Homecoming Held Last Sunday At Gasoline

The Gasoline Homecoming was held Sunday, August 4, 1974. The group began gathering before noon with their baskets of lunch. The meal was served at 12:30 p.m. with approximately 200 present. A bountiful meal of meats, vegetables, salads, cakes, pies, iced tea was served from tables in the community building. Also a galvanized tank with 240 iced pops. Clyde Monk of Lubbock gave the invocation before the meal.

The program began about 1:45 p.m. with Joe Bedwell acting as Master of Ceremonies. Eugene Bedwell of Sunray led the group in prayer.

Mrs. Lela Fae Washington of Springlake brought her electric organ and her brother, Jack Morrison of Plainview, brought his electric guitar. They furnished music during the day.

Everyone introduced himself over the public address system and told when he went to school at Gasoline and something about himself.

The ones who traveled furthest to attend were recognized. Cecil Smith and Mrs. Kay McLaughlin Medina of Redwood, California tied for traveling 1580 miles. They live within a few blocks of one another. Dee Childress of Greedley, California travelled 1400 miles. Each received a gift.

Next on the program was the recognition of former teachers of the Gasoline schools and their students who were present. There were three teachers, Mrs. Bill Helms, who still lives in the Gasoline community, and she had better than 20 students present; C. E. Bedwell of Sunray, the teacher present who taught there at the earliest date, and he had eight students present; and Mrs. R. C. Green (Miss Kathleen Smith) of Turkey with 15 or 16 students present. Each of the teachers were given a gift.

The eldest persons present were Griff Boyles of Sudan, who is 82 years young, and Mrs. Joe Twilla of Turkey, who is 79, and won gifts.

The group joined in singing two hymns with Ralph Carter and Lawrence Bedwell directing, accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Lela Fae Washington.

Good Showers Fall Over Area Monday

Fair to good showers fell over the area Monday and Monday night, bringing at least temporary relief from the hot dry conditions the area has been experiencing for several weeks.

The Quitaque area recorded generally about an inch and a half although some places caught a little more and some recorded less than that amount.

In Turkey proper the reports were about .60 but an inch or more was reported by most.

Some of the larger amounts fell south of Quitaque and Turkey in the Fairmont and Flomot vicinities. Just about everyone caught enough moisture to keep crops going for awhile. Forecasters say there is a possibility that another rainy spell might move into the area during the weekend.

Crops have held up surprisingly well, considering the weeks of dry, hot weather, but farmers say if enough good rain falls and we do not have an early frost, some pretty good crops will be harvested.

fit of the judges who may not know the contestants' names.

Theme of the parade is "Parade of America."

A free public barbecue will be served in the City Park beginning at 5:00 p.m. today.
