




### **Tragic Accident Takes Life of David Ortiz**

The Cap Rock District helped the proposed feedlot near Silverton by providing topographical and water storage information for use in planning a pollution control program required for obtaining state permits.

The Directors maintained membership in the National Association of Conservation Districts, the Texas Association of Soil & Water Conservation Districts, and the Panhandle Association of Conservation Districts. These organizations worked to keep local S. C. S. and A. S. C. S. offices in Briscoe County. Local Directors sponsored a resolution opposing land use legislation that was unanimously approved by the Panhandle Association of S. W. C. D.



The Valley High F. F. A. Chapter planted trees given by the Cap Rock S. W. C. D. for a windbreak and nature study area for the new Valley School plant. The District also raised the prize money for the Briscoe County Livestock Show.


The Soil Conservation Service office at Silverton provides technical assistance on conservation problems and programs in Briscoe County. Last year S. C. S. provided 1317 services on 462 farms or ranches and 59 services for 23 units of government or their agencies. Eighty-nine conservation plans were prepared or revised.

KENT CREEK WATERSHED PROJECT

#### HELP PRESERVE OUR HERITAGE FROM THE PAST

Archaeologists made or began studies of four sites in Briscoe County this year. These areas included sites in the reservoir area of Lake Mackenzie, the Tule Creek area, the Lake Theo area, and in Los Lingos canyon.

Briscoe County is obviously very rich in archaeological sites. Help preserve these areas by contacting local authorities when artifacts and other evidence of a possible site are discovered. These discoveries can be called to the attention of the State Archaeologist and other qualified persons who can evaluate the find.



Minimum Tillage is a relatively new conservation practice that reduces erosion, conserves water and lowers expenses. This field of irrigated cotton has been overseeded with rye. A warm season crop will be planted in the residue from the rye.



This waterway on the Pascal Garrison place was seeded to a native grass mixture last spring. Summer drought kept the grass seedlings from growth even though weeds making normal were controlled. This waterway will be used as an outlet for parallel terraces that will be installed after the grass has enough growth to keep the waterway from eroding. Cost-share assistance on parallel terraces is available through R. E. C. P. and G. P. C. P. Cost-share on waterways is available through G. P. C. P. Many local farmers have fields that are being damaged by erosion. A system of parallel terraces with the necessary waterways would solve their problem. The rising costs of labor and equipment have caused many farmers to use six and eight row equipment. This multi-row equipment is apparently difficult to use in fields with level standard terraces as many farmers planted across or destroyed their terraces. Most of this land will not be adequately protected from erosion. Gullies and washes will form and become serious erosion problems

#### CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

R. C. & D. projects are one of the newer programs of U. S. D. A. under which seven Eastern Panhandle counties have joined together to solve problems and develop resources. The Cap Rock S. W. C. D. became a co-sponsor of this project at the request of the City of Quitaque. The executive committee of the project are now preparing a project work plan. O. R. Stark, Jr. is the representative from Briscoe County. It is possible that the project can be approved and funded by Congress this year.



Wind erosion was unusually severe last winter, especially on cotton fields in the sandy portion of the county. A number of farmers overseeded their cotton with rye as is shown here on O. E. Chandler's place. Rye covercrops with normal growth can practically stop wind erosion and furnish some grazing.

Parallel Terraces can be designed to be farmed with all types of equipment. Not all point rows can be eliminated, but farming will be much easier and quicker than with standard terraces.



Tail water recovery systems like this system on the J. D. Nance place help farmers get the most use out of their dwindling supply of irrigation water. Many farmers have found that they get more water out of a recovery system than they can get from a new well.


