

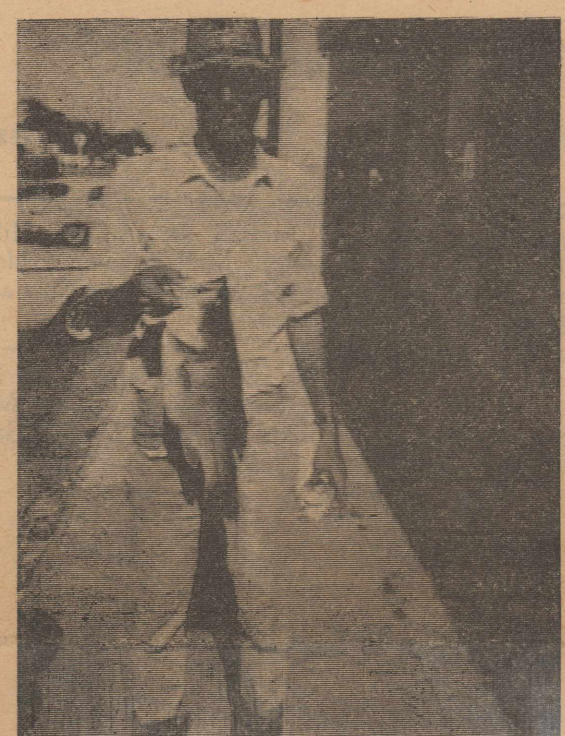

Merchants To Sponsor Fishing Contest

Local merchants agreed this week to sponsor another fishing contest this summer with prizes to be given in four categories, the same as last year's contest. The same rules will apply this year. The contest will include all of the lakes below the Caprock in the vicinity of Quitaque, including Burson Lakes. Prizes will be given for the largest bass, the largest crappie, the largest catfish and the largest perch. The fish must be weighed at one of the local grocery stores and then registered at The Tribune. Also the fish must be caught on a rod and reel or pole of some sort. Prizes to be given in the various categories will be announced later. When possible, The Tribune would like to have pictures of the fish brought in and entered in the contest. The contest officially opened Monday, May

15 and will run until September 1. Some real nice fish have been caught in the area lakes already this year. A couple of examples are shown below of recent catches. Jerry Payne proudly displays a 5-lb. bass he caught last Saturday at Lake Theo on a water dog. Jerry said that it was the biggest one he had ever caught. The string of fish pictured below Jerry's photo is the string of bass caught by Lyn Payne two weeks ago at Cottonwood Lake. The largest one scaled in at 5 and a quarter pounds. Five others on the string weighed from 3 to better than four lbs. Salty Jones brought in a bass from Hawkins Lake that weighed 2½ pounds; O. R. and Scotty Stark and Max Ham caught 44 crappie on jigs at Hawkins Lake the past week; and Pete and Jarrell Rice caught 27 crappie at Hawkins Lake on fle-flys.

Methodist Pastors To Meet In Abilene

ABILENE — Representatives of 108,000 Methodists in the Northwest Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Church will gather at McMurry College in Abilene May 22-25 for the 58th annual session of the conference.

Around 300 ministers and several hundred laymen will serve as official delegates to the conference. Bishop O. Eugene Slater, presiding bishop of the conference, will conduct the four day meeting.

The conference will open on Monday afternoon, May 22 and will conclude Thursday morning, May 25, with the reading of appointments.

Several important items of business will come before the conference, including balloting on a proposed merger of the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church, and voting on a resolution which would eliminate the last Central Jurisdiction (Negro) Methodist churches in the South Central Jurisdiction, of which this conference is a part. Delegates will also be selecting delegates to the 1968 General Conference of the Methodist Church in Dallas.

Bishop Earl G. Hunt, Jr., of Charlotte, N. C., will be the conference preacher. He is former president of Emory and Henry College at Emory, Va., and presides over 271,000 Methodists and 1,150 churches in the Western North Carolina Conference.

Bishop Hunt will speak four times during the conference.

Dr. Ronald E. Sleeth, professor of preaching at Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University, will speak twice during the conference.

This is the first time for the conference to meet in Abilene since 1963. It has met in Lubbock, Amarillo and in Dallas, (meeting jointly with all other Methodist conferences in Texas last year) since '63. Conference sessions will be in Radford Memorial Auditorium on the McMurry campus, with several special worship services at Aldersgate Methodist Church near the campus. Special meeting rooms for boards, commissions and committees will be set up in academic buildings on the campus.

Dr. Gordon R. Bennett, president of McMurry, will be the host layman. His staff at the college is working with conference officials in making arrangements.

The Central Jurisdiction vote deals with a resolution aimed at eliminating racial structure in the Methodist Church. The resolution was adopted by the General Conference of the church in special session November 10 in Chicago. It will be effective upon ratification of the various conferences by a two-thirds vote. The Negro churches of the Central Jurisdiction have already been merged into other existing conferences in most areas. The year 1972 is the target date for completion of all mergers. There are only five of the Negro churches within the boundaries of the Northwest Texas Conference.

