A workshop for incoming officers of the FHA Chapters was held Tuesday and Wednesday of this week at Texas Tech in Lubbock. Six girls and their sponsor, Mrs. Frances Y. Wise, attended from Quitaque. The girls were: Jill Johnson, president; Patricia Brunson, 1st vice-pres.; Janis Johnson, 2nd vice-pres.; Janet Bailey, 4th vice-president; and Shelia Payne, 5th vice-president. You might think this is too many vice-presidents but each one has a specific place to fill. The job of the president is to preside over the meetings and deal with the business functions.

The 1st vice-president is chairman of the program committee. The 2nd vice-president is chairman of the degrees committees. The third vice-president is chairman of the projects committee; 4th vice-president is chairman of recreation; and the 5th vice-president is the publicity chairman and the Public Relations Chairman.

The main speaker was Russell Sanders, a graduate student at Texas Tech.

The title of his speech was, "Questions, Questions." Mr. Sanders gave us the definition of leadership: An art, a science, of human relations. The qualities of leadership, according to Mr. Sanders, are wisdom, persuasive ability, enthusiasm, and a pleasant personality. He said also that leaders are those who put their heart into their work.

YOUNG TULIA SERVICEMAN DIES IN NEW JERSEY ARMY CAMP

TULIA — Military medical offices Monday afternoon notified Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Mills of Tulia that the suspected cause of death of their son, Pvt. Joe Edd Mills, 19, was meningitis and encephalitis.

Pvt. Mills mother is the former Ruby Jo Neatherlin, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Neatherlin of the Gasoline community.

The parents were notified late Sunday that their son, on duty with the U. S. Army at Ft. Dix, N. J., had become "violently ill" and was suffering convulsions.

They were told at 1:30 a. m. Monday that their son had died, but officers had no idea at that time what had caused his death.

Young Mills was born Jan. 5, 1947, in Tulia, although the parents were living at Silverton at that time. The family moved to Tulia in 1950 and Joe Edd graduated from Tulia High School in 1965. While in high school, he worked three years as an announcer with Radio Station KTUE in Tulia.

He enlisted in the Army Jan. 3, and took his basic training at Ft. Bliss at El Paso. He reported to Ft. Dix April 2 after a three-week leave which he spent at home.

Funeral services for Pvt. Mills were held at 2 p. m. today (Thursday) in the first Baptist Church at Tulia with the pastor, Rev. C. N. Rue, officiating.

Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery at Tulia. Survivors in addition to his parents, include a sister, Ann, of the home, and his grandmothers, Mrs. Bertie Neatherlin of Anson and Mrs. Ola Mills of Tulia.

WHEAT PROGRAM PROVISIONS FOR '67 ARE ANNOUNCED

"These provisions for next year's crop will assure increased production of needed wheat and at the same time will bring producers more income," the Secretary said.

Farm allotment notices will be sent to producers shortly. Key factors in 1967 program are:

A. Price-support loan level will be \$1.25 per bushel.

B. Domestic marketing certificates on estimated 520 million bushels will be valued at difference between full parity as of July 1, 1967 and \$1.25 loan value. (This year's certificate value for the 1966 crop will be about \$1.32 per bushel).

C. Marketing certificates to be issued represent expected production on 40 percent of farm allotments on cooperating farms which reflect increased 1967 national allotments of 59.3 million acres announced earlier. (For 1966, this allocation percentage was 45 percent on effective national allotment of 51.6 million acres.)

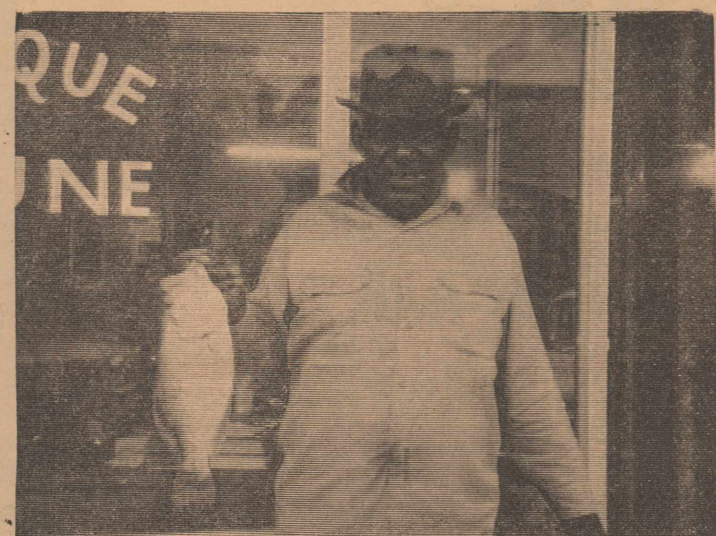
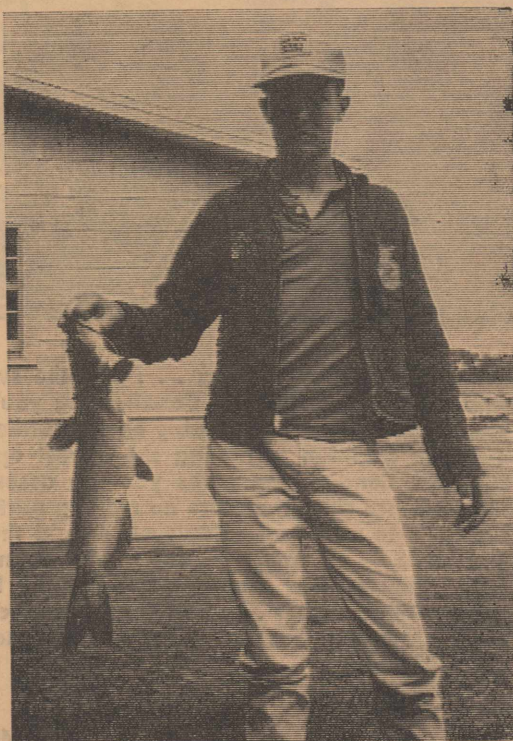
D. There will not be acreage diversion program for wheat. Cropland Adjustment Program as it applies to wheat will be announced later.

