> registration certificate. Texas Secretary of State John L. Hill issued the reminder in a statement summarizing registration requirements. As Secretary of chief election officer of Texas. The law provides that applications by mail must bear a postmark not later than January 31. An application which is mailed too late to be postmarked on that date doss not comply with the law, even though it is deposited in a letter box or a post office drop box before he deadline. This reminder is especially important for patrons of small post offices, some of which close as early as 5 o'clock in the

Voters may also register in person at the county tax assessorcollector's office or at any of the registration substations which will be open for the remainder of the the registration period. Local residents may register at or send their applications to the City Hall here in Quitaque. James Brunson, who is in charge of local registration, says that his office will remain open until 8 p. m. next Wednesday, January 31, to give everyone a last minute chance to register.

The study was requested by resolution (H.S.-R. 37) adopted during the regular ession of the 60th Legislature.

The Texas Research League will also work on the project under terms of the resolution (S. R. 754)

NON-CROP WEED CONTROL CUTS ANNUAL WEED TAX



Any way you look at it, weeds cost money. Figures show weeds cost each grower in the United States an average of \$500 annually by decreasing yields, lowering crop quality, and causing extra cultivations, excessive wear on machinery and added expense for seed

While farmers are turning more and more to herbicides to beat the weed bite in croplands, many do not stop to think about the price they pay
