NATIONAL FARM - CITY WEEK
 The period from November 20-26 is National Farm - City Week, and every citizen has a stake in its observance. Nowhere else in the world do so many depend on so few for their food and fiber needs.

The 5% of our population engaged in agricultural production gives the other 95% food and fiber unsurpassed anywhere. In 1969 we spent only 16.5% of our incomes for food as compared with 24% some 20 years ago and this despite the fact the producer is getting about nine cents less out of every food dollar than he received 20 years ago. Production expenses have continued to rise; thus, keeping the cost-price squeeze a major problem for agricultural producers.

Producers are continually searching for better and more efficient ways to keep the food and fiber lines filled. Today the U. S. farmer produces enough food and fiber for 45 people, about 39 at home and 6 abroad. A decade ago he supplied the agricultural need of only 24 people.

Other problems of common interest to farm and city residents are also cited by President Nixon in his Farm - City Week proclamation. He said, "With two-thirds of our population crowded onto only two percent of the land, many of our people are denied economic opportunities, adequate living space, health, cultural fulfillment, and those spiritual values without which no nation can achieve greatness. The time for action is at hand—for careful plans to be formulated, and for decisions to be made at local government levels, to foster the improved distribution of population and accompanying economic activity needed during the decade of the 1970's and beyond. The Government can provide assistance, but the effort will succeed only as Americans take part in developing a policy of sound national growth."

"In this effort, city dwellers and rural people alike have reason to work together toward common goals. The well-being of urban Americans and the welfare of rural America will increasingly intertwine as our total population expands. Better living in the one depends on better living in the other.

"I request the leaders of agricultural organizations, business groups, labor unions, youth and women's clubs, civic and fraternal associations, schools and others to join in noting not only the interdependent roles of the producers and consumers of America's

agricultural abundance but also their opportunities for cooperation in building for the future."

Farm - City Week observances in Texas will follow no set pattern but the objective of all will be the same—to help rural and urban residents understand each other's problems and further develop the appreciation each should have for the other.

FACT SHEET AVAILABLE AT EXTENSION OFFICE

With income tax paying time just around the corner, farmers and ranchers should become familiar with the 1969 Tax Reform Act because of the changes made that affect agriculture.

Changes have been numerous and involve many changes from filing dates to a long list of other provisions that vitally affect everyone engaged in farming or ranching.

I have available at my office a Fact Sheet, prepared by Extension Farm Management Specialist Jas. I. Mallet, which gives in brief form important changes that will have a strong bearing on tax management opportunities for farmers and ranchers.

Information contained in the Fact Sheet should be useful to all taxpayers but it should be of particular value to agriculturists in planning tax management strategy prior to the end of the current tax year.

Some 40,000 Texas ranchers and farmers, including a representative number in Briscoe County, will be involved in the 1970 state livestock survey.

During the last half of November survey questionnaires will be mailed to the selected livestock producers by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Each should fill out the questionnaire as soon as possible and return it in the enclosed envelope.

The reports will be used by the state statistician in making an accurate estimate of the cattle, hogs and chickens on the farms and ranches in Texas.

There are many uses, both in and out of Texas, for this information. We use it here in the county in connection with our program building activities and in conducting educational programs involving livestock.

The more questionnaires returned, the more accurate will be the estimates; therefore, it is important that each producer in Briscoe County who receives a questionnaire, complete and return it immediately.

IMPORTANT FOR MACHINERY TO BE ADJUSTED PROPERLY
 Cotton left on the ground, re-

sulting from improper adjustment of picking machinery, can mean the difference between a loss or profit on the crop.

A properly adjusted and operated machine can pick 95% or more of the open bolls, and the machine operator is a mighty important factor.

Approaching the row so the plants enter the center of the picking unit, entering and leaving the row at full speed, staying on the rows during travel and keeping the machine clean are vital factors. One boll missed per plant can result in up to 400 pounds of lost seed cotton per acre.

Adjustment of the machine to fit conditions of the individual field is the responsibility of the operator, and if he knows his job

and machine, very little cotton will be left on the ground or on the plant.

Check the machine completely before the harvest and replace worn parts, lubricate it and make needed adjustments. Make adjustments for maximum machine efficiency. Adjust doffer pads for proper spindle clearance. Check pressure plate settings. Adjust stalk lifters. Check for bent spring fingers and for bent grid bars. Finally, lubricate the machine according to the manufacturer's recommendations.

