

Boating Tips

HANDLING CHARACTERISTICS

Bear in mind that your boat's stern

Bear in mind that your boat's stern always swings out when you turn. You have to get used to this, since it's different than driving an auto-mobile; the front of the car veers right or left when you turn. When your Mercury outboard motor, mounted on the stern, turns to either side, propeller thrust is no longer parallel to the boat's center-line and the stern swings wide. Take this into consideration, or you will clip or bump moored boats, scrape against pilings, and

istics on turns, pilot it past a mark-er at different speeds, beginning turns as you pass. Make fairly gen-





Nobody speaks with a forked tongue about today's Indians. At least not if they're talking about the progress many tribes are making in attracting tourists to their reservations during the summer. The Bureau of Indian Affairs has even launched a pro-gram with the theme: "See America first with the first Americans," the idea being to get you to stop by at a reservation on your way to or from your vacation

They — the Indians, that is — have even got Dan "Hoss Cart-wright" Blocker of the NBC-TV nanza show to do a mess of spots for them on radio and TV. "Many reservations are areas of unspoiled, scenic beauty" says Dan, "and they offer some of the finest recreation spots in the country. Fishing, especially, is outstanding." Take the State of Minnesota, for example: one of the areas that Blocker mentions in his radio spots. On the Greater Leech Lake Reservation, in North Central Minnesota, there are almost 25 thousand acres belonging to the Chippewa Indians. It's one of the finest recreational areas in the State with many tourist camps and resorts and plenty of fishing

At White Earth Reservation, the Chippewas have an additional 56 thousand acres in the western part of the State, featuring an annual Indian Pow Wow in June, and boating, hunting, fishing and swimming all summer long.

In northern Minnesota, along the lower Red Lake and about 30 miles north of the town of Bemidji, there's the beautiful Red Lake Reservation of over 564 thousand acres, populated by 2,900 Chippewa Indians.
