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Pierce White Passes After Long Illness

Funeral services for James Pierce White, 66, who died about 2:15 p.m. Wednesday, August 7, 1974, were held at 3:30 p.m. Friday at the First Baptist Church in Quitaque with the Rev. Bill Curry, former pastor, officiating, and the Rev. Milo Jurik, present pastor, assisting.

Mr. White, born in Hurd County, Georgia, came to Briscoe County in 1929. He married Lillian Graham in Silverton on July 23, 1929.

He was a retired farmer and a member of the First Baptist Church in Quitaque.

Burial was in Resthaven Cemetery by Quitaque Funeral Home.

Group Returns From Navajo Mission Tour

A group of 35 adults and young people returned Sunday night after spending eight days holding a Vacation Bible School on the Navajo Reservation at Window Rock, Arizona.

The group slept in tents and campers, and the church bus and several pickups were taken on the trip.

This is the fourth year for the Quitaque group to hold a Vacation Bible School in Window Rock, and this year several of the local people there assisted them with the work.

There were also Youth Fellowship meetings each evening, along with the Spiritual Enrichment programs for the adults.

This was the largest Bible School held there to date, for there was a total enrollment of 236 children and 43 workers.

There were 46 professions of faith and a number of rededications during the school.

Rev. Wade Robertson, who is pastor of the First Baptist Church of Window Rock, told the group that the harvest was just now beginning to be reaped, for by returning year after year to Window Rock, the Indian people saw there was true love and concern for their people.

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New Extension Agent Named For Briscoe County

Patricia Lee Honea of Tenaha, Texas has been named the new Briscoe County Extension Agent (home economics). The announcement was made by Briscoe County Judge M. G. Moreland and Mrs. Catherine B. Crawford of Lubbock, district agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The new agent is a native of Caddo, Louisiana. She received the B. S. degree in home economics education from Stephen F. Austin University, and will receive the Master of Science Degree in Clothing and Textiles from Texas Tech University in August of this year. She has had one year of high school teaching experience.

During her college career, she was named to the Dean's List and also chosen for Phi Upsilon Omicron, a national home economics fraternity. While at Texas Tech, she has had a teaching assistantship and taught a course in merchandizing to senior home economics students.

In her new position, she will work with Extension agent Jimmy Vanstony in 4-H and Extension related areas, and will provide leadership in conducting educational programs for homemakers and young people in home economics.

Following six weeks of training in Swisher County, she will begin work in Briscoe County October 16.

The coaches are looking for perhaps 40 boys out for football by the time everyone gets enrolled in school, since several boys who have not been out for football have indicated that they do intend to be out this year.

Coach Hulsey and assistants David Sanders and Rod Setliff are looking forward to a better season this time and they have reasons to be optimistic. The Patriots playing in Class A competition for its first two years of existence, are winless thus far.

However, the Patriots will be playing as a Class B school this year, having been dropped a notch in classification. Valley has never had the enrollment for a school in Class A.

Another thing, when Quitaque and Turkey consolidated the two school districts none of the Quitaque boys had ever played football and they had to learn the game.

Now Coach Hulsey will have at least 15 and perhaps more experienced boys back, plus the fact that they will be playing against schools of smaller size, so things have a real good chance of getting better.

The Patriots start off against Chillicothe there on September 6. Last year the Patriots just about had their first win racked up when they played Chillicothe in the season opener, only to see it get away in the final minutes.

So the Patriots and their coaches are working hard getting ready for Chillicothe and are determined to notch the school's first win ever in football.

Coach Hulsey says that most of this season's and perhaps all of the games at home will be played on Vardy Field at Turkey since Valley's field is not ready for use.

Supt. Wilburn Leeper and Coach Hulsey expressed their sincere thanks to the Bob Wills Foundation for allowing the school the use of its property. The Bob Wills Foundation of Turkey now owns the buildings that were formerly the Turkey schools (not the football field however). The Patriots will have use of the concession stands and possibly the dressing rooms.

