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## Basketball Teams Split Games With Wellington

Quitauque's Panthers and Pantherettes drove over to Wellington Tuesday night of this week to resume basketball activities after the two weeks of holidays. Contrary to the report of one of the area daily newspapers, the Pantherettes won their game by a two-point margin, 39-37. The Panthers lost by 4 points to the Wellington crew 45-49. The Pantherettes remain unbeaten with a 17-0 record while the Panthers are now 12-4 for the season.

Sherry Stark, with 14 points, was high point maker for the Pantherettes, closely followed by Carol Myers with 13. Jackie Cheatham and Barbara Chandler each canned 6 points. As the low scoring indicated, the Pantherettes were not hitting at all. The score during the game was tied at the end of each quarter and at halftime.

The Panthers, who won a 76-70 game here before Christmas over

the Rockets, were also a bit rusty following the two weeks layoff.

Lyn Payne, with 13 points, was high point man for the Panthers. Jimmy Pointer scored 12 points, Johnny Pointer canned 9, Roland Hamilton made 6, Pablo Leal 4, David Brunson 3, and Stan Price 2.

The local teams are entered in the Wellington Tournament, then next Tuesday night district play gets underway when the Panthers and Pantherettes drive over to Flomot to start district warfare.

The Flomot teams, under the coaching of former McAdoo great George Scott, have come up with their strongest teams in a number of years, and might have more than the Quitauque teams can handle unless the locals are pretty sharp. They should be good, close games. On Friday of next week the locals go to Turkey and over there this year the Turkettes are making threatening noises and have indicated that they will have a say in the district this year. At Memphis last Saturday night in finals of that tournament, the Turkettes pushed the Estelline Bearettes right down to the final buzzer before going down by a 4-point margin.

So, the action is pickin up and the play is for keeps from now on as conference warfare begins.

### WIFE OF FORMER PRESIDENT OF WAYLAND COLLEGE DIES

Mrs. G. W. McDonald, 84, a former instructor at Wayland Baptist College and wife of the late G. W. McDonald, fifth president of Wayland Baptist College from 1924 until 1947, died last week in a San Angelo hospital where she had been since 1961.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Friday of last week, December 29 in Plainview First Baptist Church. Burial was in Plainview Cemetery with Lemons Funeral Home in charge.

Mrs. McDonald was born Tonie Hemphill Oct. 4, 1883 in Hemphill County near Bastrop. She married Dr. G. W. McDonald in 1908. He died in September of 1961.

The McDonalds came to Plainview in 1918, he to teach mathematics at Wayland and she to serve as director of Wayland Academy. Dr. McDonald served as President Emeritus from 1947 until 1961.

Mrs. McDonald is survived by two sons, Dr. Donald McDonald of Abilene and Melvern McDonald of Odessa.

### Marion Bruce Announces For Representative

Marion Bruce of Randall County this week announced his candidacy in the Democratic Primary as State Representative from the 75th District.

Bruce is a native of Randall County, where he was born in 1912 and where he still lives just outside the city limits of Amarillo.

He served as Lieutenant-Governor of Kiwanis International in 1961 and is a member of the Legion of Merit (25 years of perfect attendance).

He became a member of the Randall County School Board in 1946, when his name was written in while he was attending the Plainview Dairy Show, which he later served as president. During the same time he served on the Tax Equalization Board for the Canyon Independent School District.

Bruce is chairman of the Citizens' Group Work and Recreation Council, Potter Randall Citizens Committee, and has been a Council member since 1956, when its work brought a sharp decrease in juvenile delinquency in the metropolitan area while the national rate was rapidly increasing.

He served as the first president of Friends of Youth, which works with the Potter County Court of Domestic Relations, and which brought about the formation of the Amarillo Big Brothers. He has been a Kids, Inc. coach and leader in establishing other youth recreation programs. He served as president of the Amarillo Community Center Board during a period of expansion of its program. He has been a worker in the United Fund and other civic and philanthropic drives. He has been a member of the First Baptist Church of Amarillo since boyhood.

Bruce has been a Milking Short-horn breeder since 1936 and is a qualified judge of the breed, having judged fairs in most of the Western States, including the Texas State Fair in Dallas and the Kansas and Idaho State Fairs.

Bruce, a long time worker in the Democratic Party, is presently Chairman of the Randall County Democratic Executive Committee, a post to which he was re-elected in 1966 without opposition. He directed the 18th Congressional District Democratic campaign in 1956, and headed the Party headquarters again in 1962.

He has been a Randall County Delegate to all Texas State Conventions since 1956, and attended the National Conventions of 1960 and 1964.

"I believe I am qualified to serve the interests of all citizens of the 75th District—urban and rural—for I have faced the same problems they have," he said.

"A farmer stockman who survived the '30s and the droughts of the '50s learned every farm problem. And I have lived in a metropolitan community that nearly tripled its population in the last 15 years. In such a community,

District Attorney John B. Stapleton of Floydada this week announced his candidacy for re-election as District Attorney of the 110th Judicial District. Stapleton is a Democrat, and his candidacy is subject to the action of the Democratic Primary May 4, 1968. The district is made up of Dickens, Motley, Floyd and Briscoe Counties.

