Wheat Referendum To Be Conducted By Mail July 27-31

Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin on July 1, 1970, proclaimed July 27-31 as the dates for a mail referendum on 1971crop wheat marketing quotas. By law, in the absence of new legislation, the 1971 wheat crop comes under the provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended. 
