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H. G. BOYLES BUYS BAIRD OIL CO.

The announcement has been made this week of completion of the sale of Baird Oil Co. to H. G. Boyles. The purchase included the wholesale gasoline and oil business, warehouse, the office building, trucks, two service stations here in Quitaque and one at Silverton. Mr. Boyles will operate the service station next to the office building on East Main Street here in Quitaque.

Thus ends one of the oldest businesses in Quitaque which has operated under the same ownership.

Jimmy Baird bought the old Magnolia Petroleum Company dealership from Guy Hawkins 29 years ago and has operated the business since that time. And H. G. Boyles becomes only the third Mobil wholesale dealer here in Quitaque, according to Mr. Baird.

Mr. and Mrs. Boyles, who are presently living in Silverton where he has been operating the Mobil Service Station there for Mr. Baird, will be returning home for both grew up here. They lived in Amarillo for a number of years before returning to Silverton. They will move to Quitaque as soon as they arrange for a home.

KENT CREEK PROJECT IS NOT COMPLETE

One flood retarding structure and a series of repairs on the channel improvement still remain to be done in the Kent Creek Watershed Project. These needed channel repairs will probably have to be delayed until site 4 on the J. K. Patrick farm is completed. Six dams and 8½ miles of channel improvement work have been completed. The Soil Conservation Service of the USDA has provided all of the funds needed to date on construction work under the provisions of Public Law 566 known as the Small Watershed Act. \$301,338.59 has been spent on this project at this time. This money has been used for actual construction work or in establishing grass on the six completed dams.

It is not possible for the USDA to reimburse the Kent Creek Water Control and Improvement District for any costs other than actual construction and vegetative costs. Public Law 566 provides that local sponsoring organization, which in this case is the Kent Creek WCID, will assume all other costs such as land rights costs and maintenance costs.

The greater portion of the drainage area above the Patrick dam will be carried into the site by a floodwater diversion which must pass under the Ft. Worth & Denver railroad. It will be necessary to build a bridge to allow flood water to flow under the railroad. It has been ruled that the Kent Creek WCID cannot be reimbursed for an estimated \$2,000.00 of the cost of the bridge. Total construction costs are estimated to be \$22,000 on this site.

Site 4 is particularly important to the watershed project. The drainage area above this dam constitutes almost 30 percent of the controlled area in the watershed. The channel improvement work downstream is inadequate without the protection of this site. Excessive maintenance costs that would be borne locally could result if construction of this site is delayed.

One vital phase of a small watershed program is the conservation treatment on the farms in the Watershed. The Kent Creek Project has been recognized for having probably the best land treatment of any watershed project in the state. Many local farms have outstanding conservation plans applied on the land. About 90 percent of the watershed area is properly treated.

The cost of conservation practices installed on local farms is estimated to exceed the cost of the watershed project.

On farm land, treatment is very effective in reducing erosion and runoff from storms of about ten year frequency. Flood water retarding structures such as site 4 are designed to detain the runoff from storms of a 25 year frequency or higher. All of the planned structures and continued good land treatment are needed to assure the success of the Kent Creek Watershed Project.

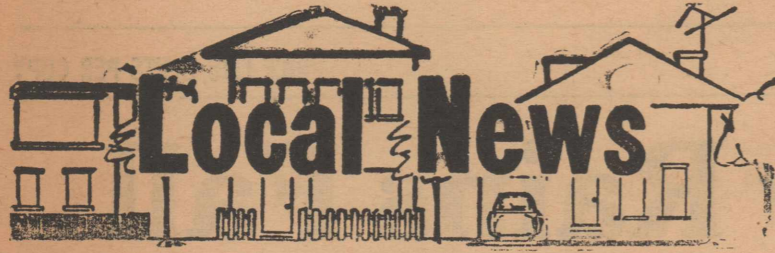

This means hitting a happy medium between being over-casual and under-casual. Either extreme can affect one's acceptance by other vacationers, and in turn, one's enjoyment, Dr. Hard says.

