Use Of Microfilm For Census

Will Save Taxpayers Millions

WASHINGTON - Important new microfilming procedures in the processing of the 1970 Census will make possible the most comprehensive and useful storehouse of information ever as-sembled by the Census Bureau, reports Karl Adams Jr. president of the National Microfilm Assn.

And, considering the volume of information and the cost involved, Americans will get more for their money -\$210 million - than ever before.

Adams, microfilm consultant from Weston, Mass., explained that by using microfilm to provide input to computers and to record their output, the Census Bureau will save of millions in personnel costs over the cost to process the same amount of data by previously used methods. Taxpayers benefit from having more sophisticated equipment able to do a better job of processing census data.

"A significant breakthrough in the handling of tremendous masses of information was the marriage. of microfilm to the computer. Next year every American will benefit by the development of devices that read data from microfilm:



The microfilm is fed to FOSDIC (Film Optical Sensing Device for Input to Computers) which scans each microfilm frame with a beam of light and converts the dots into magnetic code on computer tape. Six FOSDICs will operate around the clock for four months to transfer 50,000 rolls of microfilm onto 6500 reels of computer tape at the rate of 70,000 items of information per minute. In 1790 only about six items could be handled each minute.)

The computers, capable of processing 700,000 items of information each minute, output directly to microfilm (COM) at speeds up to 90,000 characters per second - about 30 times faster than data can be recorded by impact printers, the usual output recording devices which resemble high-speed typewriters.

To illustrate the data processing speedup since 1790, the Census Bureau compared clerks with pencils tabulating census data with the modern computer, and found that in terms of units of work, the modern computer performs the work of 14.000 clerks.

"Computer-outputmicrofilming is one of the latest developments in electronic data processing, and its use is growing at a fantastic rate," says Adams. He reports that a recent survey of its members by the National Microfilm Assn. indicates that by the end of 1970 there will be at least five times as many COM units in operation as there were at the beginning of 1969. Industry spokesmen predict as many as 12,000 COM recorders will be in use within five years.



on record, was based entirely on the moon. Since the actual duration of a moon month is approximately 291/2 days, the Babylonians alternated months of 29 and 30 days. Because the calculation of the lunar year was shorter than the sun year, after a few years winter was arriving in the spring - so the Babylonians added a 13th month every two or three years to keep winter in its proper place!

If you think 13 months a year is strange, one of the earliest Roman calendars was probably the most bizarre in history. The calendar con-sisted of 10 months, beginning in March and ending the December. The period be-tween December and March was considered of little importance because during those bleak winter months there was little activity. The Romans finally decided not to ignore the winter months, and added January and February to fill the gap.






