The Valley High girls will return to Austin this weekend and will try once again to capture a state championship that eluded them by a whisker just a year ago, the winning basket coming with half a dozen seconds before the final buzzer.

Grandview High School was the team that nosed out the Patriots and it is Grandview and Valley that will start the action in Class A when they square off at 8:30 a.m. Friday in historic Gregory Gym in Austin. This might well be the championship game once again for both teams return with practically the same lineups. Grandview had only two seniors listed in their squad last year. The Patriots had only one senior, Suzie Hendrix, on the squad last year, but the Patriots lost two others since last season to marriage.

The Valley girls won the regional championship last Saturday, although they were not very impressive at times, being weakened by the flu bug, and plagued by

poor officiating, an improperly-functioning scoreboard clock and by the operator of the clock.

The Patriots took a 47-37 win over Vega in the first game, one that proved to be a game of con-

trasts. Valley scored 7 quick points in what appeared might be an easy victory for Valley, shutting out the Longhornettes on the scoreboard for 4:05 of the first period. Then Valley went cold and Vega scored 6 straight points to bring the count to 7-6. Valley hit for two more baskets to lead 11-6 at the end of the first quarter. However, Mary Brunson and Cookie Dowd picked up three first quarter fouls and it looked like the referees were picking on the Patriots and the Valley girls were only able to score 4 points in the second quarter and Vega came on and tied the score at 15 just as the buzzer ended the first half of play. However, the momentum switched back to Valley and they started getting a few breaks. The Patriots held the Longhornettes scoreless for the next six and a half minutes and Valley led 26-19 at the end of the third quarter. Bu this time the Longhornettes were in foul trouble and Janna Turner was torrid at the free throw line. The last 15 points the Patriots made were free shots. This was the actual difference for according to this reporter's bookkeeping, the two teams scored the same number of field goals, 13 each. As a contrast, the three starting Valley forwards missed 6 of their first 7 free shots. Janna Turner scored 19 points to lead the Valley scoring. Mitche Lipscomb hit for 13 points and Eva Cheatham scored 7. Mary Brunson fouled out with 1:25 left in the third quarter and Vega rallied for awhile and twice pulled to within three points of the Patriots but in trying to catch up he Longhornettes for the Valley forwards were burning the free throw nets. Vega lost three players via fouls in the final quarter.

The Patriots won the championship game over Knox City 39-37, a tense hard fought contest that was in doubt right down to the

final buzzer.

Once again the Patriots jumped off to a good start, the Valley forwards putting the first four points on the scoreboard, outmaneuvering the Knox City guards and it appeared that maybe the Valley girls were on their way to a good win. However, after building up a 12-7 lead, the Valley forwards cooled off a bit, partly due to rather aggressive guarding by Knox City. A different set of officials was calling this one and the Valley forwards were pushed around pretty good but they never lost their cool and their poise. They just hung in there and made the best of it. The Patriots led 18-14 at the end of the first period. The scoreboard operator let the clock run over about 15 seconds and Knox City scored a basket during that time and the officials allowed it to stand. Another time Knox City was given credit for a basket that Valley scored and Coach George Scott had to go and argue with them on that one, which was corrected. The second period was a cold one for Valley, being able to score only 4 points. Knox City went ahead 22-20 during the fading seconds of the second quarter but the lead lasted only a few seconds before the Patriots scored to tie it at 22-22, just as the halftime buzzer sounded. That was the only time the Knox City team was ahead in the game, although the score was tied at 24-24 and at 26-26. The Patriots then took a 28-26 lead and were ahead the rest of the way but never by more than 4 points. The count was 32-28 at the end of the third period. In contrast, the Patriots did not get a chance at the free throw circle until the final two minutes, when they had two chances. The final score made by Valley was a free shot. The final chance at the free throw line, incidentally, was the only time during the game when the Valley forwards were given a foul while in the act of shooting. A very frustrating game but a most satisfying win. Janna Turner tossed in 19 points for the Patriots and Mitche Lipscomb and Eva Cheatham hit for 10 each. The Valley guards' play in this game can be summed up in this way: Knox City's forwards—Denise Grindstaff brought a 34 point per game average into the tournament and she scored 19 points against Valley; Temi Baker had been averaging 24 points per contest and she scored 12 points against Valley; and Kary Kent had averaged 8 points per game and she got 4 Saturday night. The three forwards had been averaging 66 points a game and against Valley they were held to 37 points or just a little over half their average. And, not a one of them were selected all-tournament!