Stapleton was reared at Lockney and has made his home at Floydada for thirty years. Prior to his election as District Attorney, he served two terms as County Attorney of Floyd County. He was elected District Attorney in 1946 right after returning from four years' service in the Army in World War Two and has served in the office ever since.

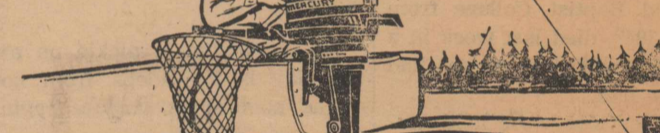
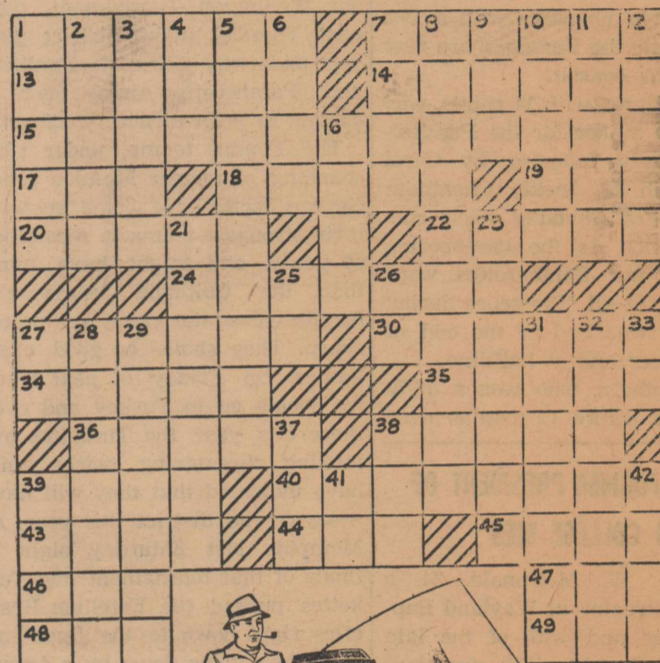

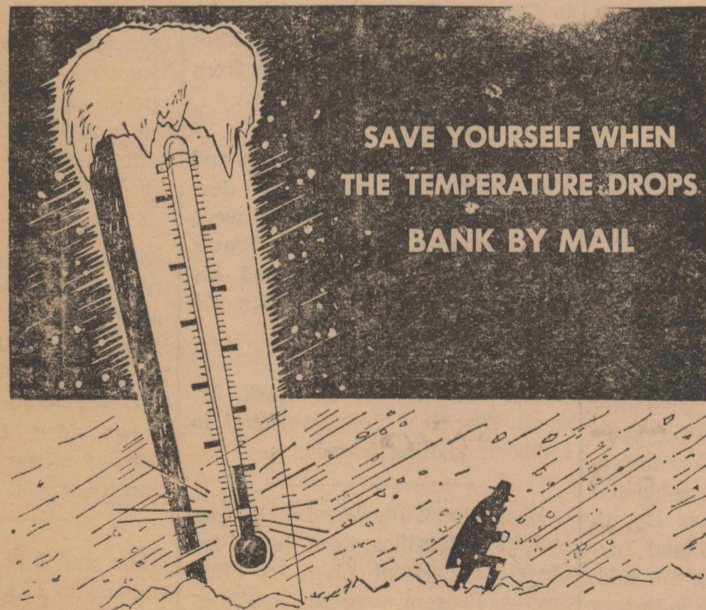

**OUR HEALTH** By J. M. Amberson, M.D.  **OUTLOOK FOR DIABETES PREVENTION HOPEFUL** The outlook for preventing diabetes has never looked more hopeful than it does today, according to Dr. Theodore Schwartz, chairman of the department of endocrinology and metabolism, Presbyterian-St. Luke's Hospital, Chicago. Among the important research clues which have recently come to light are: 1. There is growing evidence that many diabetics may not be deficient in insulin as now supposed. Instead have an "antagonist" in their system which destroys or neutralizes the body's normal output. If this proves true and the antagonist can be controlled, then the body's normal production of the hormone would be sufficient to handle the metabolism of the sugars in our food. 2. There appears to be a pre-diabetes state which can be detected with sensitive tests. Should this be confirmed, it might then be possible to postpone or prevent the onset of the symptoms of the disease. 3. Diabetes investigators now believe that the pancreas may not be the only producer of insulin in the body. A substance behaving much like insulin has been found to be produced by the thymus gland, located beneath the breast bone. 4. The prospect for transplanting a healthy pancreas is favorable once the problem of tissue rejection is overcome. Several such transplants have already been successfully performed in animals. 5. Better understanding of the "genetic code" may some day make it possible to correct the hereditary defect responsible for diabetes. **HAS ANY PROGRESS BEEN MADE IN MAKING TOOTH EXTRACTIONS LESS PAINFUL?** Since the patient is anesthetized, it is not the extraction itself that is painful (uncomfortable yes, painful no) but the post-operative recovery that may be painful. A relatively new oral solution called Chloraseptic has been found to be quite effective in relieving tissue soreness after extraction. Your dentist may recommend this non-prescription anesthetic and advise you to keep it in contact with the wound for a few seconds (without swishing it around and thus disturbing it) and this disturbing it to avoid pain is to have any dental decay treated promptly so that extractions are not required.
