Gail Tyler, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grady L. Tyler, has completed GA work for the Queen Step.

Forward Steps in GA work were originated to provide missionary education or girls who want to do individual study and investigation.

Girls Auxiliary members have found them fascinating, thousands have felt the thrill of accomplishment as they have advanced from one step to another. Forward Steps requirements are not easy, they demand work, study, and determination. This in itself is a challenge to each girl that belongs to an auxiliary. The steps are Maiden, Lady In Waiting, Princess, Queen, Queen with a Scepter, and Queen Regnant.

At the end of the year an "honor and awarding service" for the Girls Auxiliary Forward Steps is held. It is called a "Coronation" only when there is a Queen or above to be recognized. Otherwise the service is called a "Presentation." Each year, I, as the Girls Auxiliary Director, and the Counselors have looked forward to the time when we would be able to have a Coronation, and that time has arrived. No one could possibly be prouder than we are of Gail Tyler, who has gone before the Reviewing Council and become Queen.

For Gail to become a Queen she had eleven requirements that she had to meet. Just to touch lightly some of the requirements, here are two of them: She chose one Gospel, read it, and outlined it, giving the chief events of Christ's life: Birth, Flight of Egypt, Visit to the Temple, Baptism, Temptations, Miracles, Public Ministry, Choosing and Training the Twelve Apostles, Transfiguration, Upper Room, Gethsemane, Trial, Crucifixion, Burial Resurrection, Ascension etc.). The second one requires the study of the Book of Acts, make her own outline of the chief events in the life of Paul.

Gail did all this on her own and without any outside help. She has done a very fine job in doing her steps. When the Coronation is held in September, more of what it takes to become a Queen will be demonstrated, and it will be understood why everyone is proud of what she has accomplished. She is the first girl to reach the Queen Step here in Quitaque.

All of the girls in GA work here are working on Forward Steps and all of them will climb one by the middle of August. There are four other girls striving to become a Queen before Coronation Time and we feel like they will accomplish this step. Everyone is very proud of the girls in both Auxiliaries.

