

TWO HIGHTOWER-SPONSORED BILLS APPROVED BY LEGISLATURE

AUSTIN — The legislature has approved two bills by Senator Jack Hightower, Vernon, outlining administrative requirenents for soil and water conseration districts.

Both proposals were sent to Governor John Connally for final approval.

Senate Bill 153 requires bonding of all district supervisors and employees, and prorides for audits of district acounts every two years.

It also requires boards of diectors of soil and water conervation districts to keep records of all official proceedings.

Senate Bill 152 defines reuirements for changing disrict boundaries and lists proedures for filling vacancies on listrict supervisory boards.

The bills were amended as to o into effect immediately upon inal passage.

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
