

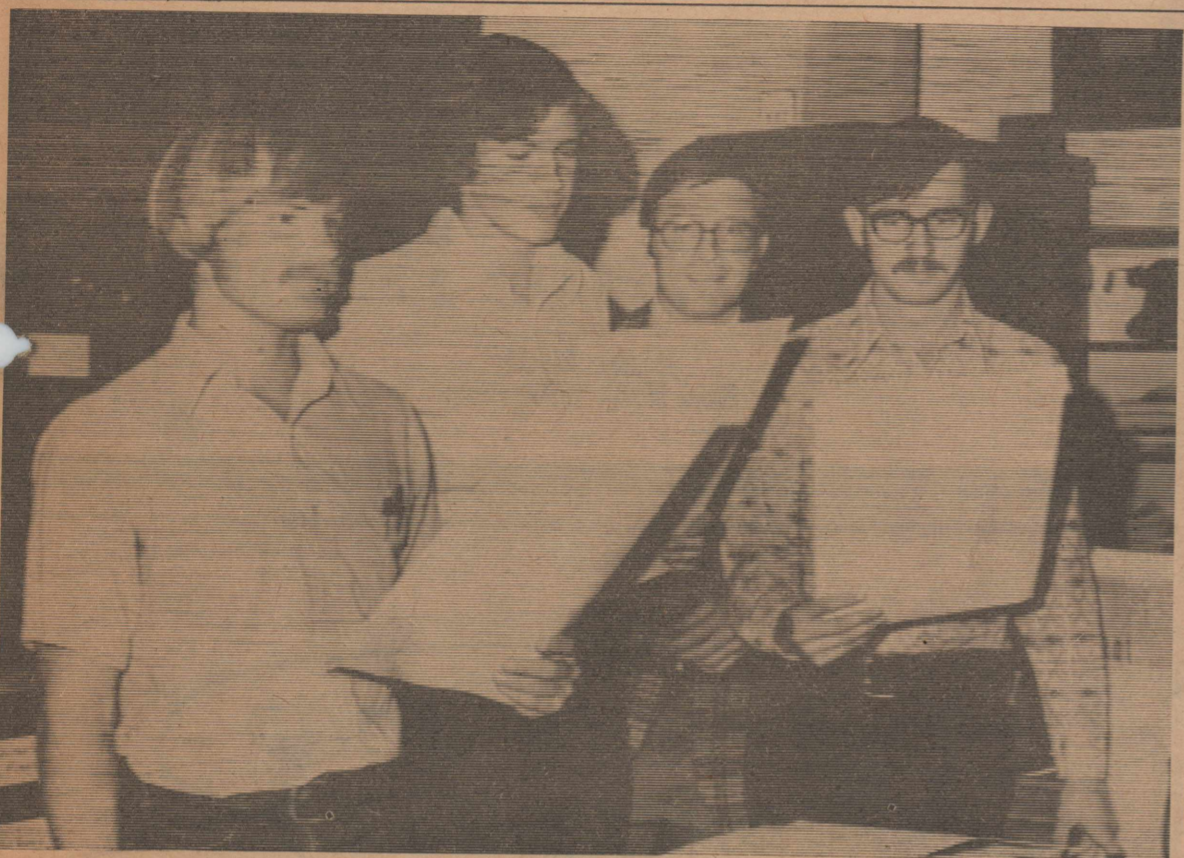

## Valley Girls Are District And Bi-District Champs, Will Play Vega At Lubbock

The Valley High School Patriots won its second district and bi-district championship Friday and Tuesday to advance to the Regional Tournament at Lubbock this weekend (Saturday).

Valley took a 35-30 win over Claude in the playoff game at Clarendon last Friday night to capture the district title and then won the bi-district championship at Canyon in the WT Field House, the score in that one being 39-27.

As the scores in both games indicate, it was a defensive battle in each game and Valley's guards

were superb on each occasion.

When the two teams met at Claude recently Deena Lowrance scored 31 of Claude's 34 points. Last Friday night at Clarendon Miss Lowrance was held to 12 points. In fact the Mustangettes did not get on the scoreboard until four minutes were gone in the first quarter. However, Valley was able to put only six points on the scoreboard in the first quarter and led by only 6-4 at the end of the first period. Valley increased its lead to 17-12 at the halfway point, but Claude won the third period, the only time they outscored Valley and the count was 25-22 in favor of the Patriots. Claude went ahead 23-27 with 6:10 left in the fourth period but the Patriots took the ball and scored to go back in the lead and that was the only time Claude had the lead and it lasted only a few seconds. Eva Cheatham sparked the Patriots with 18 points in that game. Janna Turner hit for 11 and Mitchie Lipscomb 6. Cherri Brown saw action but did not score. Much of the credit for the win, however, must be given to the sparkling play of guards Bonnie Clary, Cookie Dowd, Mary Brunson and Jane Duncan.

