GRADE SCHOOL SCIENCE FAIR TO BE PRESENTED THIS WEEKEND

The Quitaque Grade School Science Fair will be held this weekend, March 17th, 18th and 19th in the gymnasium. About 100 exhibits will be displayed by students from grades 1 to 8.

The exhibits will be divided into three general levels for judging purposes:

Grades 1, 2 and 3
Grades 4, 5, and 6.
Grades 7 and 8.

Eleven of the exhibits will be entered in the regional Science Fair that is to be held in Amarillo on April 7.

Friday - 4:00 to 6:30 — Installation of exhibits.

Saturday - 10:00 a. m. to 12:00 p. m. — Judging.

1:30 to 5:00 — Open to the public.

7:00 p. m. — Presentation of awards.

8:00 p. m. — Open to the public.

Sunday - 1:30 to 3:00 p. m. — Open to the public.

3:00 to 4:30 p. m. — Removal of exhibits.

Everyone is cordially invited to attend the Fair each time it is open to the public.

In conjunction with the Science Fair the P-TA is sponsoring a Science Festival. Anyone wishing to purchase materials may do so at the Festival.

There will not be an admission to the Fair.

There were 4600 members in this district and they attended the House of Delegates at the Student Union Building for the business meeting.

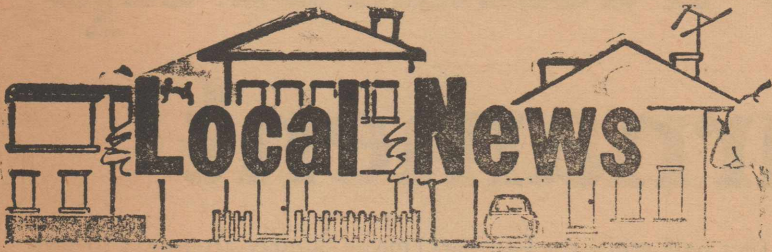
Wilburn Martin of Flomot was elected Treasurer for the 13th District at the meeting.

STATE APPROVES LEGISLATION

AUSTIN — Three legislative measures updating and broadening the responsibilities of the State Soil and Water Conservation Board were approved Tuesday by the Senate.

Sponsor for the proposals was Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon.

The proposals would give the State Board power to negotiate with local agencies, organizations and the Federal government in conservation programs.

The State Board would be authorized to enter into agreements with local and Federal agencies and buy and sell property for the development and protection of the states' water and soil resources.

Conservation funds from the Federal government and other sources would be deposited in a Natural Resource Conservation and Development Fund for

administration by the board.

"Under the proposals," Senator Hightower said, "the State Board would be able to negotiate with local agencies, organizations and individuals for conservation purposes."

Noting that the responsibilities of the State Board had not been updated since 1939, Senator Hightower said:

"It is anticipated that the State Boards and Districts will be asked to handle some Federal funds for soil and water conservation."

