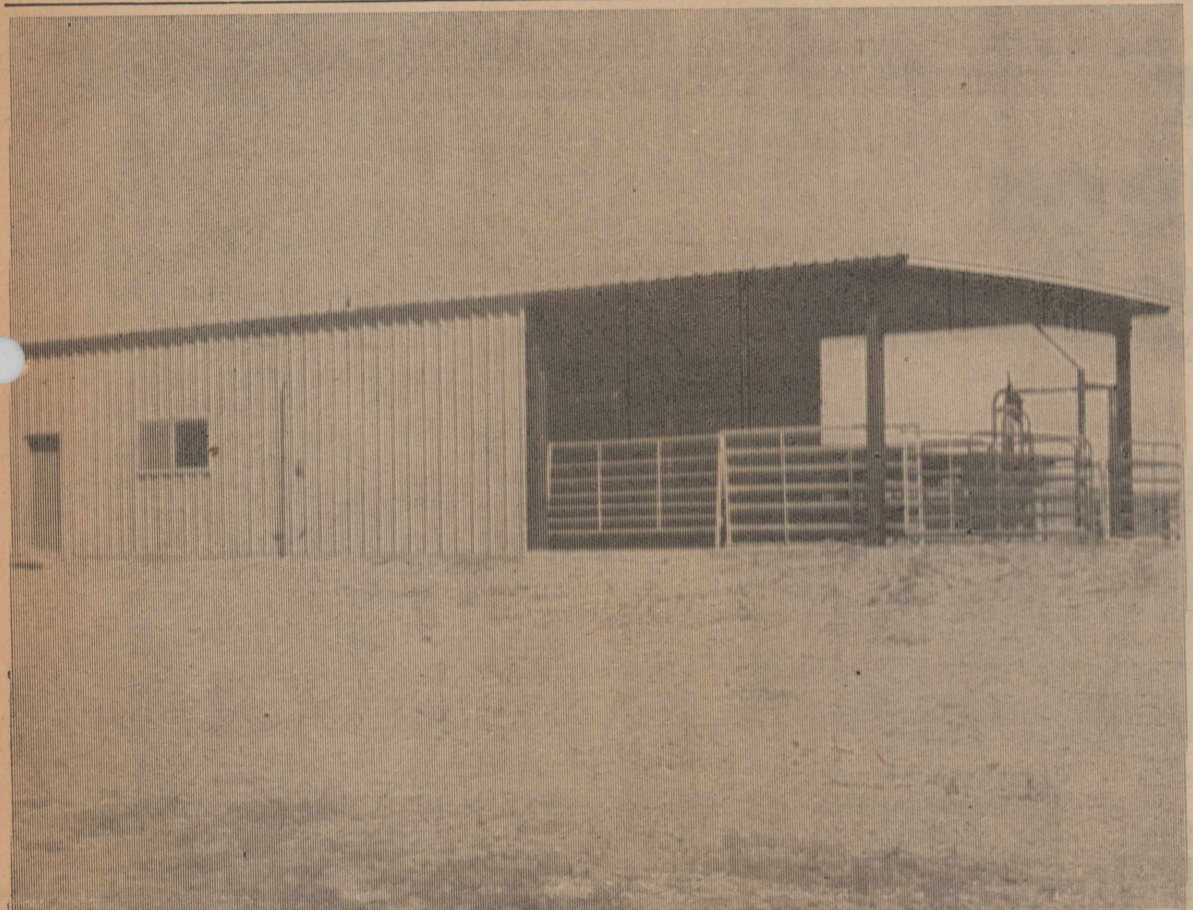

The afternoon events will include a program with Bill Mack from WBAP in Fort Worth. Bill, a well-known television-radio and recording personality, is a native of Shamrock and will be personally known by many present. Hoyle Nix and his band will also be present and will be playing many of the old Bob Wills numbers.

The Old Fiddlers Contest will begin at 3:30 p.m. and will feature some of the best fiddlers in the business.

The day's events will be capped off with a big Country and Western Dance starting at 9:00 p.m. Music for the dance will be furnished by the Hoyle Nix Band and will feature Bob Wills numbers.

