The last meeting of the school year was held Monday night, May 8, for the local P-TA with a guest speaker who installed the officers for the coming year.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. Elmer Berryhill. The Rev. Al Jennings presented a devotional entitled "Man's Need to Serve." Among the thoughts presented was, "to love is to serve, and this is the key to life." He closed his meditation with prayer.

Mrs. D. W. Baca opened the business session with the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting, followed by a treasurer's report by Mrs. Johnny Powell.

Mrs. Bob Cochran, hospitality chairman, introduced the hostess, Mrs. Oliver Clark, who had charge of the refreshments for the evening.

Mrs. Jimmy Davidson presented an audit report.

Two amendments to the By-Laws were introduced and voted into effect.

Each teacher in the school system were then given Certificates of Appreciation for their work in the school system this year. Mrs. Dora Hawkins, the Second Grade teacher has given 27 years of service in the local system; Mrs. Jo Mae Merrell has taught 23 years here; Mrs. Novelle Wise is next with 19 years, most of that in the First Grade; Mrs. Ina Mae Baird, 12 years; George Ray Colvin, 9 years; Elmer Berryhill, 9 years; Mrs. Ann Jones, 6 years; Wilburn Leeper, 5; Mrs. Frances Wise, 5; Mrs. Delene Tyler, 2; Mrs. Lucille Moseley 1½; Supt. Herman Moseley, 1½; Dean Johnson, 1; Don Johnson, 1; Danrell Hinton, 1; and Mrs. Ala Jean Kingston, 1. Altogether, our teachers have a total of 124 years of service in the Quitaque school system. Supt. Moseley is a veteran of 25 years in the school teaching profession and Mrs. Moseley has taught nine years in addition to rearing her family. Several other of the teachers have taught in other schools also.

Mrs. Berryhill, P-TA president, expressed her thanks and appreciation to the faculty for their leadership of the local students. Supt. Moseley, in turn, expressed his appreciation and those of the other teachers, for the Certificates of Appreciation and for the support and cooperation of the P-TA and other residents of the local school district.

After the room count was made it was found that the Sixth and Ninth Grades had the best representation at the meeting Monday night.

Following the business meeting, Mrs. Truman Merrell introduced the speaker, who was R. C. Marshall of Borger, past-president of the District 19, Congress of Parent - Teacher Associations. Mr. Marshall, in turn, introduced his wife and son, Jack, who accompanied him to Quitaque.

Mr. Marshall, who is a candidate for an office on the State P-TA Bard, presented on number items of information concerning the P-TA. He said that P-TA is not a dictator organization, but is an arm of the school with the purpose of bringing the school and home together, with the aim to support and encourage the school to help the child in his relationship between the home and the school. 


ORVILLE LEE HOSPITALIZED

FISHING A SHORELINE

Bass and certain other game fish are frequently found along the shore. Here they seek shelter among rocks, logs and vegetation, preying on small fish and animal life that abound there.

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
