THE ART OF UNMOLDING GELATIN



Do you avoid making a beautiful molded gelatin dessert or salad because you dread unmolding it? If so, these tips developed by the makers of Jell-O Gelatin will give you the confidence you need. It just takes a little practice-

Make certain the gelatin is completely firm. It should not feel sticky on top and should not sag toward the side if the mold is

If gelatin is firm, dip a small pointed knife in warm water and run the tip of it around the edge of the gelatin. (1) Moisten the top of the gelatin and a chilled plate with cold water—the moist surfaces make it easy to slide the gelatin into

the center of the plate after it has been unmolded. Dip the mold in warm (not hot) water just to the rim—about 10 seconds. Lift from water, hold upright, and shake slightly to loosen gelatin from the mold. (2)

Invert moistened plate on mold. Then invert plate and mold together. Carefully lift off mold. (If gelatin doesn't release easily, dip mold in warm water again.) If necessary, move gelatin to

Garage getting you down? If your garage is good for nothing — including the family car — organize a family clean-up team and see how effective a

1. Be daring with your throwaway operation. You'll be surprised how many products you intended to use are too old to be efficient or have evaporated in cans or bottles.