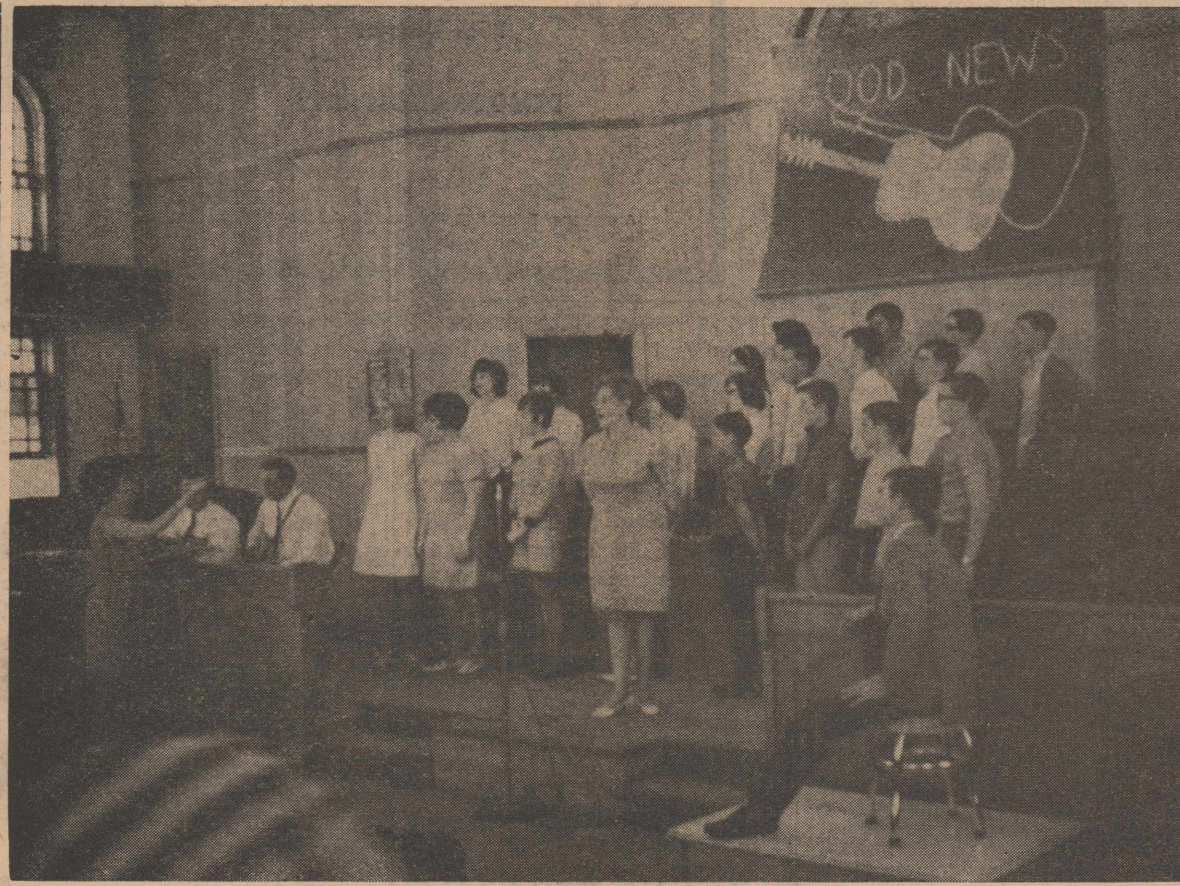

VOTING RULES ON CHANGE OF RESIDENCE

County Clerk Bertha Pavlicek has reminded new residents of Briscoe County they must vote in the County Clerk's office by Tuesday, April 30, 1968, if they wish to participate in either the Democratic primary or the Republican primary to be held on May 4.

Any person who has lived in the county less than six months (who became a resident after November 3, 1967) must vote in the Clerk's office during the period of April 15-30. He must be a registered voter either in this county or in the county of his former residence and must have lived in the state for a year. He will be required to present his registration certificate or to make an affidavit of its loss when he applies for a ballot.

A voter with less than 6 months' residence in the county will be able to vote on all statewide offices and on the referendum propositions on the primary ballot, and will also be able to vote on district offices for districts in which he has six months' residence preceding the election, but he will not be permitted to vote in local races.

Voters living in the county who have moved to a new precinct within the county will vote in the precinct of present residence, but will not need to transfer their registration.

The Briscoe County Clerk's office will be open for absentee voting during the period of absentee voting, April 15 through April 30, from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m., Mondays through Fridays, but will be closed on Saturdays.

Cotton Referendum To Be Held In May

A cotton referendum will be held from May 13 - 17, 1968 for the purpose of selling or leasing cotton to out-of-county residents. This referendum will again be conducted by mail for your convenience. All ballots must be in the county office by 5:00 p. m. May 17 or postmarked by midnight May 17 if returned by mail. Operators and owners of farms having a cotton allotment for 1968 are eligible to vote in this referendum. Of course, the wives of eligible voters are eligible to vote. Wives should sign their own given name and not their husband's given name.

If you are an eligible voter and do not receive a ballot in the mail, please come by the ASCS county office and secure one. This is a most important referendum. Don't fail to vote.

These are the issues. A "yes" vote will allow Briscoe County farmers to sell or lease their cotton to farmers residing in other counties. A "no" vote means that Briscoe farmers can not sell or lease their cotton to out-of-county farmers. Either way Briscoe farmers can sell or lease cotton to other farmers within this county.

The county committee will meet on May 22 at 9:00 a. m. in the ASCS office to tabulate the vote. All interested persons are invited to attend.

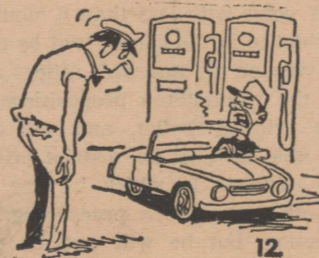

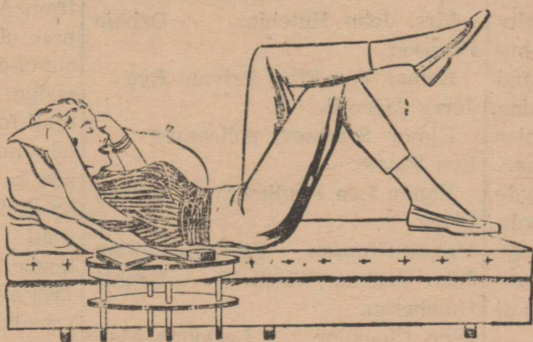
