Mrs. Allie Tipps Buried Here This Week

Funeral services for Mrs. Allie V. Tipps were held at the First Methodist Church here Tuesday at 10:30 a. m. with Dr. Jordan Grooms, superintendent of the Brownfield District of the Methodist Church, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. Phillip Lopes, pastor of the Quitaque Methodist Church.

Burial was in Rest Haven Cemetery. Mrs. Tipps was a long time member of the Methodist Church here.

Mrs. Tipps, 90, died at St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo Sunday night following an illness of several months.

Pallbearers were sons Rucker, Kelly, Red and Chunk Tipps, and grandsons Robert Hamilton, Tim Hamilton, Bill Gram and Stephen Tipps.

Mrs. Tipps was born Dec. 5, 1876 in Denton County, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Rucker.

Mrs. Tipps husband died on Jan. 30, 1924. Three of her children were already living here at Quitaque, and in Nov. of 1925, she and the other members of the family moved to Quitaque.

Mrs. Tipps lived in Wichita Falls for a number of years, in Amarillo for several years and the past four years Mrs. Tipps had made her home at Kings Manor at Hereford.

Survivors include five sons, O. R. and Rucker of Wichita Falls, Kelly of Denver, Colo., Thomas, Seattle, Washington, Robert of Denver City; four daughters, Mrs. N. V. Hamilton of Quitaque, Mrs. P. C. Hamilton of Pierre, S. D., Mrs. W. T. Graham and Mrs. W. N. Weatherwax of Amarillo; one brother, C. T. Rucker of Quitaque; 20 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

All of Mrs. Tipps' children were present with the exception of Mrs. P. C. Hamilton and they were enroute here for the funeral, only to wreck their automobile at Valentine, Neb. According to reports received here, Mrs. Hamilton received the more serious injuries but it was also reported that the Hamiltons were back at Pierre.

New Traffic Laws Effective Monday

DALLAS, Aug. 23 — A new set of ground rules for the state's 5½ million licensed drivers will go into effect August 28 when a major portion of the new traffic safety laws become effective. After that date, conviction of driving while a driver's license is suspended or evoked will carry with it a jail sentence of 72 hours to 6 months plus a fine of \$25 to \$500.00.

Motorists who do not bother to get a driver's license will be faced with fines up to \$500 plus the possibility of jail sentences ranging from 72 hours to 6 months for habitual violators.

"These are the teeth in the driver license law that have been needed for a long time," Robert F. Miller, President, Texans for Traffic Safety said in commenting on the new laws. He added: "A person who is unwilling to be licensed or drives while his license is suspended deserves severe treatment. The safety of all other users of the streets and highways demand it. Without effective licensing, how can we be sure that motorists are capable of operating a motor vehicle?"

New minimum driver licensing ages will become effective August 28. After Monday, 18 years will be the minimum age for a regular drivers license unless an approved course of driver education has been passed by the applicant. With driver education, operators licenses can be issued at 16.

There are two exceptions to this provision. A license may be issued at 16 if an approved course of driver education is not taught at the school regularly attended by the applicant. This exception was put into the law to give the schools an opportunity to offer driver education to all Texas teens and will remain in effect until June 1, 1969. A drivers license may be issued at 15 when certain, severe hardship conditions exist.

An instruction permit may be issued by the Department of Public Safety to persons 15 years of age who have satisfactorily completed the classroom phase of an approved driver education course and have passed all but the 'behind the wheel' part of the driver license examination. This provision is in the law to permit the beginning driver to legally get "behind the wheel" driver training. When a driver with an instruction permit is driving, a licensed operator who is at least 21 years old must accompany and sit beside him.

The new law makes changes in other types of driver licenses. Minimum age for a commercial or chauffeur's license will be 18 unless the applicant has completed an approved driver education course and in that case it will be 17.

Provisional drivers licenses will be issued to all persons under 21 years of age. These licenses will be clearly designated as provisional permits to drive.

