

Because aluminum has the highest heat conductivity of any metal commonly used for cookware, any aluminun: uten-sil will take the heat from a small alcohol or butane stove and spread it evenly and rapidly, giving you better cocking with less fuel.

#### Home-Grown Dipper



Just as in the early days of this country, Richard uses a dipper gourd to take a drink from an outdoor faucet. He grew gourd and carved the dipper after harvesting and drying

The first thing that Richard put next to his suitcase to take along with him to camp was his gourd dipper. Why? For one reason, because he grew it from a seed, carved it himself and is proud of it. For another, it is so light in weight that he can carry it on hikes and drink

from any well or faucet. Instead of holding just a little water like a folding drinking cup, it holds a lot and allows him a long, cool drink. Then he can pour cold water over his hands and refresh himself. If necessary, he can also use the dipper as a small

The gourd from which Richard's dipper is made is one of many he grew from a packet of seeds of mixed gourds. Richard says that gourd seeds need to be planted in a sunny place where soil is good and vines will have support to climb. He grew his gourds He watered the plants when

the weather was dry and fer-tilized them once a month. After the first frost he cut the big gourds with 2 inches of stem left on each. Then he hung them by tying a piece of string to each stem and the stems to a piece of clothes line strung across the attic.

Since cutting into gourds be-fore they are throughly dry is easier, Richard carved his while still slightly soft to touch. He scraped the seeds from inside the gourd, sanded the inner walls smooth, scrubbed the insides, and drilled a hole through the neck so he could hang his dipper. How would you like to grow a

#### MAKE PLANS NOW FOR FERTILIZING WHEAT

The time is once again approaching to consider plans for fertilizing wheat to be planted

Since most soils vary in their ability to supply plant nutrients, the most logical starting point for determining fertilizer needs is the soil test.

By sampling early, the report will be received in time for making the final decision as to what kind and how much fertilizer to apply.

Nitrogen is the fertilizer However, such factors as the Hale and Swisher Counties. amount and stage of decomposition of previous crop resisoil, ability to irrigate adequategen need of the crop.

the time of nitrogen application dist Church in Lockney. is of little importance. However, when wheat is to be grazed., all or part of the nitrogen stimulate early growth. Adequately fertilized wheat forage can contain 20 per cent protein or 3 per cent nitogen on a dry

Insufficient phosphorus can also limit production. Profitable response has long been evident on many of the sandy and mixed land soils. Yield increases have also been noted on Pullman soils shown to be deficient by soil testing.

Since phosphorus does not

move appreciably with soil moisture, it must be placed in the soil where it will be within reach of the permanent roots. Therefore, preplant application is recommended. Wheat plants utilize much of the phosphorus

when they are young. All wheat growers are urged to send in soil samples as soon as possible. Complete information on sample collection and mailing is available at the county agent's office.






