His resignation became effective March 15, and his family moved to Miami. He resigned at a regular meeting of the board of trustees, February 20.

The school board, meeting February 27, employed Tommy Wilson of Girard, to fill the vacancy. He worked last week with Mr. Sanders to become familiar with the position.

Regarding leaving Roaring Springs, Mr. Sanders said: "We have enjoyed living in Roaring Springs and the many pleasant friendships which we have acquired in the entire county. We will certainly miss the friendly people of Motley County when we leave."

Miss Gladys Stroup's part was "Group Member," and told of the deaf singing songs in the sign language.

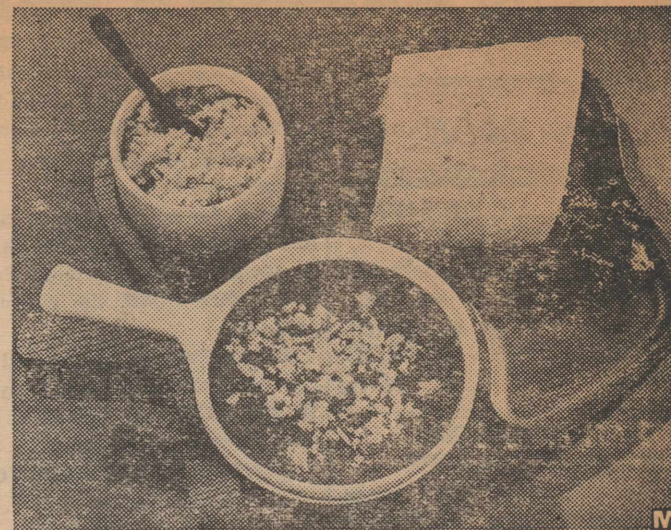

HOG CHOLERA VACCINE

For immunizing against hog cholera, give two doses of inactivated (killed) hog cholera vaccine 30 days apart, then a booster dose within a year. That is the present recommendation of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Recent field problems with inactivated vaccines prompted the Veterinary Biologies Division of

USDA to closely study of the safety and effectiveness of this type of vaccine. Screening tests showed that the 2-dose immunization with inactivated vaccine produces a higher level of protection than the single dose formerly recommended.

Swine vaccinated with inactivated hog cholera vaccine require a longer period of time to develop immunity than those vaccinated with modified live virus vaccine, the tests showed.

Formerly when swine received only one dose of inactivated vaccine USDA recommended a 21-day period free from exposure to possible sources of cholera virus. Now the recommendation says that pigs treated with two doses of inactivated vaccine be kept free from sources of possible infection until after the second dose. Exposure, of course, should always be avoided if possible.

Project Transition Aids Returning Veterans

MORE THAN GOLD AT FORT KNOX

FORT KNOX — An oil company joined the army here late last year. Now it is about ready to re-enlist. Humble Oil & Refining Company signed up for an initial 90-day hitch in Project Transition, an effort to provide greater opportunity for men who are nearly ready to return to civilian life.

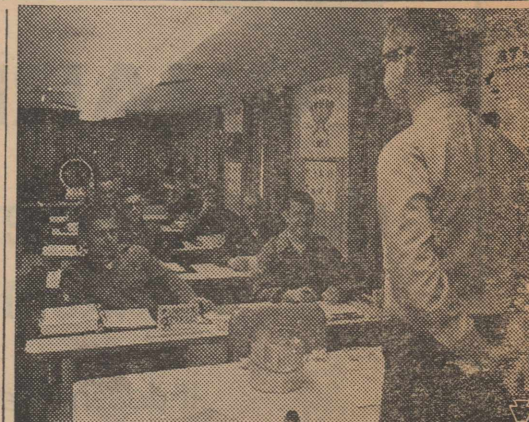
The project is a blending of industry needs with military concern for the future of the approximately 750,000 soldiers, sailors, marines and airmen who will end their enlistments and be discharged from military service this year. According to the Defense Department, as many as 55 per cent of the 750,000 should receive some type of training or retraining to aid their return to the civilian economy.

To explore methods of providing assistance on such a massive scale, the department began Project Transition at Fort Knox last year, and turned to private industry for cooperation when that seemed the best approach. Humble, largest U.S. oil refiner and marketer, volunteered to conduct the first pilot program by private industry.

Rolling a trailer classroom onto the military reservation, the company set up a dealer training school with the same comprehensive course of instruction that its new dealers and service-station managers receive at 55 similar Humble schools throughout the country.

The oil company's training course and one conducted by the U.S. Post Office Department were the first two programs in Project Transition, which will be operating at dozens of army, navy, marine and air force bases before the year is over.

At Humble's dealer school, seventeen soldiers are spending half of most days, during their last three months in uniform, studying textbooks and listening to lectures on such subjects as merchandising and sales promotion; product quality; engine upkeep and repair; accounting, credit and maintenance of inventories; lubrication methods, and fundamentals of driveway service. Sometimes the soldier-students travel in buses to Humble's training station in near-

by Louisville for on-the-job experience. With space in the mobile classroom limited, half of the men go to school in the morning and the rest attend afternoon classes. They spend the rest of each day at their regular military duties.

Nine of the trainees are Vietnam veterans. All seventeen asked to take the pilot course, which covers a period of about three months. Advance army screening indicated their ability to handle the required subjects.

The class members are from eleven states. When they have completed the training, Humble will send letters of introduction for the students to its district marketing managers in the areas where the veterans will live after leaving the army.

A record of the company training the men have received will accompany the letters. Through Project Transition, while they are still in uniform, the trainees will be well on their way toward becoming independent dealers or service-station managers — a field where the demand far exceeds the supply of trained and competent people.

Although the original period for which Humble signed up is nearly over, the company doesn't consider its enlistment ended. Instead, it is making plans to conduct similar dealer training programs at several other military installations.

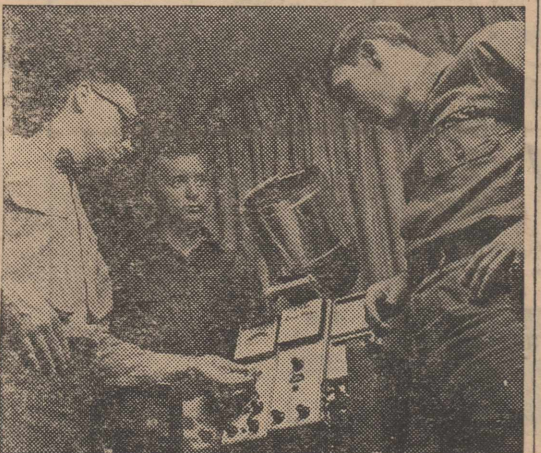
Humble reports a high degree of enthusiasm and concentration on their studies among members of the pilot class. As for the soldier-students, their comments make it appear that they want to put their new training to use as fast as possible.

Says Arthur Adams, one of the nine Vietnam veterans: "I think I can get ahead faster now when I get out. I'm going back to Chicago and go in business for myself. That's what I've always wanted."

Thomas Wedding, one of the six Kentucky men in the class, is already counting on operating a Humble station of his own.

"I live only a few miles from Fort Knox," he said, "and I want to get right into the business."

He gives credit to Project Transition for making it possible.
