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WHY FIGHT LEGALIZED GAMBLING? VOTE AGAINST PARI-MUTUEL GAMBLING!

As we go to the polls to vote for or against legalized gambling May 4, here are some things to think about. We received the material from the Anti-Crime Council of the State of Texas. It reports: "Our opposition to legalized gambling is part of our effort to assist law enforcement in the fight against organized crime. Legalization gives official approval of gambling. This encourages more citizens to engage in illegal wagering with bookies as well as betting at racetracks." In the New York Times, on January 10, 1974, it stated "A privately circulated Police Department white paper concludes that off-track betting, rather than eliminating organized crime from gambling and driving out bookmakers, led to 62% increase in illegal betting and brought more mob-connected figures into bookmaking."

Organized crime is already taking ONE BILLION DOLLARS per year out of Texas. According to Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, and Attorney General John Hill, co-chairmen of the Texas Organized Crime Prevention Council, bookmaking is the largest single money maker for organized crime as they take at least one billion dollars per year out of Texas.

WHAT ABOUT THE CLAIM THAT LEGALIZED PARI-MUTUEL BETTING WILL BRING IN MUCH-NEEDED REVENUE AND EASE THE STATE'S TAX BURDEN? The gambling interests grossly exaggerate the revenue generated by taxing gambling. Our neighboring states who permit it have never grossed an amount that exceeded one half of one percent of their state budget. Betting revenues represent only a "drop in the bucket" as far as state government is concerned. If it brought in as much as the gamblers claim, Texans would still be losers. Gambling, to quote the Wall Street Journal, is "technically a swindle; the pay-offs on bets must be less than fair, and the overwhelming majority of the 'investors' must eventually lose their money if the gambling enterprise is to survive and prosper." The Journal concluded that the case for legalized gambling is "simply an argument in favor of the government raising revenues by swindling its citizens rather than by taxing them."

WHAT ABOUT THE ARGUMENT THAT LEGALIZED RACETRACK BETTING WILL BRING ADDITIONAL TOURISTS INTO TEXAS? Even before there was an energy crisis, studies made in states all over the country have shown that less than 2% of all tourists go on vacation to visit racetracks. On the other hand it will bring about a great influx of organized criminals. We believe that's a pretty poor trade-off.

The state of Texas has already had an unhappy experience with legalized racetrack betting. In the regular session of the 43rd Legislature in 1933, a provision authorizing pari-mutuel betting was attached to the general appropriations bill late in the session. The legislature, feeling there was insufficient time to send the bill back through the necessary committee procedures, passed the measure. The following quotes from one Texas newspaper, The Dallas Times-Herald, tell the story: July 8, 1934—"This new specter, which is keeping awake at night not only the businessman, the banker, the minister and the lawmaker, but the legalized racetrack men themselves, is unlicensed and illegal gambling." July 31, 1934—"quoting Police Chief Trammel" "Under the present setup, race betting is illegal in Texas except at the tracks, but bookmaking on out-of-town tracks is so widespread that it is virtually impossible to drive the bookmakers out of business." Sep-

tember 16, 1934 — "Widespread criticism has risen against the racing law from the business people who claim that money which should have gone towards paying grocery bills, rent and other necessary costs, have been spent instead in attempting to beat the pari-mutuel betting machines at the race-track." In 1935, Gov. Jimmy Allread called for repeal. A repeal bill was passed by the first session of the 44th Legislature, signaling an end to an unfortunate experiment with legalized gambling in Texas.

IT WILL BE TRAGIC, INDEED, IF WE LET HISTORY REPEAT ITSELF!

On Saturday, May 4, every voter in both the Democratic and Republican primaries in Texas will be asked to express their opinions about legalized pari-mutuel gambling. The referendum is reported to be "non-binding" but don't be misled! Unless concerned citizens make it clear to our elected officials that TEXANS do not want legalized gambling, this "non-binding" referendum could BIND US ALL to organized gambling and its accompanying ills, and repeat a dark chapter in the proud history of our state.

W. and his wife and children had been living in Marion, Kansas, a suburb of Kansas City for the past seven months, and he and a friend were fishing from a boat on the lake in that area when the mishap occurred. There have been reports that there was a witness to the accident, a man who was quite some distance away from the boat with the two men. According to the report it appeared that a strong wind upset the boat. However that report has not been verified at this time. At the latest report neither the bodies of the men or the boat have been located.

Mrs. Henrietta Scoggins, sister of H. W., reports that H. W.'s son, Alvin of Quitaque, and two of H. W.'s brothers, J. W. of Hobbs, New Mexico and Billy of Los Angeles, California, have gone to the scene of the mishap but they have not reported any findings yet.

H. W. was the oldest child of Mr. Henry Ivory of Silverton and the late Mrs. Ivory, former long-time residents of this community. H. W. is survived by his wife; his son, Alvin, of Quitaque; a step-son and step-daughter; his father, and several brothers and sisters.

The honored guests were presented corsages of apricot and off-white. The bride's chosen colors

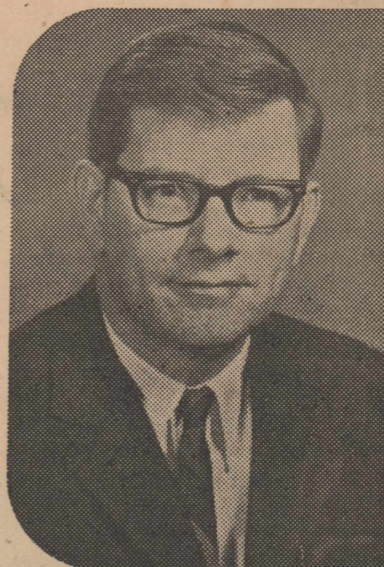
of apricot and white were used throughout the decorations in the home.