Farm and Ranch Progress Night Slated February 21

"The Annual Farm and Ranch Progress night has been scheduled for February 21, 1974. This year the program will be held in the Community Room of the First National Bank at Quitaque beginning at 7:00 p.m.," said Jimmy Vanstory, Briscoe County Extension Agent.

This year's program includes Leon New, Dr. Bob Metzger, Jim Valentine, Marvin Sartin and Roy Childers, all of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Lubbock.

Topics to be discussed are pertinent to today's agriculture in this time of shortages. Mr. New, Area Irrigation Specialist, will discuss the watering of sorghum, cotton and soybeans and the importance of saving irrigation water. Dr. Metzger, Area Cotton Specialist, will discuss cotton varieties—new and old—cotton production and herbicides. Mr. Sartin, Area Economist-Management, will present a program on what to look forward to in financing without the government payment. Mr. Valentine, Area Soil Chemist, will discuss how to handle the fertilizer shortage. Mr. Childers, Area Ag Engineer-Cotton Mechanization, will present a program on how to handle the fuel shortage, what it is and what to do about it.

"The program this year looks very good and should be interesting to all producers," states Vanstory. "The Briscoe County Field Crops Committee has done an outstanding job of selecting the topics for this program. We are looking forward to seeing everyone there."

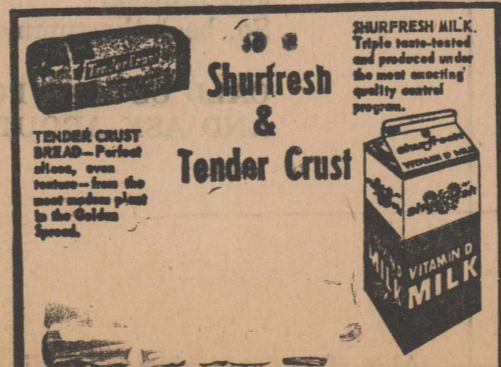
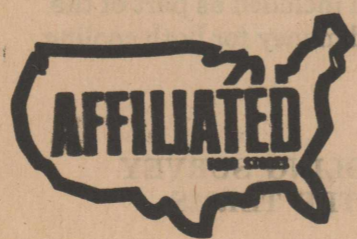

Interest Rate Reduced For G. I. Home Loans

A one-quarter percent reduction in the maximum G. I. home loan interest rate became effective January 22, according to Jack Coker, VA Regional Office Director.

In ordering a drop from 8.5 to 8.25 percent on Veterans Administration loans, Administrator of Veterans Affairs Donald E. Johnson

noted that the new lower rate has been established for FHA loans by the Secretary for Housing and Urban Development.

A law enacted last July authorizes the VA Administrator to set interest rates on G. I. loans in line with market conditions following consultation with the HUD Secretary.

The new maximum rate was set after a series of market indicators had demonstrated the old 8.5 percent figure, in effect since August 25, 1973, was very near the par for commercial home loans.

The reduction effective January 22, is the first decline in interest rates since February 18, 1971. Interest rates were reduced three times between December 2, 1970, and February 18, 1971. Rate increases marked the program from its founding in June 1944 until December 1970.

G. I. loan applications last month

were well below the normal seasonal dip for that period. During the first half of FY 1974, 155,700 loan applications were received—22 percent below the total for the first half of FY 1973. Appraisal requests also were down 22 percent.

Noting that the lowered interest rate can save as much as \$1,530 over the life of a 30-year mortgage on a \$25,000 home, Coker expressed the hope that the reduction would encourage many veterans and service personnel to re-enter the home buying market.

The new loan rate does not apply to VA mobile home loans, which differ from regular mort-

gage loans in that they are for shorter terms and lesser loan amounts.
