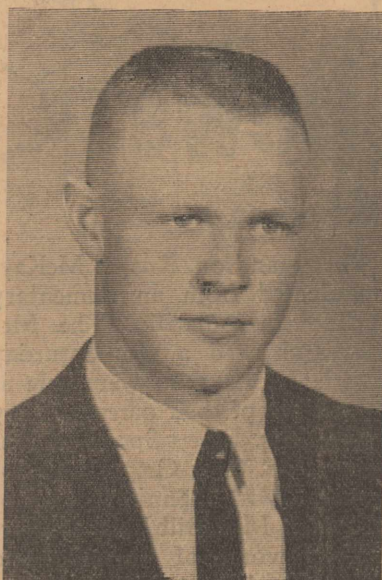

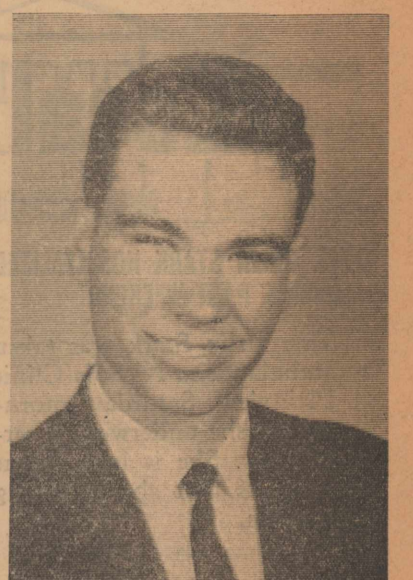

### E. G. REED RECIPIENT OF OUTSTANDING CONSERVATION FARMER AWARD

E. G. Reed, who farms south of Quitaque, has been named as the Outstanding Conservation Farmer of the Caprock Soil Conservation District for 1965.

This award is presented annually by the Silverton Lions Club to the Farmer, who in the opinion of the Board of Supervisors of the Caprock Soil Conservation District, has carried out the best conservation farming operations over a sustained period of time.

Reed, since assuming control of his place, has drilled an irrigation well, converted his sandy land to irrigated and dryland pasture, and uses high residue crops in rotation with cotton to protect his land against wind erosion. He was noted for high production per acre on his peanuts in 1965, grossing approximately \$400 per acre. In addition, he left all the peanut hay on the soil surface for protection against wind erosion.

