Hunters in Texas brought home more than \$16.5 million worth of the Texas Parks and Wildlife De-

Hunters killed 10,260 mule deer and 366,033 white-tailed deer.

The average mule deer weighed 90 pounds when it was field dressed and produced an estimated 45 pounds of boneless meat.

White-tailed bucks averaged 78.5 pounds field dressed and produced approximately 39 pounds of boneless meat, and white-tailed Mrs. J. A. Taylor with whom she does averaged 56.6 pounds field dressed and produced about 28 pounds of boneless meat.

Based on the price of ground chuck beef (\$1.20 per pound) at the time of the hunting season, the mule deer meat was worth \$554,040 and the white-tailed deer meat was worth \$16,013,738.

The department estimates there were 50,000 bow hunters and 560,000 firearms hunters during the last deer season. The estimated mule and white-tailed deer population during the hunt was 3,622,-

Failure to timely file your crop certification and program intention will cause you to be ineligible for any payment which may be due under the Disaster or Target Price Provision of the programs. It will also cause you to be ineligible for price support loans.


