It was feared at first that his back was broken also, but the doctors have been unable to determine the extent of injury to his back and cannot determine definitely until a side x-ray can be made.

Pioneer Asks Increase In Natural Gas Rates

The Pioneer Natural Gas Company has requested the City of Quitaque to grant the company an increase in gas rates, according to local manager James Cathey.

According to a news release by the gas company, the adjustment being requested at this time in the General Service Rate is the same as that being requested in all of the fifty-five (55) towns which comprise the West Texas Distribution System. Pioneer including Plainview, Lubbock, Midland and Odessa. The distribution plants serving the fifty-five towns in the system are operated as a unit providing economies not available to independent operation. Historically, since 1927 when natural gas service was first brought to the area, a system-wide rate has been used in these towns. The company does not plan to change the rates for industrial or irrigation service.

Pioneer states that it is necessary to request a higher General Service Rate for the West Texas Distribution System, as because revenues are not now sufficient under the present rate which has been in effect for more than six years. The revenue provided by the present rate does not yield the company a reasonable return on its

investment. It is vitally important that the company be allowed to earn a reasonable return to enable it to attract necessary capital and adequately meet the needs of its service area, according to the news release by the company.

The last General Service Rate adjustment was effective January 28, 1961, to produce a 10 percent increase in gross revenue. The higher field cost of gas contributed heavily to the need for that increase. This request for an increase in the General Service Rate is primarily attributable to the increase which has been experienced in labor, materials, general taxes, and other operating costs.

Operating and maintenance expenses and general taxes per customer have increased in the last five years from \$34.28 per customer in 1961 to \$40.15 per customer in 1966—an increase of \$5.87 per customer or 17.1%.

The distribution system investment per customer has increased during this same period from \$160.29 in 1961 to \$180.31 in 1966—an increase of \$20.02 per customer or 12.5 percent.

The requested General Service Rate would result in an increase of 11.5 percent to those customers served under this rate.

The company's requested rate will produce an increase of \$1,378,771 on an annual basis which is substantially less than the gross deficiency of \$2,164,158 reported by the firm of H. Zinder & Associates, Inc. for the West Texas Distribution system. Out of the \$1,378,771 Pioneer must pay additional City Franchise, State Griss Receipts and Federal Income Taxes totalling \$685,342.

The requested rate distributes as uniformly as possible the requested increase through the various rate brackets, although the increase in the minimum bill will be slightly higher in recognition of the fixed costs which are necessary to maintain a meter service whether gas is consumed in small or large quantities.

The present average annual domestic bill is \$74.64. The average annual domestic bill at requested rate will be \$83.25. The average increase (annual) would be \$8.61; the average increase (monthly) would be 72¢.

Even after the increase, according to the company's news release, the net operating income of the West Texas Distribution System would result in a rate of return lower than the 6½ percent allowed Pioneer in 1963 in a proceeding before the Railroad Commission of Texas.


