Mr. Vardell died Friday morning at the Lockney General Hospital.

Born July 7, 1882, in Searcy, Arkansas, Mr. Vardell moved to Wise County, Texas, at an early age. There he met and married Miss Nellie Loudermilk on July 10, 1904. To this union were born 12 children, six girls and six boys.

The family moved from Wise County and settled in the Haylake community in Briscoe County in 1924, and Mr. Vardell was engaged in farming until 1933 when they moved to Silverton. They operated a laundry until 1956, when he retired because of ill health.

In 1964 he was preceded in death by his wife, Nellie, after more than 60 years of continual companionship.

He had been a member of the Baptist Church since 1902.

## G. R. COLVIN HOME DAMAGED BY FIRE MONDAY MORNING

The home of Mr. and Mrs. George Ray Colvin was severely damaged by fire Monday morning. The cause has not been determined.

Mr. Colvin told the Tribune staff it started in the area of the electric range in the kitchen and den combination. Mrs. Colvin had removed the cooking utensils from the stove and felt sure she turned off the burners. She had been outside about 30 minutes when she saw smoke issuing from the house. When she opened the door, the heat was intense.

A closet by the stove to hang coats and other articles in as you entered the door was completely consumed. Some of the upper cabinets were also consumed, and all the house was smoke damaged. A divan located across the

room was damaged so extensively it had to be destroyed.

Mr. Colvin said every metal window in that room, approximately 40 or 50, had to be replaced. All the wiring inside and where it entered the house had to be replaced. There are seven joists to be replaced and all the cabinets will have to be rebuilt. The refrigerator is still operating, although very smoke stained.

Mr. Colvin said he is having some men come from Lubbock to destroy the odor of the fire and to see what furniture can be cleaned and saved. He said everything is black and greasy.

The fire was discovered between 8:30 and 9:00 o'clock. Fire departments from Quitaque and Turkey assisted in extinguishing the fire. An approximate damage figure is \$3,000.00, but as the clothing and linens are washed and cleaned, it may be discovered they are more damaged than thought at first.

The Pantherettes had an open date last Friday night but the Pantherettes broke a five-game losing streak with a big win, possibly their biggest win of the season, a 61-54 victory over the Wayland College Queen Bees, and it was a well-earned victory.

The Pantherettes jumped out in front at the start and never were behind in the game, one time leading by 14 points. The Pantherettes played without the services of Neva Morrison, who had been starting at guard. She was ill that night. The Pantherettes played one of their better games of the season, and their three string forwards were hitting well.

Glenna Ramsey sparked the shooters with 28 points; Jackie Cheatham hit for 19; and Wanda Ramsey added 14 points.

The Pantherettes needed that win for they had lost six in a row and were becoming a bit discouraged.

Monday night of this week the QHS teams hosted the Springlake High teams and once again the Pantherettes lost, 64-74 and the Panthers won, 73-53.

Quitaque's "crackerbox" has witnessed some great games during its long history. Some low scoring games, some high scoring contests, such as the game a couple of years ago when Flomot and Quitaque poured in almost 200 points between them, another time saw the Pantherettes win a game by the unlikely score of 101-1; there have been some great individual performances: Mozelle (Carter) Hedrick once scored more than 50 points in a game, as did Janice (Dudley) Price. But as far as we personally know, two players had not scored 50 points in the same game—but fans saw it Monday night as Quitaque's Jackie Cheatham scored 50 points in a losing cause and Springlake's Vicki Gregory scored 56! It was quite a duel.

The Panthers, playing one of their better games after finally getting untracked, outclassed the Wolverines 73-53. That game saw the Panthers trail the visitors until 2:55 was gone in the second quarter, when they went ahead and from there it was a question of how much. Stanley Price hit for 22 points for the locals, Jerry Merrell scored 17 and Perry Brunson hit for 16 for the Panthers.

The QHS teams went to Hanby Tuesday night where the Pantherettes won and the Panthers lost their second game of the season. The scores and other information were not turned to The Tribune.

The QHS teams play Turkey there Tuesday night of next week, then will play in the annual Clarendon Tournament on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of next week.

**How To Make A Decorative Lantern**

Lamps, lanterns and lampshades are easily within the skills of the average hobbyist — and a most rewarding achievement for a woman who enjoys seeing the results of her own handiwork.

Whether for yourself or as a gift, whether made of materials you accumulate yourself or from a complete "kit", you'll have a lot of fun and save a lot of money making exciting and handsome items like these.

It is easily possible for instance to turn out a professional-looking jewel table lamp that costs around \$20.

One of the simpler lamp productions is a hanging decorative lantern. For this you need only a clear plastic cylinder about 5" across and 10 to 12" long.

You can even make your own cylinder by taking a sheet of heavy Poly-plastic and rolling it into a cylinder and gluing along the edge.

You'll need some heavy wire, a light socket, electric wire, a chain and a wall plug.

The wire is inserted into the cylinder across the opening 1" down from the top. The

holes can be made with a drill or a heated wire and the lamp socket attached to the center of the wires with a rubber grommet.

To decorate the cylinder, a supply of multi-colored Poly Glass chunks - broken to the size you like - are pasted over the entire surface of the cylinder with special Poly paste.

Instructions for the use of these materials are usually contained with the products. In the case of complete kits such as are offered by LeeWards, the instructions are quite detailed and easy to follow.

In general, we have found some good working tips for the handicrafter in this area which will help you organize your task and do a better job.

Set up a smooth table where your work will be uncluttered and where you can leave your work overnight to dry and "cure".

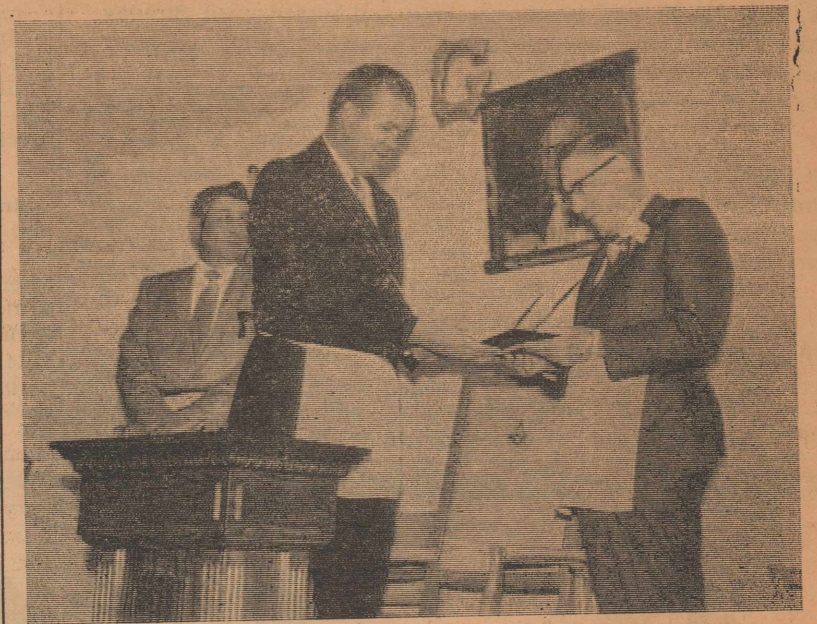
Be generous in spreading newspapers around work areas to protect surroundings. Keep hot water and borax handy for clean-up chores.

Have good tweezers as part of your equipment — they are better than fingers.

Use disposable tools when possible.
