

They did not plan to stay here but had intended to go back to Fisher County when conditions improved there. However, we went to work for O. W. Stroup and stayed there four years. then moved to his present location southeast of town and said that he hadn't been out of a job since that time. Mr. Helms and Jim Stroup, who was just a small boy when the Helms arrived here, took Monday afternoon off and visited several cemeteries here in this area where the old timers of this community are sleeping, and stirred up a lot of fond memories that have happened in the past 50 years.

The largest single rain in several years fell in the early morning hours Monday and was accompanied by brilliant lightning and thunder.

More than $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches fell in spots north of town and here in town gauges caught around 31/2 inches. The gauge in the Owens' back yard measured 3.4.

Cecil Price, out north of town received 4.6 inches and lightning also knocked 15-inch long slab off their kitchen cabinet and burned out a number of fuses. West of town Jim Stroup reported only 2 inches but the downpour washed out several watergaps. South of town about ten miles, little if any rain fell and Flomot was reported to have received no rain. Bill Helms reported 1.1. and Joe Edd Helms received .9. Turkey reported to have received about two inches. Some terraces were broken and fields washed considerably because the rain fell so fast.

The power was off for around and hour and a half following the storm. Some hail was reported to have fallen southwest of Silverton but no hail reports were received at The Tribune.

Buster Chadwick reported that Lake Theo received about two and one half to three feet of water from the runoff.