HOW GRASSES GROW

About 95% of the plant food is taken from the air—5% of the plant food is taken from the soil. Leaves are the food factories of the plant. In the presence of sunshine, they combine carbon dioxide from the air and water, nitrates, and minerals from the soil to make plant food. The roots gather raw material, water, nitrates and minerals which are converted into plant food by the leaves. Roots also serve as storehouses for food. This food is essential for regrowth. Nature gives you about 50% of

the total volume of growth of a plant for the production of livestock and livestock products. The rest belongs to the land and the plant for grass insurance. This insurance provides for erosion control, soil fertility maintenance, water conservation, stabilized soil temperatures, plant development and reproduction. Overgrazing will destroy both the leaves and the roots resulting in loss of plant vigor and future forage production.

A healthy, vigorous, "well fed" plant always grows larger than a weak "under fed" plant. And half of a large plant is always more than half of a small plant—and often more than all of a very small plant.

Thin Vegetables To Boost Yields

Thinning a garden crop will improve the stand and quality and will boost production.

"Over-seeding small seed crops is a natural tendency of home vegetable gardeners. So, thinning at an early age and when the soil is moist will help insure a proper stand and will increase yields of high quality vegetables," says Jimmy Vanstory, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Thin when the plants are no more than two inches tall and before the roots become entwined. Pinch or cut off cucumbers, melons, squash, okra and similar plants rather than pulling them up, as this disrupts the roots of the remaining plants, Vanstory points out.

Thin beets, carrots and radishes to one to two inches between plants. Bush beans, peas, onions, spinach, turnips, blackeyed peas, garlic and mustard perform best when spaced at two to four inches.

Thin leaf lettuce, parsley, lima beans and swiss chard to allow four to eight inches between plants.

Sweet corn, cabbage, chard, endive, kale, head lettuce and potatoes grow best when spaced at eight to twelve inches.

Broccoli, brussels sprouts, cauliflower, cucumbers, eggplant, peppers, squash, sweet potatoes and watermelons require the greatest spacing—12 to 18 inches.

If vegetable stands are poor or uneven, transplant the young seedlings that you have thinned.

"Don't throw away the thinnings," advises Vanstory. "Young lettuce leaves and carrots are superior salad items."

Animal Health Meeting Slated

Livestock producers will be treated to discussions on specific disease problems of beef and dairy cattle, swine and horses at the Sixth Annual Southwestern Animal Health Conference at the Green Oaks Motor Inn in Fort Worth April 27-28.

The conference will feature authorities on animal health and nutrition who will discuss topics of both general and special interest to producers, points out Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Special sessions on cow-calf, dairy, equine (horse), feedlot and swine will be featured Saturday morning, April 27, and will be conducted all day on Sunday. A general session will be held Saturday afternoon.

The cow-calf section will feature discussions on such topics as cur-

rent infectious disease and parasite problems, toxicity problems, calf scours, herd management, herd health, estimation of calf crop, necropsy (an autopsy), pre-conditioning, calving problems and induced calving.

In the dairy section discussions will include owner responsibility to his milking system, vaccination, reproduction, calf-raising, skin and limb problems, practical herd tips, failures in milk fever and ketosis, handling semen, programmed mastitis control, practical dairy management, drug withdrawals and limitations, and management of retained placentas.

Horse owners will have an opportunity to hear talks on equine infectious anemia, animal health requirements, horse identification, selection of a trainer, clinical laboratory procedures indicating health and training status, medication of horses in athletic competition, available vaccines, immunization at the brood farm, and routine surgical procedures.

Speakers at the feedlot section will dwell on such topics as programs for receiving cattle, drug interaction, use of force, problems in feeder cattle, hemophilus infection, research underway at Bushland, backgrounding in a commercial feeding program, use of alfalfa pastures, and basic parasitology and approved anthelmintics.

The session for swine producers will include discussions on management and disease prevention, controlling reproduction diseases, herd health management, commercial hog feedlots, sensible use of antibiotics, feeder pig health, and the profit potential of a dead pig.

