

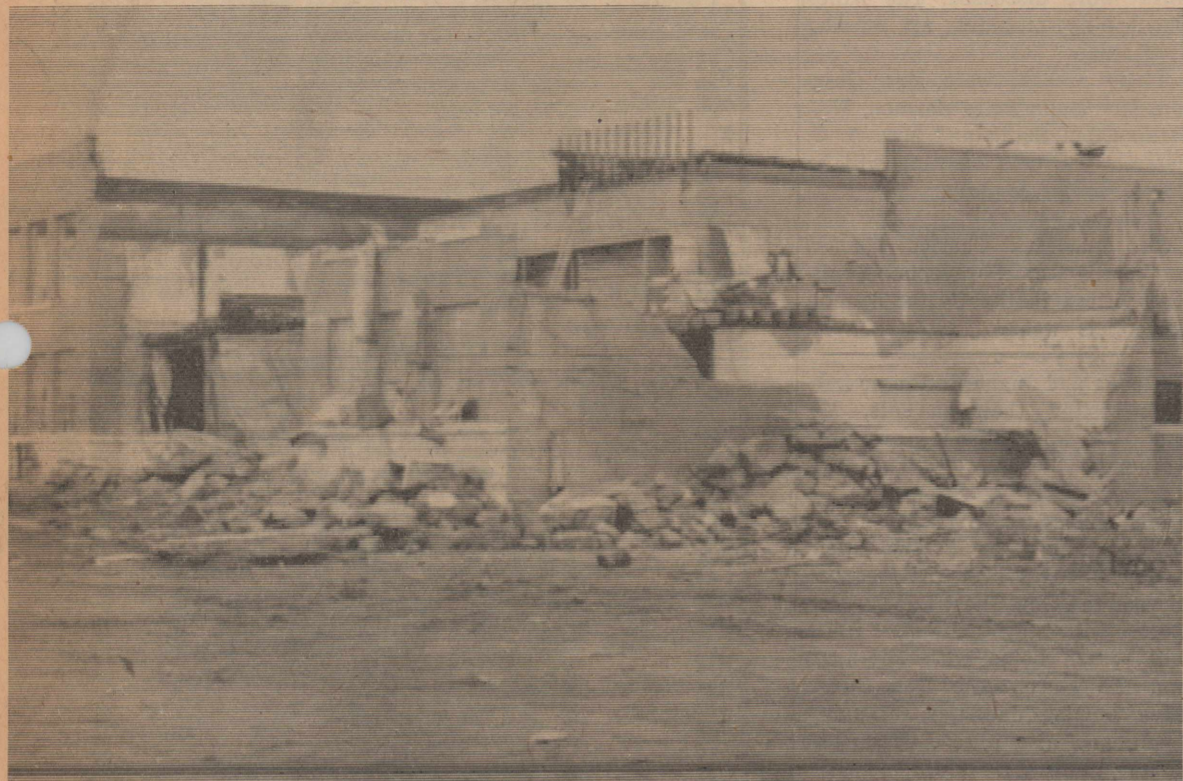

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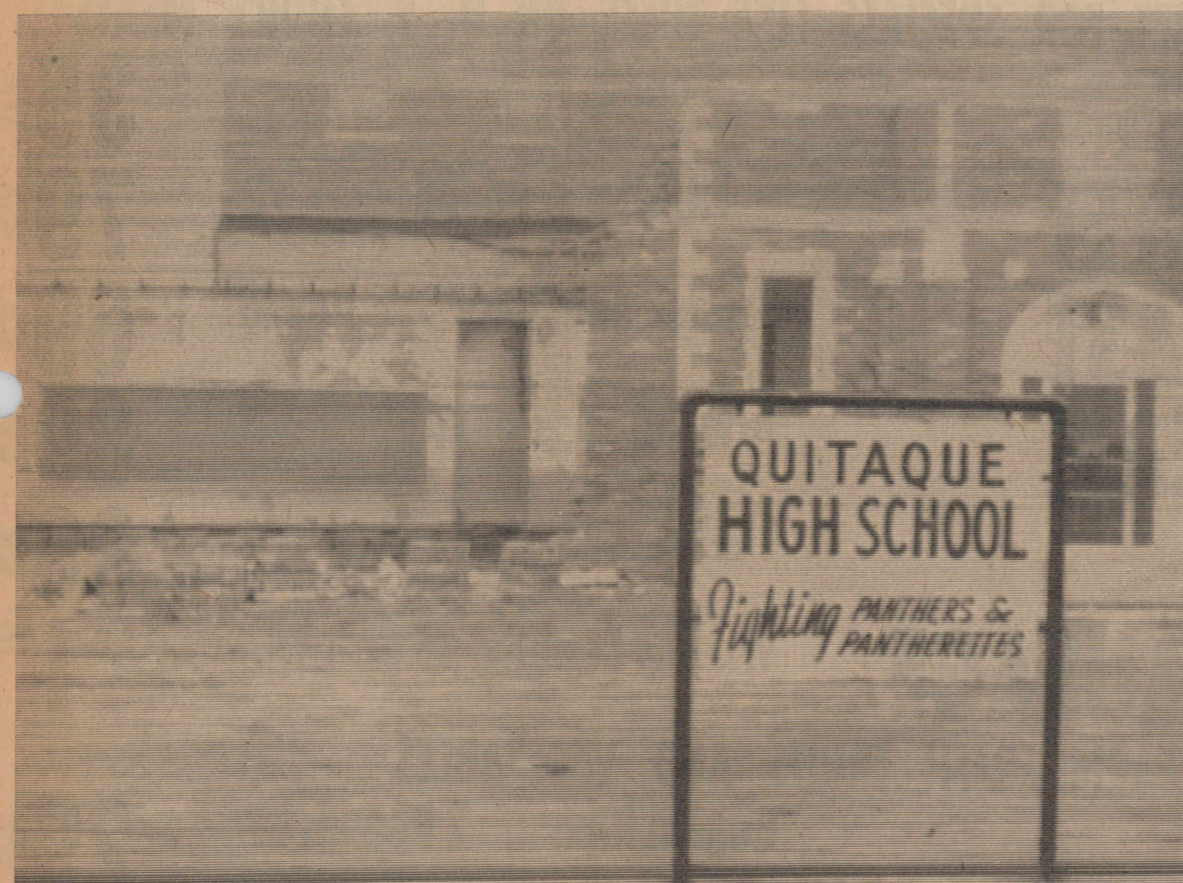
Going, Going... Almost Gone!



