Changes In Diverted Acreage Rules Has Been Announced This Week

R. T. Price, State Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, announced that rules covering the designation of diverted acres have been made, he has been informed by the AS-C in Washington.

Because of bad weather some producers have planted and replanted cotton and feed grains without getting a satisfactory stand. The failure of the crop is due to abnormal weather conditions. Apparently, some growers have used chemicals for weed control that have left a residue which makes it impractical to devote the land to other crops such as soybeans for harvest this year. Because of this problem some producers now want to designate as diverted acreage the land planted to cotton or feed grains which have failed. This would permit the land initially intended as diverted acreage which is free of chemical residue to be used

Ray Doyle was rushed to Lockney General Hospital following the accident, then was transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, where he remained until Sunday.



RELEASE OF \$148 MILLION IN RURAL LOAN FUNDS APPROVED

The Farmers Home Administration has been authorized to insure an additional \$148 million of rural loans according to word received by L. J. Cappleman, Farmers Home Administration Texas State Director.

This action, announced in Washington by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, will enable USDA's Farmers Home Administration to commit an additional \$30 million in Farm Ownership Loans and \$118 million in Rural Housing loans to low income and moderate income families.

Previous allocations of funds for Farm Ownership loans were exhausted in February. There are some 20,000 applications and unfunded loan dockets currently being held by the Farmers Home Administration.

Funds for Rural Housing loan were exhausted in April. The Farmers Home Administration is now holding some 42,000 applications and unfunded loan dockets for Rural Housing loans.

Both the funds for Farm Ownership and Rural Housing loans are being made available immediately.

Farm Ownership loans are made to buy land, construct or repair buildings, improve land and refinance debts. They are repayable over 40 years and bear 5 percent interest.

Rural Housing loans are made to farmers and other rural residents in open country and small rural communities with popu-

lations of not more than 5,500. Loans are made to construct and repair needed homes and essential farm buildings, purchase homes or buy sites on which to build homes. The maximum term is 33 years. The interest rate on loans to families with low and moderate incomes is 5 percent.

Farmers Home Administration services are made available through more than 1,600 county offices serving the 3,000 rural counties in the United States, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

The county office for Briscoe County is located at the Courthouse in Silverton. The county supervisor is Donald B. Cruce. Office hours from 9:00 to 12:00 a. m. every Tuesday. Mr. Cruce will be glad to discuss the Farmers Home Administration loan programs with interested individuals.



NOTES FROM THE OFFICE OF THE BRISCOE COUNTY AGENT

POPCORN FOR CATTLE

Cattle eating popcorn? Ridiculous. Maybe this idea isn't as farfetched as it sounds. The latest method of preparing grains to increase feedlot cattle gains involves popping sorghum grain. Not enough research has been conducted to form any conclusions, but this method may improve cattle gains, says Briscoe County Agent Ken Cook.

Such methods as grinding, steam-rolling, pressure cooking, flaking and reconstituting grain in air-tight silos have significantly increased gains in feedlot cattle.

The county agent says that the increasing interest in rations for cattle has been caused by the

rise in number of marketed Texas feedlot cattle. Five percent of the marketed cattle in the state in 1955 came from feedlots. In 1960 the number represented 11 percent, and in 1966 more than 25 percent of the cattle came from feedlots.

A new leaflet, L-697, "Rations for Growing and Finishing Cattle," is available at the County Agents office listing information for using protein supplements, roughage, additives and minerals in rations.

County Agent Cook says that the system of starting cat-

tle and feeding until slaughter on all grain, grain and a protein supplement or all concentrate with no roughage has been practiced by some feeders and is presently being studied at Texas A & M University. He added that feed per 100 pounds of gain is reduced considerably, thus lowering production costs, but the risk of higher death losses, founder, liver abscesses, rumen ulcers and slaughter price dock are some of the areas that need further study before definite recommendations can be made.