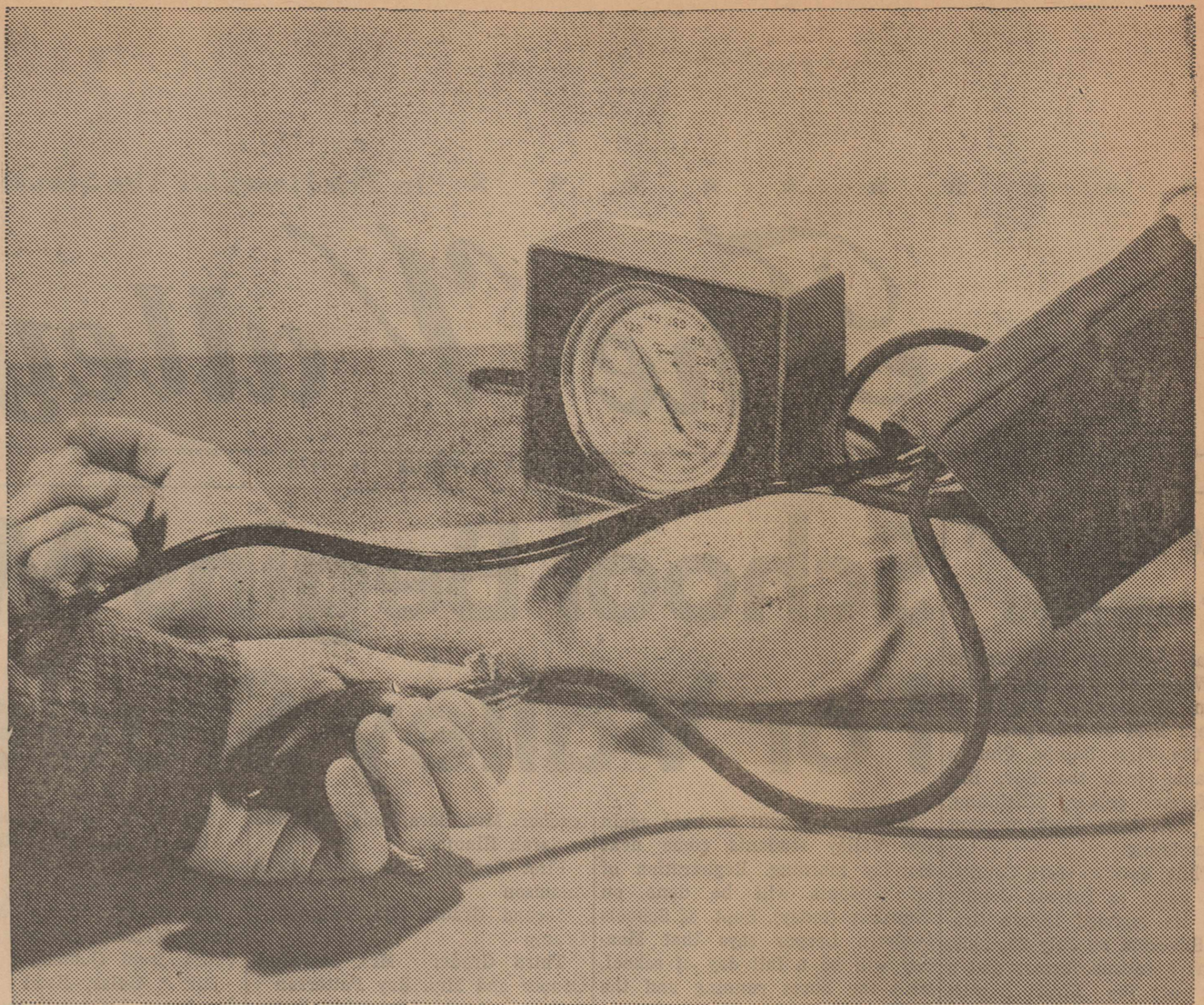

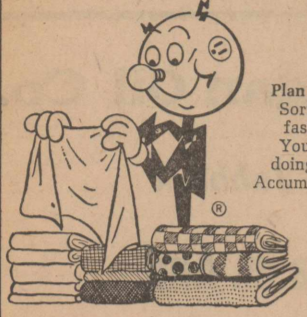

Reddy's consumer tips on... washers



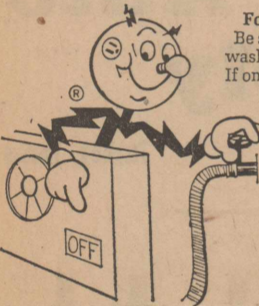
Plan Ahead
Sort clothes according to type of fabric, colorfastness, degree of soil and garment construction. You'll save both hot water and electricity by doing similar items together. Accumulate a full load before running your washer.

Be Selective
Choose the cycle that is precisely appropriate for the clothes you are washing. Is a "hot" temperature setting really necessary? Except for heavily soiled items, most loads will come clean in either a cold or warm wash. Look into cold wash detergents.

Use the least amount of detergent that will get your clothes clean—most loads require only an ounce or less! Overloading causes extra strain and wear on your equipment; check the manufacturer's recommendations for load weight. Balance your load by alternating small and large items.



For Safety Sake
Be sure control is "off" before reaching into your washer. If one is necessary, use only a heavy duty extension cord. Be sure your washer is grounded. Keep dry cleaning agents, color remover and Fiberglas out of your washer. It's a good idea not to wash clothes containing cleaning fluids in your washer.

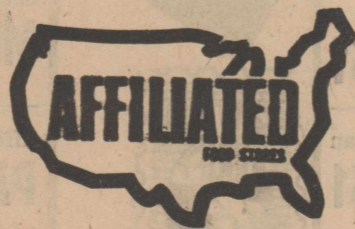

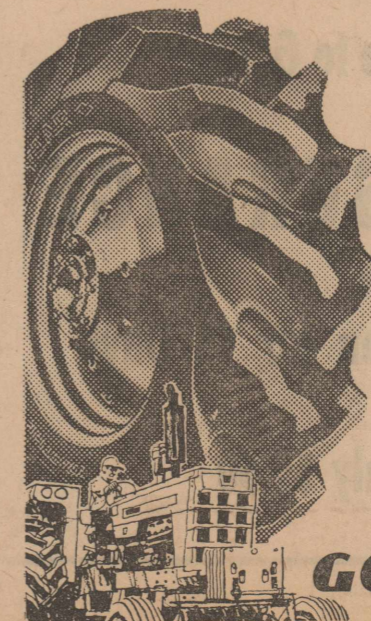
