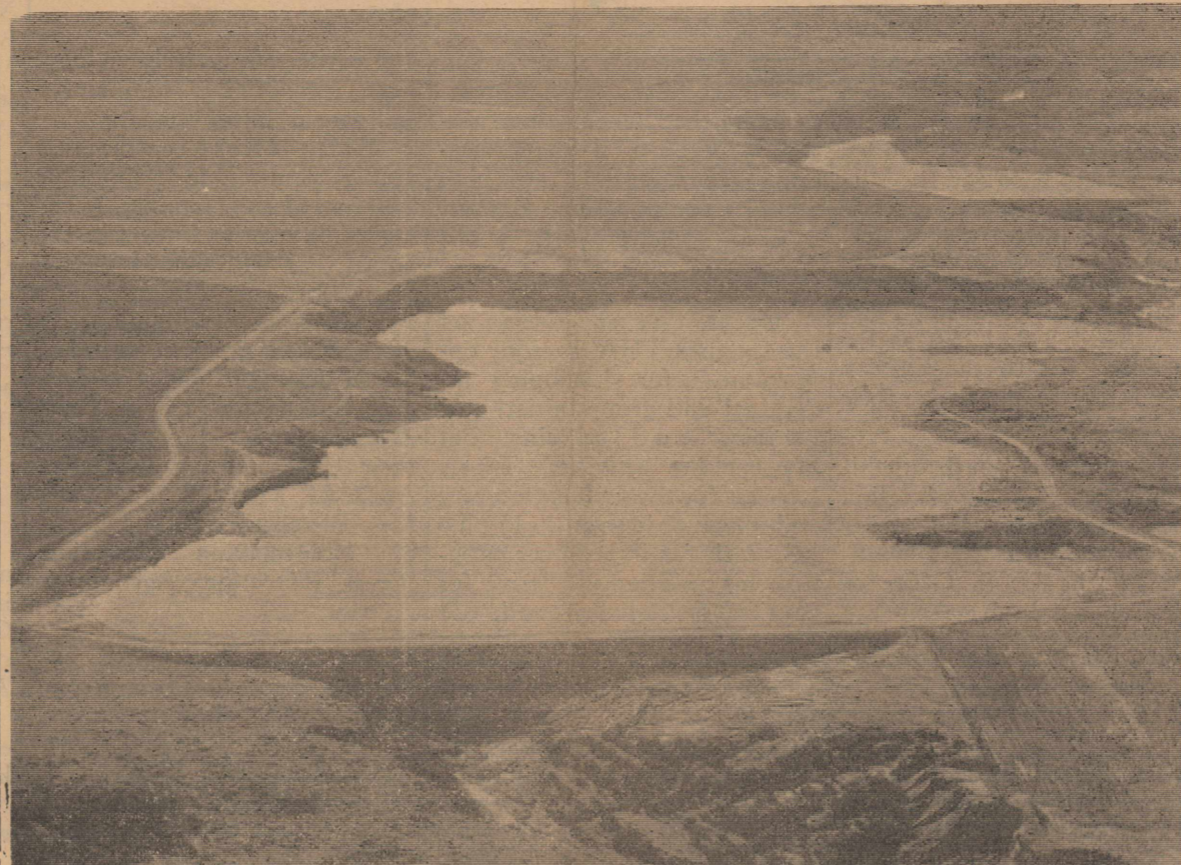

bock Municipal Auditorium.

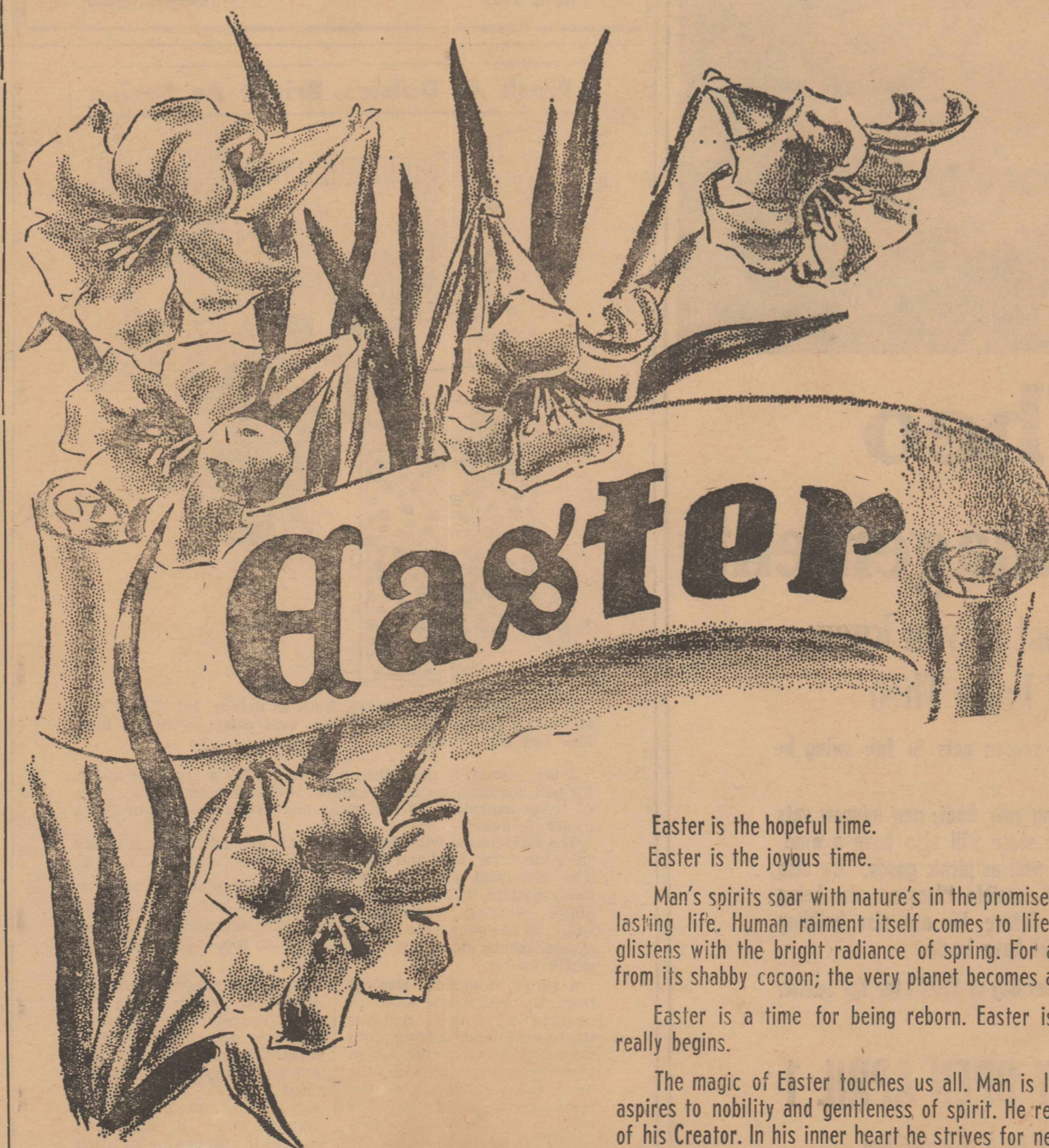