Tuesday night's bi-district game was close for only one period for the Eaglettes led the Patriots 10-9 at the first stop but the next two periods were very frustrating for Sanford - Fritch because the Eaglettes scored only two free throws in the second period and one field goal in the third quarter for a total of 4 points in 16 minutes of play. However, the Patriots were not exactly burning up the nets during this time for the winners were leading by only 12 points at the end of the third period. The officials took 4 baskets made by Eva Cheatham, however, calling traveling on her and these calls were poor ones in the estimation of this reporter (along with all Valley fans). Another time one of the officials got in the way of action causing one of the Patriots and himself to take a tumble and the other official gave possession of the ball to the Eaglettes.

In spite of all this, the Patriots never lost their poise and had shot themselves into a 16 point lead when George Scott started using his reserves and before the game was over had used his entire bench. Once again the Valley guards just overwhelmed the Sanford - Fritch forwards, never letting them get set for the good shots.

Scoring-wise, Eva Cheatham and Janna Turner shared honors with 14 each and Mitchie Lipscomb added 11 points. The Patriots were very outstanding at the free throw line, hitting 17 and missing only 3, according to our unofficial book-keeping. The Eaglettes made only 7 and missed 9.

The Patriots thus advance to the regional tournament at Texas Tech Coliseum Saturday in quest of a return trip to Austin where they came within a whisker of winning it all last year.

The Patriots will tangle with Vega at 10 o'clock Saturday morning. The winner of that game will advance to the championship game which will be Saturday night. Next stop will be Austin. Let's all be on hand to boost the Patriots to a return trip to the Capitol!

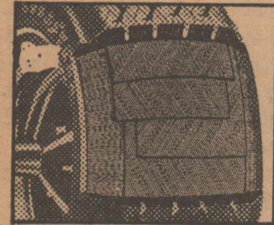

**Hey! Mr. Employer! Do You Know About New Law?**

Here is a message of vital importance to every employer in the State of Texas, brought to you as a public service by your local Independent Insurance agent who is a member of the Texas Association of Insurance Agents. Effective January 1, 1974, the Workmen's Compensation law has been amended to apply to business and professional organizations which have one or two employees. Here is the report: The 1973 Texas legislature enacted S.F. 283 which made many substantial changes in our Workman's Compensation law. We'd like to call one of these to your attention.

For practical purposes, ALL employees in this state except "domestic servants or casual employees engaged in employment incidental to a personal residence, farm laborers, (or) ranch laborers..." should now be protected by Workmen's Compensation insurance, or the employer loses his common law defenses if the injured worker sues him. Formerly you had to have at least three persons on your payroll to be affected. But beginning on January 1,

1974, employers with one or two employees will be brought under the terms of the Workmen's Compensation Act. The question that probably occurs to you at this point is: What if I as a small employer fail to carry Workmen's Compensation insurance? Well, if you don't and one of your employees is injured, he has the right to sue you and will almost certainly be awarded damages. (Your liability doesn't cover either the legal costs in such a case or the court judgment.)

By being uninsured the three so-called common law defenses against a suit by an injured employee can't be asserted in court. These are: The Fellow Servant Rule (The injury was caused by another employee.); Assumption of Risk (The injured worker knew job conditions were dangerous and assumed the risk.); Contributory Negligence (The injured person was partially at fault himself.)

We are sure that you want to protect yourself and your employees, so let's take a brief look at some of the Workmen's Compensation

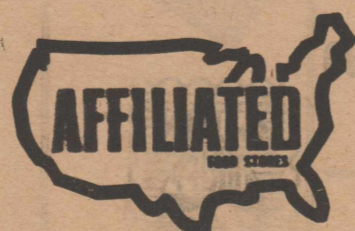

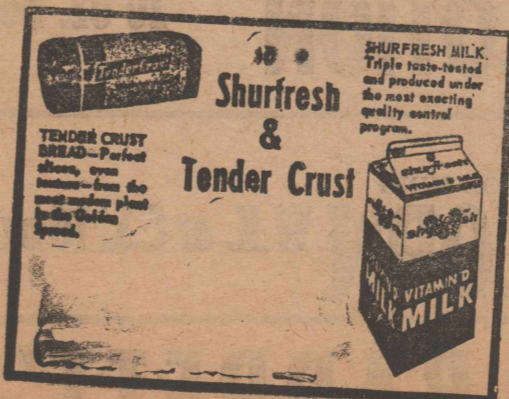
