FARMERS CAUTIONED ABOUT LAND THEY INTEND TO DIVERT

Farmers who participate in the 1967 upland cotton and feed grain program are being cautioned about the kind of land they intend to divert under such

Payments for a farm will be reduced where the county committee determines that the cropland set aside for diverted acrese under the program is substantially less productive than the average cropland normally used to produce the crop.

In such a case, the farm operator will be given an opporfunity and urged to designate other land of at least average productivity for diversion under the program. If this is not done, program payments will be reduced in proportion to the lower yields which could reasonably be expected from the acreage diverted.

Any reduction indicated in the payment otherwise earned by the farmer would be subtracted, as applicable, from the farm diversion, the price support, and the certificate pay-Mrs. Leroy Hamilton, ac- ments-in that order. 