THE OLD GRADE SCHOOL BUILDING survived some hard knocks, even a fire in its second year of existence, a real solid institution of learning. This building, completed in 1923, was in opera-

tion for the 23-24 school term and burned in June of 1924. The next year, classes were held in the old Baptist Tabernacle (which is now Will Lyon's Blacksmith Shop) and other places available until the

school building was rebuilt. O. R. Tipps, who after became Briscoe County Judge and now lives in Wichita Falls, was superintendent of the Quitaque schools.

Quitaque High School, of course, is no more, and even the buildings will soon be a thing of the past as they are rapidly being dismantled and they will soon be gone. These photos were snapped a couple of weeks ago and there is even less left standing now.

These pictures will conjure up many fond memories for hundreds of men and women, many of whom are now "getting along" in years for the high school building in front of which this sign stands was completed in 1923 and 43 or 44 classes graduated from this building before consolidation came with Turkey. The Class of 1972 was the last to hold its own commencement at Quitaque High.

As was stated before, the photos will bring back memories of school days of long ago... or perhaps not so long ago and the sight of the old alma mater being razed will be sure to bring tears to the eyes of some.

And the sign that says "Fighting Panthers and Pantherettes" will recall many good memories, especially among basketball fans. There were some pretty good football teams and outstanding players who went on to college and were successful there, but Quitaque High has almost always been a power to be reckoned with on the basketball court. This editor has been in and out of Quitaque since 1931 and during that time there were only possibly three or four years when the Quitaque teams had losing seasons. Now Quitaque did not win district all those years but they did win more games than they lost with the exception of three or four years, and both boys and girls teams made it all the way to the state tournament on a couple of occasions, although the big prize, the state title, never quite made it home to roost in Quitaque, although the girls made it to the finals.

Reading Clinic To Be Held In Turkey

Another Reading Clinic will be offered this summer in Turkey which will feature the Neurological Impress Method for comprehension and skill building; the Gillingham-Stillman Phonics program for a sound foundation in phonics and vocabulary building; speed reading, penmanship and spelling.

The clinic is slated for July 1 to July 31, 5 days a week with each session lasting 1½ hours. The cost is \$40.00 per child payable in advance. There will be about 10 students in each section and all ages are welcome. One section will be reserved for the advanced reader who needs to expand his reading interests. Contests will be featured and prizes given for the child who reads the most books. (1600 books were read last summer by 20 pupils, and they plan to set a new record this summer.)

Each child will be tested at the beginning and again at the end of the program to evaluate his progress.

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REDDY'S VACATION TIPS



Clip and save this vacation checklist.

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.
- CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.: Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls — on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING: Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.

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Crop Reports Needed From Farmers in July

In early July, over 24,000 Texas farmers will receive an acreage and production questionnaire from Charles Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas.

Information from this survey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the state of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry — agriculture. This is a coopera-

tive effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Crop Acreages Must Be Certified Now

Signup for the 1974 cotton, feed grain and wheat programs has been combined with certification of crop acreages. Producers are required to sign up and certify before the first program crop is harvested, but not later than July 15.

Your cotton, soybeans and grain sorghum must be certified by July 15—less than one month away. To avoid a last minute rush, farmers need to measure and certify now.

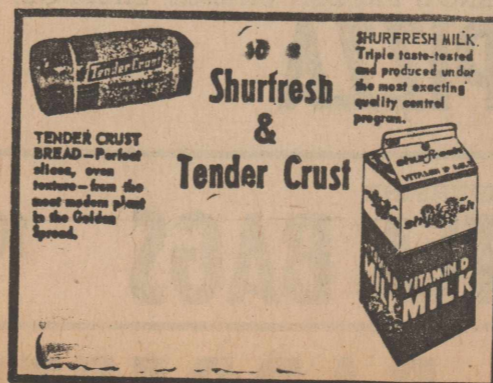
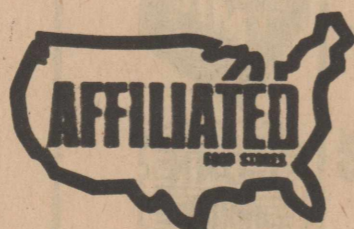
