



Advertisements promoting parimutuel betting in Texas were characterized as dishonest today by Abner V. McCall, co-chairman of the Anti-Crime Council of Texas.

"The advertisements of the gambling proponents is misleading," said McCall. "It asks us to legalize horse racing. Horse racing is already legal."

McCall noted proponents of parimutuel betting "don't even attempt to make the case for gambling," a situation he said is "interesting.'

"ACT (Anti-Crime Council of Texas) is not against horses or horse racing. ACT is against commercialized gamblingi," McCall said in his statement.

He added: "The vote on May 4 is on gambling, not horse racing.' McCall, noting a half-million dollar campaign to promote gamb ling, commented: "We are confident the gamblers will not be able to buy the election with a barrage of misleading advertis-
