| Is Last Day To Register to Vote <br> With the dateline for registration only a few days away, Texas vot- ers over 60 years of age have been reminded of a new law which requires every voter to register, re- gardless of age or place of residence. Heretofore, voters over 60 years old were required to regis- ter only if they lived in a city of ten thousand or more inhabitants. Wednesday of next week, January 31 , is the last day to registration certificate <br> Texas Secretary of State John L. Hill issued the reminder in a statement summarizing registra tion requirements. As Secretary of State, Hill also has the title of chief election officer of Texas. He said that anyone who is now eligible to vote or who will become eligible by February 28,1969 , may register at this time. The 1968 voting year begins next March 1 and runs through February of 1969. <br> for most voters will registration <br> nesday of next week, and they will <br> not be permitted to register after that date.
