NEW TECHNIQUES TO BE USED IN BOLL WEEVIL CONTROL PROGRAM

Several new techniques plus the continuation of an intensified spraying program will lead the way this year as the High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program enters its fourth year.

An informative meeting on this subject which should be of extreme interest to all Briscoe County cotton producers will be held at Quitaque on April 18, 1968, at 7:30 p. m., announces County Agricultural Agent Ken Cook. Principal speaker will be Lyndon Almand, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Almand will summarize the progress and results of the boll weevil control program during the past four years and will also discuss the use of sex attractants and sterile males as new techniques in controlling the boll weevils.

Sex attractants and sterile male boll weevils will be used in isolated tests this year to further develop means of eventually eradicating boll weevil populations, says the agent. These new techniques are designed to reduce populations by reducing the number of native weevils available for mating by mating these weevils to sterile males.

Cook emphasizes that these techniques can be effective only after a program of conventional spraying has been followed to reduce populations. They act as a "mop-up" operation.

Timely spraying is still the key to boll weevil control, stresses the county agent. And since the advent of the spray program, boll weevil populations have been reduced drastically in the control zone which consists of Briscoe, Hall, Floyd, Motley, Crosby, Dickens, Kent, and Garza Counties. More than 500,000 acres were sprayed last year and the program was again highly successful.

However, all is not a "bed of

roses," points out the agent. There has been an air of complacency among some cotton producers in the control zone which could "upset the entire applecart" and throw years of painstaking work right out the window. Continuous control is possible only through continuous spraying, and once the weevil is given a foothold, no matter how small, the situation could revert back to earlier years.

Last year's trash surveys showed the lowest number of overwintering adult weevils in the control zone since the advent of the program.

An intensified spraying program will be used again this year and all producers in the control zone are urged to cooperate. The spray program consists of two phases. Phase one consists of three applications of undiluted technical malathion at 12 ounces per acre at five-day intervals. This phase is designed to kill newly emerging adult females before they can mate and lay eggs that could produce potentially overwintering adults.

Phase two of the program calls for spraying to commence 10 days after the completion of the first phase. Applications consist of 16 ounces of malathion per acre at 10-day intervals until the first frost. Purpose of this phase, according to Cook, is to kill any adult weevils that might have emerged from eggs laid before phase one was begun and to kill any adults that might have survived the phase one sprayings.

The two phase spray program known as the High Plains Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program was begun in September, 1964, and is a cooperative venture of Texas A&M University, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. and Texas Department of Agriculture.

NEW VOTING LAWS EXPLAINED

Voters in the May primary who moved into the county on or after November 4, 1967, must vote between April 15 and April 30 in the office of the county clerk in the county of their present residence, according to information supplied by Bertha Pavlicek, County Clerk of Briscoe County.

A new law enacted last year permits voters with less than six months' residence in the county to vote on all statewide offices and issues if they have lived in the state longer than one year, but they must vote in the county clerk's office under processes similar to absentee voting. The new law puts into effect a constitutional amendment adopted in November, 1966.

Formerly, a person who moved from one county to another within the state was totally disfranchised for the first six months after he moved, unless one or more of the various types of districts (congressional, legislative, judicial, etc.) included both the county of his former residence and the county of his

The new law preserves the voting rights which existed under the old law, but the procedure for voting has changed. Heretofore, a person entitled to vote on the basis of six months' residence in a district voted on an election day at the regular polling place for the voting precinct of his new residence. Under the new law, no one who has resided in the county less than six months may vote at a regular polling place, and all voting by such persons must be done through the county clerk's office. The voter must appear in person at the clerk's office between the twentieth day and the fourth day preceding the election unless he is unable to appear because of sickness or physical disability or unless he is absent from the county during that period. Sick or disabled voters and those temporarily absent from the county may obtain a ballot by mail.

The Briscoe County Clerk's office will be open for absentee voting during the period of absentee voting, April 15 through April 30, from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m., Mondays through Fridays, but will be closed on Saturdays.
