"Watts" tell you how much electricity is needed to produce that light, and "bulb life" is the estimated length of time it will take the filament inside the bulb to burn out. When brightness is more important than bulb life—for reading, studying or working-choose the "standard" life bulb that gives you the most lumens for its wattage.


