JUDGE MORELAND PROCLAIMS SOIL STEWARDSHIP WEEK

Today with a rapidly increasing population we must be more aware than ever before of the value of our natural renewable resources. These God-given resources, soil, water, plant and wildlife must not only be conserved but improved.

Land is being taken from agriculture with the building of cities, highways, factories, airports, parks and water reservoirs.

This is progress, but it does cause our farmers and ranchers to have to intensify land for increased production. The responsibilities for the conservation of these resources is by law given to the Soil and Water Conservation Districts and their Supervisors in Texas.

Today there are 184 Soil and Water Conservation Districts encompassing better than ninety-nine percent of the land of our State. These Soil and Water Conservation Districts and the landowners who govern them, assisted by many organizations and agencies, are proving that through proper land use our soil conservation practices will stabilize soil, conserve our water, and improve each acre for better quality foods and fiber.

As these resources are conserved and developed we are making possible the continued strength of our State and assuring our people of a continuing high standard of living. Most important of all, is that good soil and clean pure water will continue in its service to men of future generations as a trust from the Creator.

NOW, THEREFOR, I as County Judge, H. G. Moreland, do hereby designate the week of April 30-May 7, 1967, as Soil Stewardship Week in the Can Rock Soil and Water Conservation District, Briscoe Co., Texas.

DEADLINE NEARING FOR WW II VETS TO APPLY FOR GI LOANS

Less than four months remain for thousands of World War II veterans to use their GI loan privileges to purchase a home, farm or for business purposes. This warning is being published by all service officers in order that all World War II veterans can be alerted of this fast approaching deadline.

Present laws provide that the absolute cutoff date for World War II veterans to obtain a GI loan will be on July 25, 1967. This deadline is the result of Congressional action which has delayed the final date of eligibility for this group of veterans several times. There is no indication that the deadline date will again be extended.

The cutoff mentioned above will not affect veterans of the Korean Conflict or veterans who have qualifying service since January 31, 1955. These veterans are covered by different deadline dates. The final date on which a Korean veteran might obtain a loan is January 31, 1975. The final date for veterans with service since Jan. 31, 1955, will be twenty (20) years from the date of separation from active duty.

The Veterans Administration reports that almost seven million loans have been guaranteed by the Veterans Administration to veterans since the program began following World War II. Statistics show that one out of every five homes constructed in the United States following World War II was done so with Veterans Administration guarantee.

The Veterans Administration is urging all veterans of World War II who are still eligible, to commence action immediately if they intend to use their GI loan before the cut-off date of July 25, 1967. In order to determine whether a veteran might still be eligible, the VA adds ten years to the date of his discharge or separation, plus one year for each three months in service. Currently, in addition, there is even authority for the VA to use the odd days that might be left over following the application of the formula, to establish eligibility for an even longer period of time. Veterans who were discharged from World War II because of a service-connected disability will be eligible for a GI loan up to the maximum deadline date of July 25, 1967. For this purpose, it is not absolutely necessary that the veteran was given a disability discharge from the service. If the records show that he had a disability which is rated as service incurred and which was disabling at the time of discharge, then such veteran would be determined to be eligible for a GI loan up to the final deadline date.

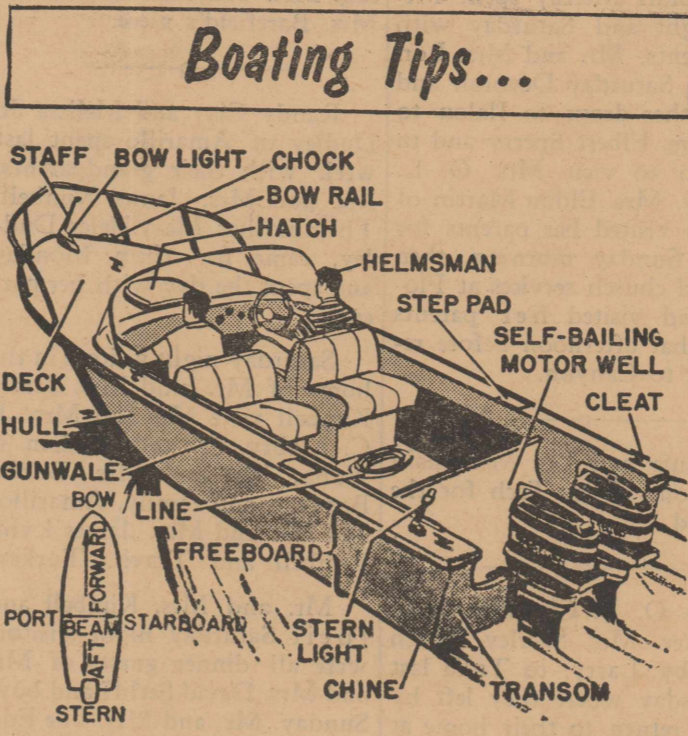
Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