The new law permits the Department of Public Safety to have re-examined any person believed to be incapable of safely operating a motor vehicle. A drivers license may be denied to a person with a physical or mental disability, or disease, that prevents him from

All students enrolling in the first grade this year will need to bring a certified copy or a photostatic copy of his or her birth record, Supt. Herman Moseley has announced.

If the parents do not have a certified or photostatic copy of their child's birth record Mr. Moseley said that a copy probably could be obtained by writing to the county seat town where he child was born. A baptismal record will be acceptable when properly signed by church officials, provided a copy of the original birth record cannot be obtained, he said.

If the parents have an original birth certificate, they may bring it to the school where a copy will be made and the original will be returned to the parents. This record of birth becomes a part of the school's pupil accounting system and must remain on file in the school's records.

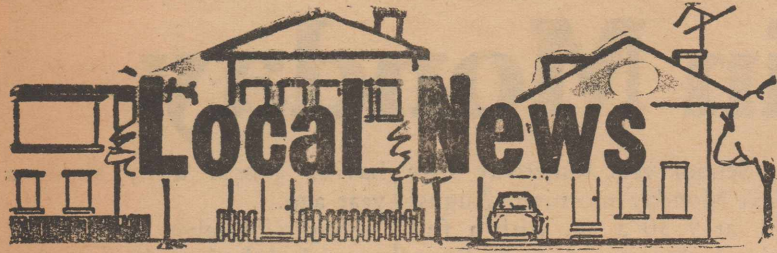

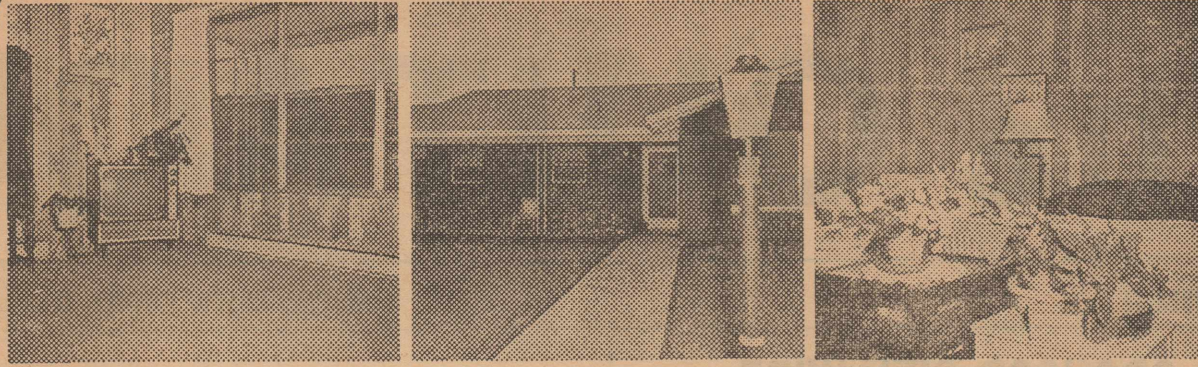
Increased sorghumage activity is now occurring in Briscoe County. Based upon survey records this is probably the 3rd generation produced from the sorghum.

It is very likely that most grain sorghum which blooms from now on will suffer some degree of midge damage. In view of the critical timing involved in midge control and the severe yield loss which can result from midge infestations, I suggest producers that have late planted sorghum watch after 70 percent of their heads have emerged from the boot for possible infestations. An application of a chemical should be made 3 to 4 days later.

Midge can migrate into a field and complete their egg laying in 24 hours or less. In

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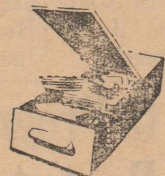

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:

"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services or the operation of such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital districts; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity

other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, or support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, any municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, and support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units and clinics and related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

department, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

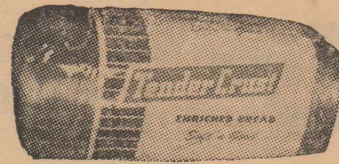
