PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
TO BE VOTED ON AT AN
ELECTION TO BE HELD

PROPOSED CONSTITU1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLU-TION NO. 37 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, Section 51-d, so as to provide for the payment

of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law en forcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas De-partment of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Cormen; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE

STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III,
Constitution of the State of
Texas, be amended by adding Section 51-d to read as fol-

lows:
"Section 51-d.
