#### The Food Dollar And the Farmer

The farm share of the consumer's dollar spent for food ranges from about 10 to 70 percent, according to the recently issued report of the National Commission on Food Marketing. This lengthy survey of the economics of food marketing, which from farmer through retailer comprises the Nation's largest industry, shows that farmers are NOT to blame for higher food prices in recent vears. The report points up the extent to which farmers are being made the scapegoats by other segments of the economy.