E. Wheat may continue to be planted on feed grain acreage on farms participating in both programs and feed grains may be planted on wheat allotment acreage. Producers will be able to substitute wheat for oats and rye on same basis as in the 1966 program. If barley was included in the 1967 feed grain program, wheat can be substituted as in prior years. If it is not included, wheat can be substituted for barley in the same manner as for oats and rye in past programs.

F. "Excess wheat options" contained in the 1966 program will be continued in 1967. Under this option, producers can plant in excess of his allotment acreage and be eligible for certificates and price support loans, provided, wheat acreage does not exceed allotment by more than 50 percent, excess produced will get better.

Some good catches have been reported out at Lake Theo, too. Jack Chandler reports that he brought in a string of channel cat one day last week, some of them weighing up to three lbs., and he has caught more this week. So the fishing is good and will get better.

WHEAT PROGRAM PROVISIONS

(Continued From Page One) tion is stored and farmer complies with other terms and conditions similar to those in effect in 1966.

G. Program participation requirements for 1967 will be the same as in 1966 except there will be no required or additional diversion. Offsetting and cross-compliance requirements also will be the same as in 1966.

Since there will be no acreage diversion under the 1967 program, production of alternate non-surplus crops will not be possible as was the case in prior wheat program years.

USDA also announced that resale policy for CCC-owned wheat for 1966 crop marketing year beginning July 1 of this year will be continued as announced in December 1965. Wheat will continue to be offered at market prices but not less than 108 percent of loan rate plus carrying charges. The 108 percent markup represents

about the same margin in cents above loan rate as 105 percent did in past when loan rates were at higher levels.

May estimate of wheat supplies for the coming year approaches 2 billion bushels. At estimated rates of usage, total wheat carryover on July 1, 1967, will be below the carryover on July 1, 1966.

CCC uncommitted stocks of wheat at end of May totaled 307 million bushels. In addition, about 65 million bushels wheat stored on farms under resale farm price-support loan as of April 30. About 45 million bushels of 1965-crop wheat still outstanding under loan as of that date.

BURNING STUBBLE

The ASC State Committee has determined that deliberate burning of crop residues, other than flax, violates reasonable conservation principles and will be considered a practice tending to defeat the purposes of the Agricultural Conservation Program.

WTU NOTEBOOK—PATTERNS FOR PROGRESS

INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS ... a must in Economic Development

Obtaining leads on industries that might locate in a community is one of the hardest parts of any sound economic development program. The lack of an industrial prospecting program that produces several leads may cause serious mistakes by a community in financing or other endeavors to attract unsound or unattractive industry. A community needs a well balanced program, combining all the techniques and utilizing all of the sources that will give it increased effectiveness and chances for real success.

LOCAL PEOPLE AS A SOURCE OF INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS—usually provide a sound reason or give the community a competitive advantage in attracting the industry.

BUSINESSMEN—should ask the company representatives they buy from if the company needs additional manufacturing facilities to serve this market area, also, service stations, restaurants and motel people can ask their customers.

CITIZENS—who know someone that works for an industry should inquire if that industry might be interested in locating a plant.

EXISTING INDUSTRY—may need a companion industry to supply them with raw materials or services. Expansion of existing industry is sound economic development.

LOCAL IDEAS—can provide leads for the local people to establish an industry of their own or attract a certain type industry.

EX-CITIZENS—should be contacted, advising them and asking their help to obtain leads on any industry that could logically locate in the town.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ACTIVITY—should utilize such programs as direct mail, asking local citizens to call on industries when they are on a trip — watching all news media for possible leads or indications that a company might expand.

COOPERATION WITH OTHER AGENCIES—such as utilities, banks, railroads, regional and state development organizations can provide leads for new industry. Keep all of these organizations fully advised of the local programs, advantages, activities and community interest for attracting new industry for improved economy in your community.

ANY and ALL industrial leads should be handled through and by the local group that has been delegated this responsibility, usually the Chamber of Commerce.
