



Egg Nog For Yule

The most popular Christ-mas drink in America is egg-In early colonial days hot

beverages and punches wcre popular in America as well as in England. Sack-posset, from which came American egg-nog, was served hot from a hand made kettle. Egg nog and Sack-posset contain the same milk, eggs sugar and nutmeg. It changed, however, from a hot to a cold drink and from a mild sack flavored drink to a more hearty one with rum and brandy.

Christmas Card **History is Cloudy**

It is generally believed that the first card designed as a Christmas greeting, was done in England by J. Horsley in (1843). Actually the search for the "first" is still going on. Although it bore no specific greet-ing, The New York historical society, some 30 years before the Horsley card, sent to members and friends of the society a woodcut of ST. NICHOLAS, which bore a Christmas poem in both Dutch and English. In 1932 Carl W. Drepperd discovered in a Pennsylvania attic a "Beadsheet" issued about 1842 by John M. Welff, a Phil-adelphia printer. The sheet fea-

tured a reproduction of C. C. Moore's "The visit of St. Nich-olas" and carried a greeting "A Merry Christmas and A Happy New Year" New Year". The first commercial Christmas card business was in 1863 by an English firm.

Largest Lighted Tree

It is believed that a tree in California's red wood forest stands 364 feet tall. This tree was first deocrated and lighted in December, 1945.

To most boys and girls, "jingle all the way" refers to sleigh bells and a one-horse open sleigh; but for Hanover, New Hampshire, youngsters' bells at Christmas time mean only one thing; the clanging of the fire bell for the annual Children's Fire Engine Ride! This happens each Christmas when the local fire fighters step into the role of Santa Claus and give the town youngsters a holiday treat; a ride through the streets of Hanover in a shiny red fire engine! Youngsters of all ages line up in front of their schools and pile into the fire trucks. (Children that are too young to "hang on" ride at the head of the procession in the Fire Chief's car.) More than five hundred boys and girls ride as the fire engines "race" (at five miles an hour) through the town as bells ring

and sirens screech. Back at the fire station the children line up for a visit with Santa Claus, who stands next to the shiny fire pole with a bag of candy and a toy for each boy and girl. When he asks them the perennial question "What do you want from Santa Claus"?, the answer is almost always: "I want a fire engine".

Quick Candy You will find that candies are always a welcome gift. The quickest and easiest, as well as healthful are those made from dried fruits. Nuts can be ground with the fruit if you like Mix well and moisten with fruit juices or condensed milk, if needed. Shape into balls or roll out onto a sheet, then cut in squares or fancy shapes. Din each piece in granulated of powdered sugar, ground toasted coconut, nuts, or meited chocolate.

Gift Wrap

The smallest gift will look impressive in a gaily wrapped package. Use shelf paper, scraps of material or odd ends of wallpaper. To tie your pack age use strips of cloth cut in ribbon widths with pinking shears, or bright colored yarns. Pack your gifts in unusual containers - such as flower pots, small basket, decorated oatmeal boxes, coffee cans or paper plates with bright seals.



There are certain precautions that homemakers should be aware of if they receive a poinsettia for Christmas. They will last longer if they have plenty of light, kept in a cool place and given proper watering. You will enjoy your plant longer if it is kept away from radiators, TV sets or other sources of heat. A windowsill location often can fur-nish both light and cool temperature-provided it is not over a radiator.

Proper watering is necessary to prevent the leaves from dropping. The soil should be watered thoroughly until water runs from the bottom of the pot, then allowed to become rather dry before watering again.



and candied fruit for trim. Scald milk, add ½ cup sugar and the salt. Cool to luke-warm. Add crumbled yeast and mix thoroughly. Add one cup of flour and stir until smooth. Cover and let rise until double in bulk. Add the beaten eggs, softened butter, fruit and nutmeg and mix well. Add remainder of flour to make a dough stiff enough to knead. Knead until smooth and elastic. Allow to rise until double. Knead down and divide in two. Roll each half into a circle about 8 inches in diameter. Spread with softened butter and sugar. Make a crease down the center of the dough and fold over. Place in greased loaf pans and let rise until double in bulk. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees, for 30 to 40 minutes. Frost with confec-

tioners' frosting and sprinkle with nuts or fruit. Stollen will keep for a week at least. It can be cut in thin slices and toasted, or buttered and placed under the broiler until lightly browned.







The Mummers Were **Outlawed**

From early times in the British Isles there were bands of Mummers, masqueraders, guisers (going about in dis-quise, reminiscent of an old Roman custom at the Satur-nalia) who went from hall to hall, singing, dancing, or staging rude plays. The latter usually contained such char-acters as St. George, the Dra-gon, Hector, and Alexander The Great. The Great.

In 1337, a "mummerie" was given before Richard, son of the Black Prince. When Henry IV observed Christmas at Eltham, he was visited by twelve alderman and their sons as mummers. Much later, Henry VIII sent out a proclamation against mumming or guising (a person could be jailed for three months for this offense) because many crimes, even murders, were committed during the mumming season.

Manger Scenes

The setting up of manger scenes of the Nativity has become a popular custom. The idea started in 1223,

at Greccio, Italy. St. Francis of Assisi assembled such a

scene with real people and live animals. He wanted to make the story of Christ's birth real to his followers.

This movement spread through Italy and to other lands, especially in Southern Europe, where manger scenes rather than the Christ-mas trees formed the center of the holiday observance. Bethlehem Busy **At Christmas Time**

Since the first Christmas Christians have followed the Star to the stable-grotto be-neath the church of the Nativ-ity, the traditional birthplace of Jesus of Nazareth in Bethlehem

Bethlehem is even poorer than most people would be-lieve. A recent visitor said "Wanderers fill the streets anyone can see why Mary and Joseph found no room in the Inn.

Every Christmas, shep-herds watching their flocks out-side Bethlehem, had to be rspecially watchful that the sheep did not trap themselves to the barbed wire separating Jordan and Israel. Bethlehem, on the Jordan side of the wire, has been sorely affected by the hostility and the uneasy truce. It is crowded with Arab refu-gees who formerly lived in Israel.

The effect of the conflict has been crippling of Bethlehm's chief industry; the making and selling of objects of piety from olive wood, Dead sea stone and mother of pearl. Except at Christmas, pilgrims are so few that the profit had gone from the business.

On Christmas eve, however, the dusty city takes on new life. Christmas diplomats living in divided Jerusalem expect to be escorted to the little town over the unusual highway through no-man's land. Pilgrims from the Israel side pass through the Mandelbaum Ĝate.

Rich and poor Pilgrims worship together in the fourth century church of the Nativity. There is a high mass, during which the image of the Christ Child is carried from the church through the Mandelbaum Gate.

The ceremonies come to a climax before three adjacent shrines. The Altars of the Nativity, The Wise Men and the Manger. Outside, Christians from many lands will sing, as angels sang nearly 2,000 years ago; "Glory To God In The Highest", and on earth peace and good will toward men.

Carve leg first; insert the fork firmly through the center of the wishbone. Place the platter sc that the legs of the bird are to your right. Start by carving the leg nearest you. Make a vertical cut on each side of the second joint of the leg where it is attached to the body by skin. Bend the entire leg toward the platter. With the point of the slicer cut through the connecting skin and socket and remove the leg. Next cut off the wing. To slice the breast meat, place the blade at the top of the breastbone. Push the knife downward and forward toward the wing socket. Continue by moving the knife a degree close* to the bird. Complete one side of the bird before turning to repeat the same method.