It's wise for you to check in advance with the clothes customs of the place or places you plan to visit, she adds.

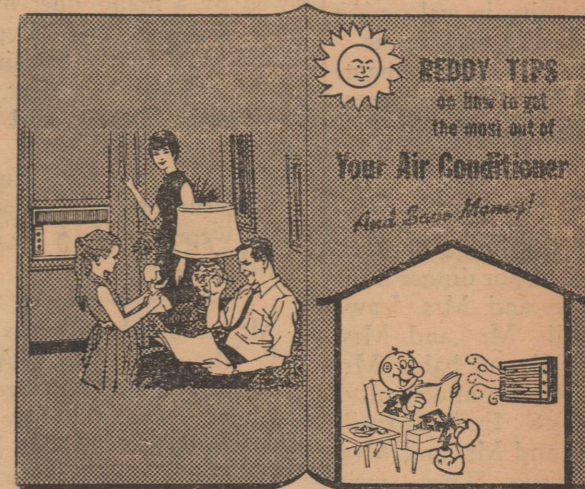
"I like a fast game of play," says Jim, who came from a high school that used the press constantly. He wore glasses until the middle of the season last year and changed to contact lenses.

Careless Weed Control In Grain Sorghum

without residual limitations on succeeding crops in 1965.

Chemical control of careless weeds in grain sorghum has been studied at the High Plains Research Foundation for several years. Studies during the last two years have been with the Monsanto Chemical Company's Ramrod - 65 herbicide. This herbicide should give weed control for four to six weeks and the late weeds being controlled by other means such as flame weeding. The 1965 experimental area was reasonably free of weeds so that the check plot, receiving no herbicide application, had very few weeds and therefore no large difference in early weed growth due to treatment occurred.

Weathermaster 66 grain sorghum was used in this test on Olton clay loam soil that was previously planted to cotton. Immediately following seeding, Ramrod-65 was sprayed in a twenty inch band over the seed row using zero, three, four and five pounds active ingredient per sprayed acre in forty gallons of water. Plots received two summer irrigations and were sidedressed with eighty lbs. of nitrogen from anhydrous ammonia. In addition to plowing water furrows prior to the first irrigation the plots were flame weeded on August 11 and again on September 2.

Full details on careless weed control tests on grain sorghum can be found in report number 167., by Dr. Arthur F. Gohlke, in the 1965 Research Report issued by the High Plains Research Foundation to all its members and professional agricultural leaders in the High Plains and South Plains of Texas.

DEER STOCKED IN LOCAL AREA
AMARILLO, June 9 — A two - year old Panhandle restocking program has added 320 desert mule deer to selected areas of Roberts, Ochiltree, Briscoe, Floyd and Motley counties, according to Weldon Fromm, district chief for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The transplanted mule deer were trapped on overpopulated rangeland in the Trans - Pecos area of Texas during the winter months and transported by truck to the Panhandle release areas.

counted as pioneers in our community. Mr. Persons moved here in April of 1906 at the age of 11. His parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Amos Persons, moved from Limestone County in 1904 to a place near Plainview, then moved to Briscoe County in 1906. He has lived here since that time except for about 18 months spent in Colorado. Ray has farmed and ranched here all of these years. He served as county commissioner from 1939 until 1947, when he moved to Colorado. He served on the local school board for a number of years, is a director of the First National Bank and is now serving as the City Justice of the Peace.

They went to school at Quitaque where they were classmates. Ray attended Wayland College

at Plainview for awhile. Eunice went to State Teachers College at Canyon long enough to receive a Teacher's Certificate and taught one term at Quitaque. Ray had just celebrated his 21st Persons Anniversary CONT (birthday on May 16, 1916, her school was out on the 19th and they were married on the 21st.

These 50 years have been very eventful years. They have lived to see times go from the covered wagon to jets and space rockets.