Proper machine adjustment and operation, provided the machine is in first class condition, can put the cotton in the trailer which otherwise will be left on the ground.

WALNUT ROLL

Mrs. Rolan Simpson, 3213 56th St., Lubbock

Brush a jelly-roll pan, 10 x 15 inches, with oil, line it with wax paper, and oil the paper.
 Separate 7 eggs. Beat the yolks with 1/4 cup sugar until the mixture is pale in color and thick enough to "ribbon." Beat in 1 1/2 cups ground walnuts and 1 teaspoon baking powder. Fold in egg whites, stiffly beaten. Spread the batter in the prepared pan and bake the cake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 15 or 20 minutes or until it is golden. Cool the cake in the pan, cover it with a damp towel and chill it.



Dust the cold cake generously with sifted confectioner sugar and turn it out on a board covered with two overlapping sheets of wax paper. Carefully strip the paper from bottom of cake. Spread cake with 1 cup heavy cream, whipped and flavored to taste with sugar and vanilla. Roll up the cake, using the paper as an aid, slide the roll onto a flat serving platter. Sprinkle with more confectioner sugar. (Rum or almond flavoring is also good.)

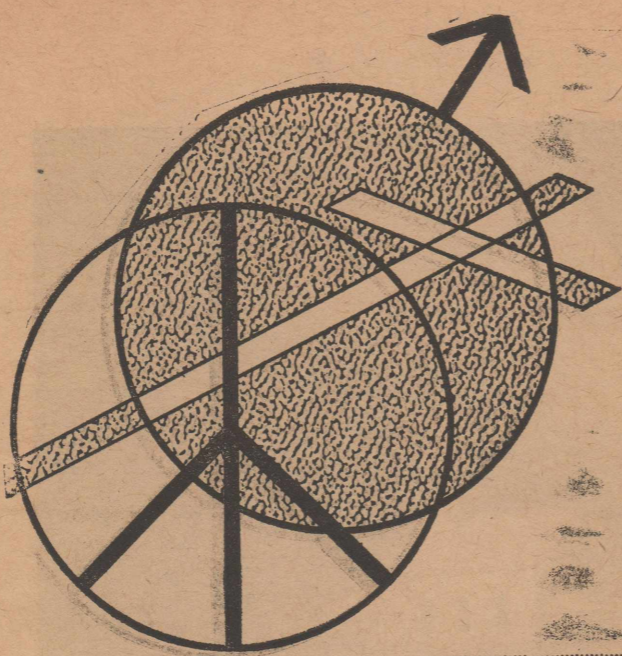

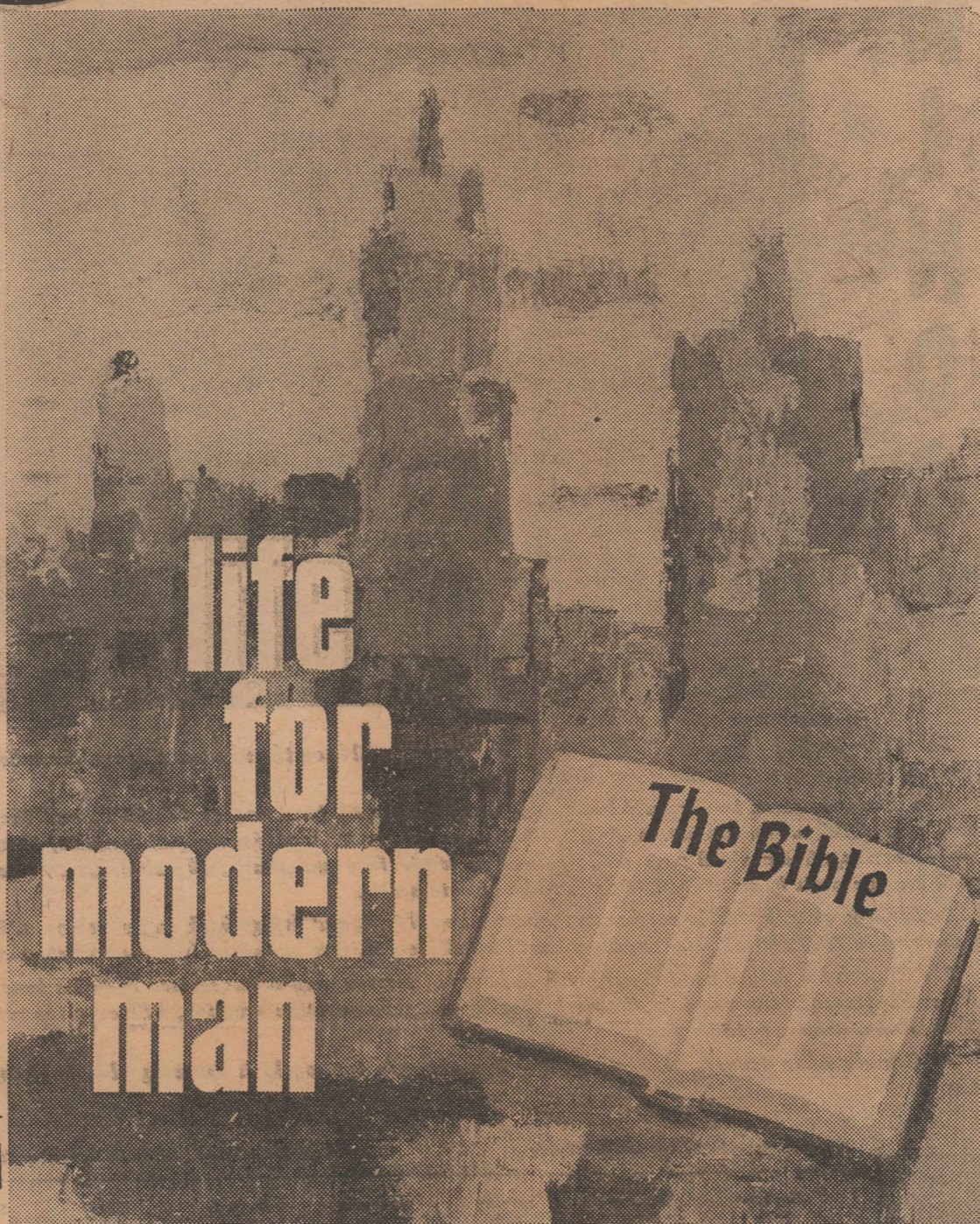

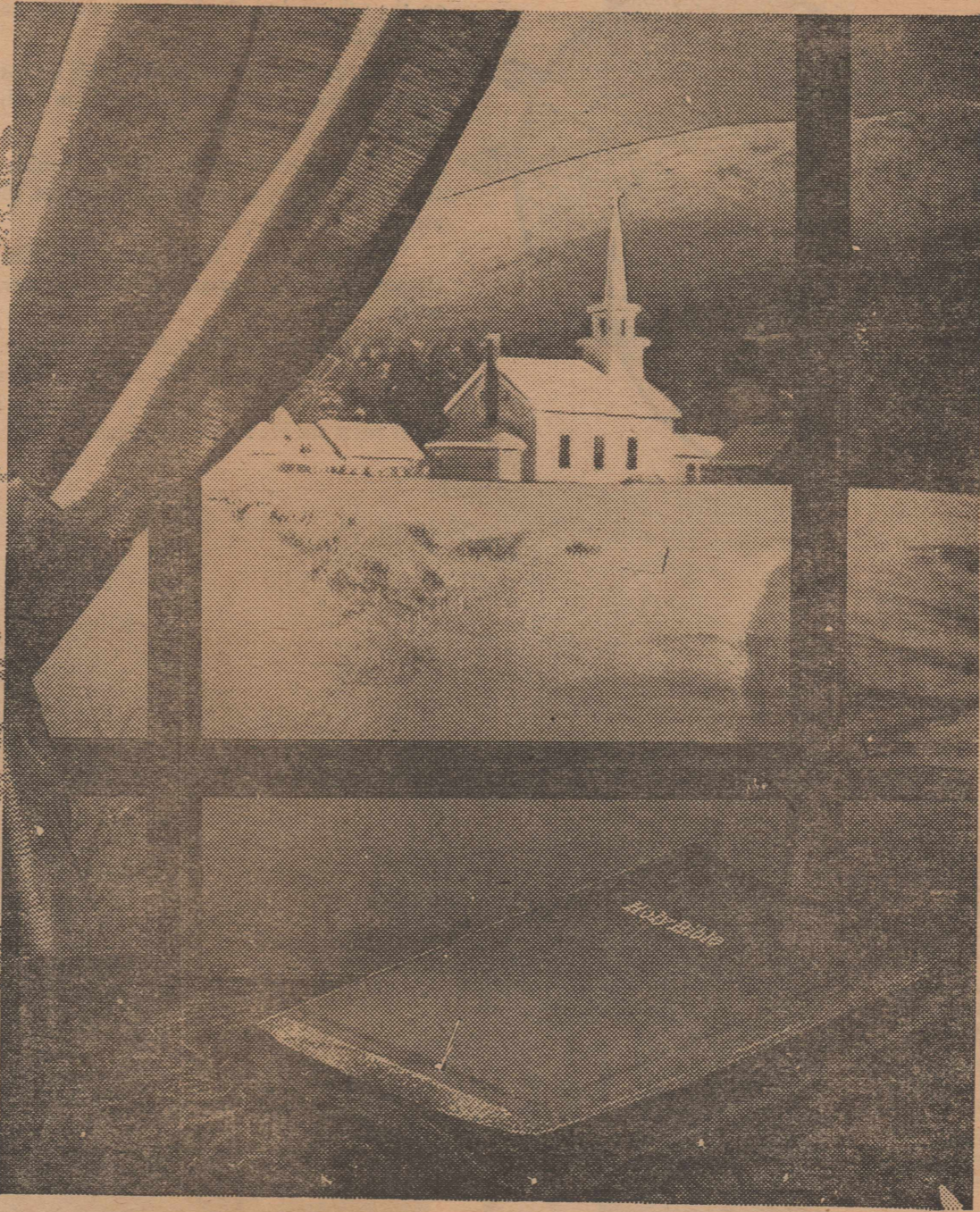

HOME NOTES

Home Demonstration Agent