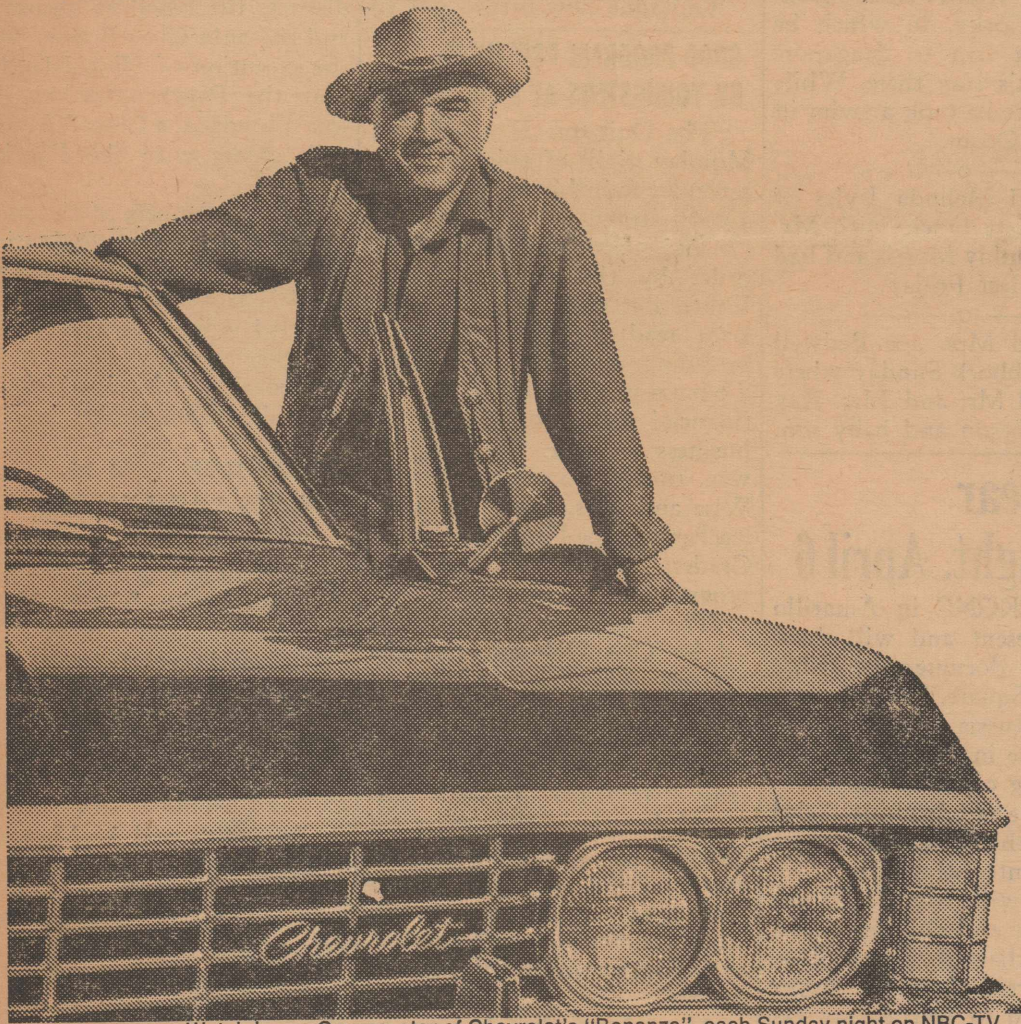

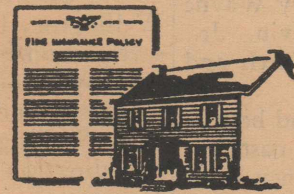

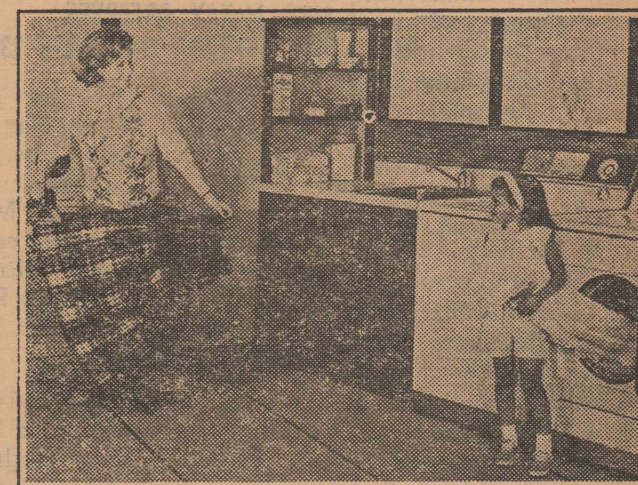

DEADLINE GETTING NEAR FOR AUTO INSPECTION

AUSTIN — The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded motorists today that only six weeks remain before enforcement begins on the 1967 vehicle inspection stickers.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS Director, said that the law allows for no extension of the April 15 deadline and urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected before the last minute lines begin forming.

Garrison pointed out that some two and one-quarter million vehicles in Texas remain to be inspected in order to comply with state law. This amounts to approximately 14 vehicles per working day for each of the 5,500 official inspection stations.

"Undoubtedly," Garrison stated, "Many motorists wait until the last day, and it may be very difficult to find an inspection station that is not swamped with late-comers."

"In order to secure an orderly flow of the remaining uninspected vehicles through the inspection stations we urge each motorist to have the inspection attended to as soon as possible. This can easily be taken care of during a routine visit to an authorized neighborhood inspection station."

LOSE YOUR MEDICARE ID CARD?

If you lose your Medicare identification card, the social security office will help you secure a replacement, according to Travis C. Briggs, district manager of the Amarillo social security office.

Briggs said that his office would need to know your full name, your claim number if you have it, birth date, and mailing address.

Hospital need the card to verify that a patient is enrolled in the Medicare program and to use in requesting payment from Medicare for their services to the patient.

No one should delay in securing needed attention because their card is lost or misplaced, as the hospital can secure the claim number from the social security office in an emergency.

The Amarillo social security office is located at 1006 S. Adams, telephone DRake 6-5151, and is open Monday through Fridays from 8:15 a. m. until 4:30 p. m. Thursday evenings the office is open until 7:30 p. m.

A representative of the Amarillo office will be in Silverton at the Courthouse from 9:30 to 10:30 a. m. on March 16 and March 30.