"Results of the 1966 study on the irrigation of grain sorghum definitely point out the necessity of a well timed pre-boot irrigation. A six day delay in this irrigation reduced yields in our test approximately 1,000 pounds per acre." James Valliant, Soil Scientist, who is directing the irrigation research program at the High Plains Research Foundation, said in an interview last week.

"A preplant irrigation plus irrigation at the pre-boot and flower stages of growth in 1966 again produced the greatest practical efficiency."

"A four average showed no significant increase in yield with three summer irrigations over two summer irrigations."



NAUTICAL TERMS

Every good boater should recognize and use the colorful and traditional language of the sea. Without a command of basic nautical vocabulary the would-be boater dooms himself to the classification of "landlubber." To help prevent this calamity the Mercury outboard experts developed the above illustration to identify the proper nomenclature for an outboard boat. Gunwale is pronounced "gunnel."

Commenting on the future of grain sorghum, Valliant said that grain sorghum will probably be planted on more irrigated acres than any other crop in the High Plains of Texas in 1967 because of the feed grain program requiring only a 20% acreage diversion. With the increase in planted acreage, the use of irrigation water will increase. This will require the farmer to carefully plan the most practical use of his available water. The declining level in the ground water formation makes this advance planning more important each year. Efficiency of water use is highly important to the grain sorghum producer. For this reason, the High Plains Research Foundation is continually studying ways and means to maintain and improve the income from grain sorghum with reduced amounts of underground water.

In irrigating grain sorghum the approximate 20 day period beginning with the 6 to 8 leaf stage and ending with head emergence is the most critical. Pre-boot is the period when the small head can be seen forming if the plant is stripped down. During this period, the producer should watch soil moisture and signs of wilt closely to determine when to irrigate. "The more definite periods of moisture needs are fairly easily seen at certain stages of growth, such as preboot, flower, milk, and in some cases, the soft dough stage."

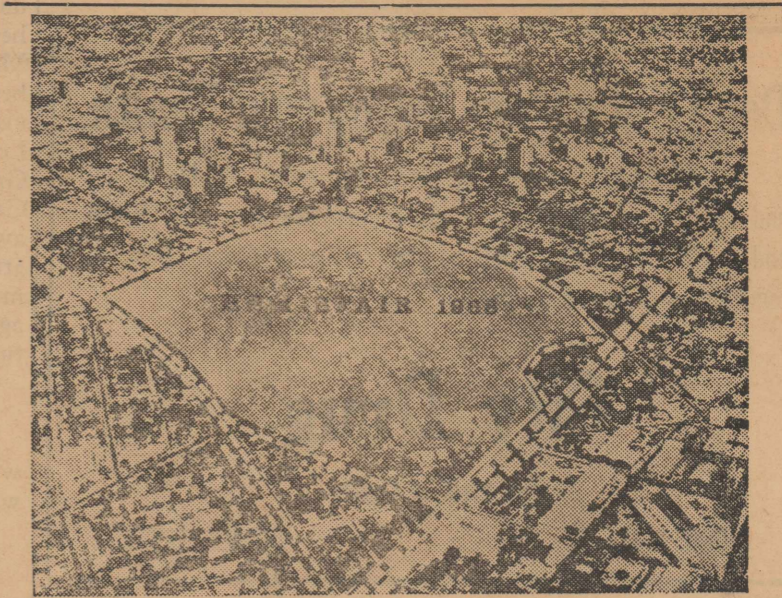
Further information on the timing of irrigation of grain sorghum and other crops can be found in the 1966 Annual Research Report to be published in the near future by the High Plains Research Foundation.