The general session will feature discussions on "Cow Psychology" by Dude Meenach of Superior Foods, Dallas; "How American Agriculture Can Solve the Energy Crisis—The Daw Theory," by David Witts, Dallas attorney; and "The Future of Food Animal Medicine," by Dr. George Shelton, dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine, Texas A&M University.

Also, Dr. William Anderson, a Dallas veterinarian, will bring an update on the brucellosis eradication program in Texas, and a panel will discuss "Why Vaccines Work." The annual conference is being sponsored by the Texas Veterinary Medical Association and Texas A&M University.

Privacy Invasion Concern Of President of TOMA

Dr. John H. Boyd (D. O.) of Silvertown, outgoing president of the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association, warned of the wholesale invasion of confidential medical records by the Professional Standards Review Organizations (PSRO). PSRO, established nationally by Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), became law January 1, 1974.

Dr. Boyd will review progress made by the Texas medical profession in regard to PSRO at the 75th annual convention of the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association in McAllen April 25-27. TOMA has joined with the Texas Medical Association, Texas Hospital Association, Texas Osteopathic Hospital Association, Texas Nursing Homes Association, Texas Nurses Association, Texas Podiatry Association and other allied health groups in a unified effort to represent the health care industry in the state.

Boyd stated that scant attention has been given to the legalized burglary of confidential records by PSRO. He said, "We are told that this wholesale invasion of confidential records by HEW's unelected army of bureaucrats is necessary for HEW to establish and computerize 'norms of health care' based on typical patterns of health care."

Compost Boosts Lawns, Gardens

Put leaves, grass clippings, table scraps and other waste material to work for you by building a compost pile, suggests Jimmy Vanstoy, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"A compost pile is an excellent source of plant nutrients and is relatively easy to keep weed-free and odorless," says Vanstoy. "It can provide valuable organic matter for use in vegetable gardens and flower beds for topdressing lawns."

To start a compost pit or pile lay down two inches of soil in an area receiving sunlight and sufficient air. Follow with two to six inches of waste material topped by one to two inches of manure or one to two cups of commercial fertilizer per square yard. Repeat this process to present a layered effect. Use a wire fence or lumber or other material to contain the compost pile.

Shape the top of the pile like a dish to facilitate wetting. Keep the material moist but not soggy. Turn the pile every five to six weeks to hasten decomposition of the material, adds Vanstoy.

He suggests keeping two compost piles, one for present use and the other to allow for decomposition, which requires four to eight months.

Boyd stated the government will spend millions of dollars "not for health care but for establishing this program. This law will have a severe impact on the practice of high quality medicine."

Boyd said the Texas health care industry has outlined a plan to the Washington agency which will provide economies in administration of peer review while avoiding wasteful duplication and get cooperation and participation in the medical profession.

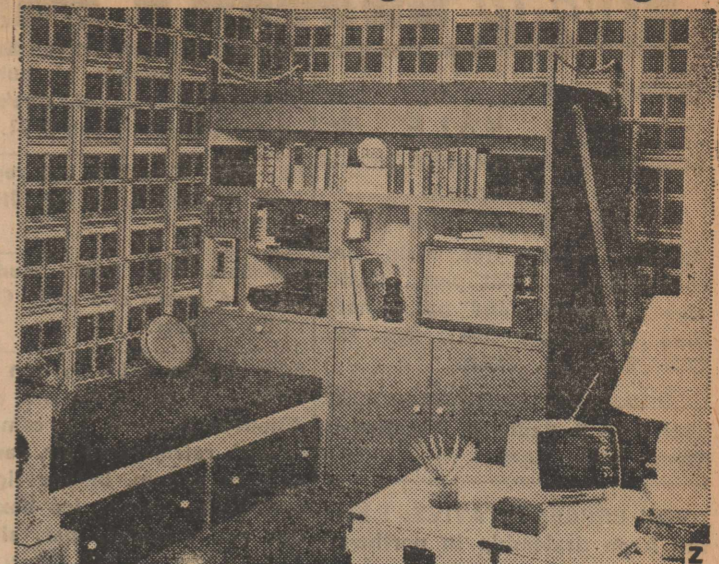
BAPTISTS SEND HELP TO VALLEY MISSIONS
