Lemon Velvet and Frozen Tutti-Frutti, both made with Pet Evaporated Milk, whipped so it triples in volume, are tempt-ingly cool and tangy. They are quick and easy treasures for livening the dessert scene at your house. LEMON VELVET

- 3-oz. pkg. lemon gelatin 11/2 cups boiling water
- ²/₃ cup PET Evaporated Milk (1 small can)
- Tablesp. sugar
- 2 Tablesp. lemon juice
- 1/2 cup graham cracker crumbs 1 Tablesp. melted butter or margarine

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water in a 1½-quart bowl. Chill until thick, but not firm. Chill evaporated milk in ice tray until almost frozen at edges.