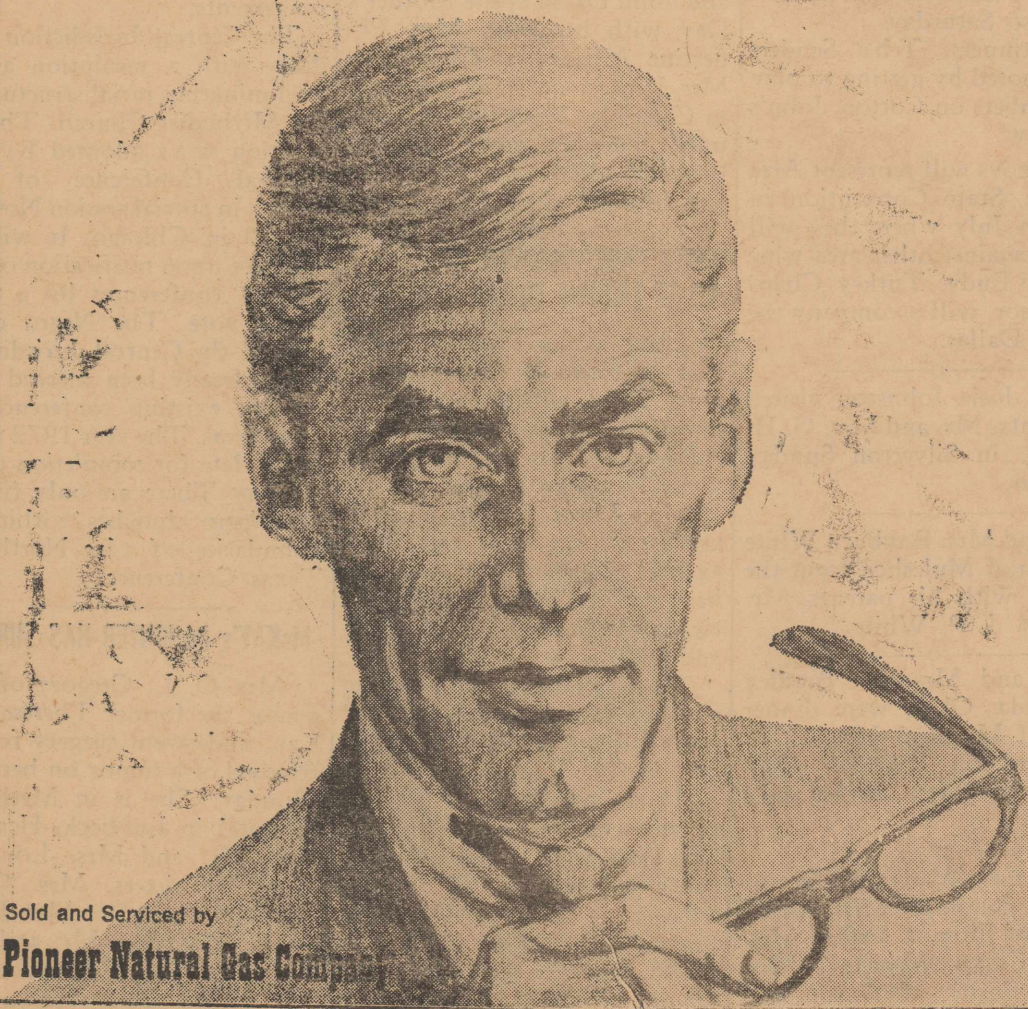

AUSTIN — The state Senate has passed a resolution honoring Mr. and Mrs. Loran Denton and members of the Turkey High School boys tennis team who were recent visitors at the Capitol.

Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon sponsored the resolution.

The resolution extended an "official welcome" to the visitors from the senators. The resolution will become a part of the official records for the 60th Legislature. It was signed by

Preston Smith, president of the Senate and lieutenant governor of Texas.

TWO HIGHTOWER-SPONSORED BILLS APPROVED BY LEGISLATURE

AUSTIN — The legislature has approved two bills by Senator Jack Hightower, Vernon, outlining administrative requirements for soil and water conservation districts.

Both proposals were sent to Governor John Connally for final approval.

Senate Bill 153 requires bonding of all district supervisors and employees, and provides for audits of district accounts every two years.

It also requires boards of directors of soil and water conservation districts to keep records of all official proceedings.

Senate Bill 152 defines requirements for changing district boundaries and lists procedures for filling vacancies on district supervisory boards.

The bills were amended as to go into effect immediately upon final passage.

HIGHTOWER VOTES FOR TEACHER PAY RAISE

AUSTIN — Senator Jack Hightower cast his vote with the Senate majority last week in approving a \$55 million teacher pay raise.

The proposed raise was incorporated in a \$2.4 billion, one year spending bill to finance state governmental machinery for 1968. The budget was sent to the House.

Although the Senate spending bill is \$12.7 over appropriated income from taxes and other revenue, Senate leaders were confident there would be a revised budget estimate which would allow certification of the bill.

A pay-as-you-go provision in the state Constitution prohibits appropriations in excess of projected income estimates.

The Senate proposal provides teachers with an average pay

increase of \$635 for next year, somewhat short of the goal of the Texas State Teachers Association.

Senators also approved an amendment to the spending bill which would provide a \$700,000 boost in old age assistance. The proposal would increase average payments from \$62 to \$67 per month.

The Legislature has less than three weeks to work out an appropriations bill acceptable to both houses before the current session ends.

In other Senate action last week, Senator Hightower secured passage of a measure which would make it a criminal offense to jump bail.