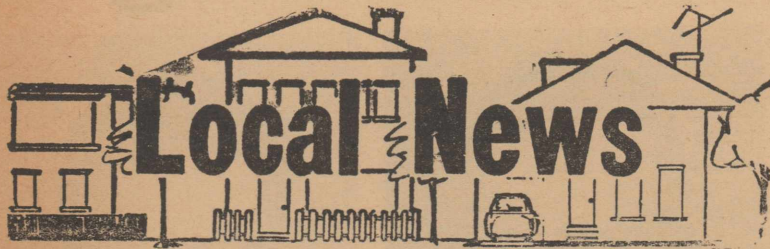

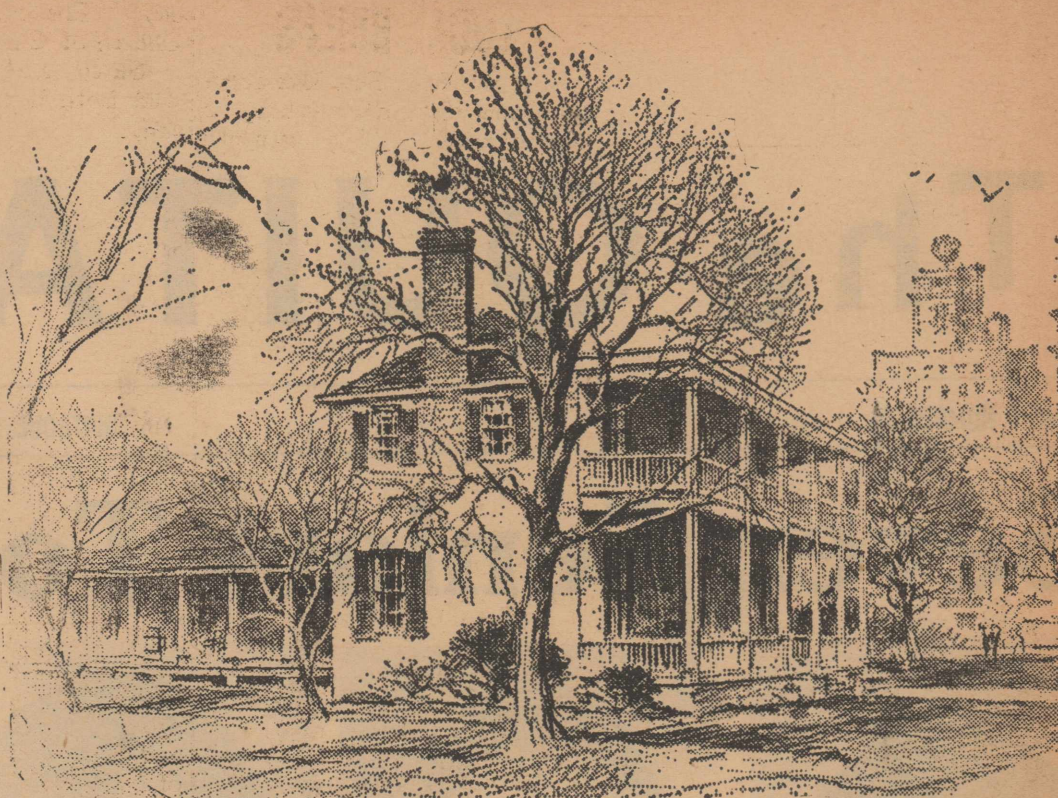

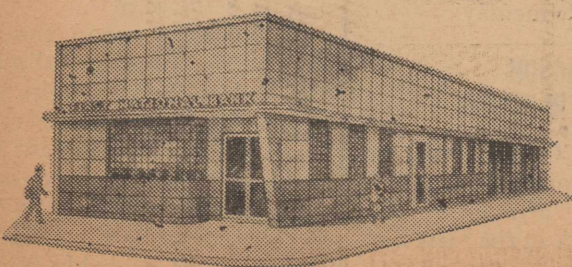

## Boating Tips...



### TILT PIN ADJUSTMENT

The outboard motor is designed to push a boat straight ahead with minimum effort and resistance. Incorrect tilting in either direction changes the angle of hull attack with a resultant loss of efficiency. Improper tilt angle can reduce boat speed by as much as one-quarter to one-half, say the Mercury outboard experts. When the tilt pin is set too far back, the outboard motor's thrust tends to push the stern down and the bow up. Often the bow will then interfere with the operator's vision. The stern digs into the water, wasting your power, and the windage drag on the hull is increased enormously, which also wastes power. Because the anti-cavitation plate is being dragged at an angle through the water, unnecessary underwater drag and wave action also result. When the tilt pin is too far forward, the bow tends to dig in and the stern rides high. Large bow and stern wakes result. The boat begins to plow through the water instead of planing over it.

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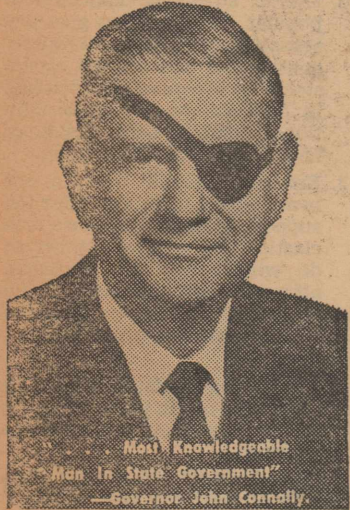

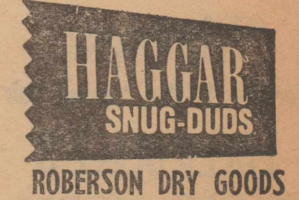

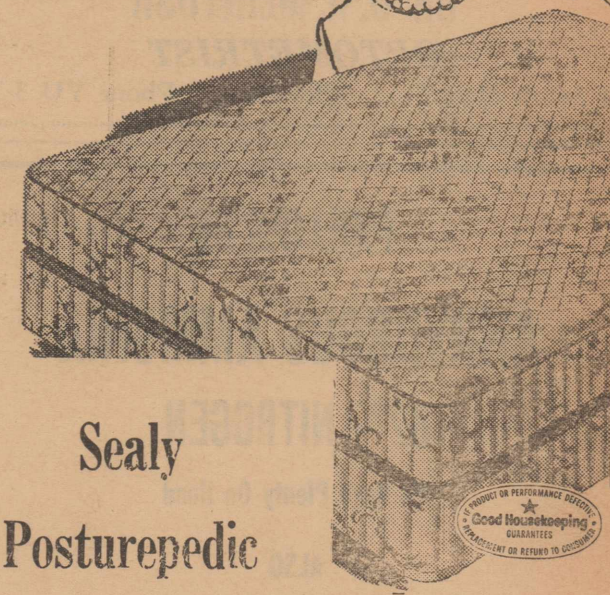

**CANCER CRUSADE ENDS IN BRISCOE COUNTY**

The American Cancer Society's 1966 April Crusade has officially ended in Briscoe County with a total of \$988.17 raised—one of the highest totals ever.

Mrs. Joe Brannon, chairman of the Crusade, said this is a complete figure, all reports having been received.

"We have made possible an expanded attack on cancer in Briscoe County, in the State and in the Nation," she said.

But all the volunteers should feel a personal sense of great reward. They have helped people and they have spread hope. The volunteers—the lifeblood of the Society's fight against cancer—have done a great humanitarian service to their fellow men."