Red meats, poultry and seafood all taste even better with a tempting helping of whipped potatoes. Serve potatoes often in cloud-like mounds topped with melting butter or boasting a superbly seasoned gravy to complement the meat. Whipped potatoes are magnificent in a host of other serving methods, too.
Acreage planted to fall-crop potatoes is about 3% above last year and 7% above 1968. And heavy supplies are moving into the market now.
POTATO PUFF is an interesting way to serve whipped potatoes. Try it while USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service reports plentiful potato supplies.
2 cups hot mashed potatoes
¾ cup shredded sharp cheese
½ cup sour cream
Chopped chives

Salt
3 eggs, separated
Combine potatoes, cheese, sour cream, a sprinkling of chopped chives and a dash of salt. Beat egg yolks until smooth, add to potato mixture and whip until light. Beat egg whites until stiff, but not moist, fold into potato mixture. Pour into a buttered 1½ quart casserole and bake for one hour at 350°. Makes 4 to 6 servings.
POTATO - FUDGE FROSTING is delicious atop angel food and sponge cakes.
¾ cup butter or margarine
2 squares unsweetened chocolate
½ cup mashed potatoes
1½ teaspoon vanilla extract
Salt
3 cups sifted confectioner's sugar
2 tablespoons milk
Melt butter and cook until lightly browned. Add chocolate and stir until melted. Stir in potatoes, vanilla and a dash of salt, and mix well. Gradually blend in confectioner's sugar and milk, beating well after each addition. Makes enough frosting to cover the top and sides of a 9-inch tube cake.

Clean Air Development



A secretary at Detroit Diesel Engine Division of General Motors holds a cutaway fuel injector which has been improved to substantially reduce exhaust emissions. In combining this latest refinement with other design changes made during the mid-1960's, engines built today emit 90% less hydrocarbon (an element in smog) and 40% less carbon monoxide than engines of 10 years ago.

With the growing concern over pollution, the following facts may prove to be enlightening:

1. Diesels are the source of less than 1% of all U. S. Air pollution by actual survey.
2. In the last 10 years Detroit Diesel has made design improvements which have reduced diesel exhaust smoke by two-thirds and odor intensity has been cut by 75%.
3. Some of the chemicals in air pollution which cause the greatest concern are invisible and odorless.

The smoke and odor from diesel trucks and buses is less serious than it may appear. The engines built by Detroit Diesel today emit amounts of carbon monoxide and hydrocarbon which are up to five times lower than the current most restrictive internal combustion engine standard. 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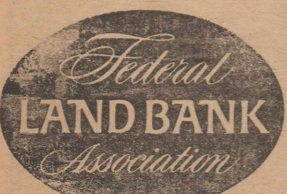
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
