings are quite comfortable; in fact, the wearer feels additional comfort as a result of new-found lack of swelling.

Neither "stretch" nylon nor heavy-woven nylon can offer the support of elastic. Because true elastic support has nothing to do with weight or thickness, attractive, soft and sheer elastic stockings are now available which can be worn without
