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Nazareth Wins Two Of Three Games Here Tuesday Night

The Valley Patriots were host to Nazareth High Tuesday night and the hosts were able to win only one of the three games played but the fans were treated to three hotly-contested games. The Nazareth JV boys won over Valley JV 41-38, then the Nazareth Swiftettes took a pretty good strangle hold on the district race as they downed the Valley girls in an exciting game which ended 40-49. The Valley boys took their first district win by defeating the Swifts 48-39. The boys division of the district race shows Silverton at the top of the heap with three wins and no losses while the other teams have at least one loss.

Rod Carpenter with 13 points led the Valley JV team in scoring. Terry Brittain scored nine points, Lyndal Couch hit for eight points and Jeff Crump and Gret Ramsey each scored four points.

The Valley girls had an ice cold first period, falling behind 16-4 as the quarter ended and it appeared the game was going to be a runaway for the Swiftettes, but the Valley girls started picking up steam in the second period and began to find the range a bit better but still trailed 14-29 at half-time. The Valley girls had a big third quarter scoring 15 points to eight for the visitors. Although the Swiftettes hung on to win the Patriots' aggressive guards had the defending district champs a bit shook at times. The Valley guards played a terrific game, holding the Swiftettes below their per game scoring average. Debra Parsley and Martha Reed fouled out of the game in the fourth period. Darlene Hendrix, Marlene Cawley and Donna Brown all performed very capably in the contest. On offense the Valley girls have not been up to their par in the past two games. Sherice Price, who almost always can be depended on for at least 20 points, managed to score only 11 points against the Swiftettes. Jena Mullin had a good night, scoring 17 points, actually keeping the Valley girls within striking distance with her outside potshooting. Joanie Turner hit for 12 points. The game was a good one and although the Valley girls lost, they did not roll over and play dead when things looked so bad for them, but kept coming like a good team will. They just might take the Swiftettes next time out. Hartman scored 23 points for the Swiftettes.

The Valley boys, who looked pretty ragged at times during their last two games, put together a much better effort Tuesday night as they won their first district game after dropping two in a row. The Patriots, like the Valley girls, started a bit slow, falling behind 8-2 in the early minutes of the first quarter but came on strong in the last four minutes of the first period and trailed by only a single point, 13-14 at the first stop. The Patriots outscored the Swifts 10-6 in the second period and led 23-30 at halftime. The

third quarter was all even as both teams scored 10 points and the Patriots still maintained a three point edge going into the final period. Valley established a 12 point advantage midway of the fourth quarter with Ron Eudy hitting his outside shot well throughout the game. Valley scored several times on layups after intercepting or stealing the ball away from the Swifts.

Eudy hit for 25 points to lead both teams in scoring. Kenny Chandler hit for 14 points, Jesse Ferguson, seven, and Jon Davidson hit two points for the Patriots. Huseman scored 23 points for the Swifts.

The Valley teams were at Silverton last Friday night for a 4-game set and managed to come out on the long end of only one game.

The Valley JV girls lost to the JV Owlettes 28-32. Lisa Herrington led the Valley girls with 23 points. Dubelia Martinez hit for three points and Laura Eudy scored two points.

The Valley JV boys won the only game of the night 24-18 with Terry Brittain scoring eight points for the winners, Rod Carpenter scored six points; Jeff Crump, four; Greg Ramsey and Dane Cheatham, two each, and Lyndal Couch, one.

The Valley girls lost to Silverton 43-47. As was the case in the Nazareth game the Valley girls started slow and fell behind in the first quarter 8-16. After the first quarter, however, the Patriots outscored the Owlettes. Unfortunately the overall score is counted. The Owlettes are a very fine team and they deserved the win. The Valley girls did not play as well as usual and could not pull it out. Sherice Price hit for 17 points, Joanie Turner, 14, and Jena Mullin, 12.

The score in the boys game was the same as the girls game with the Valley boys coming out on the short end of the deal, 43-47. Ron Eudy hit for 24 points, Kenny Chandler and Jesse Ferguson, seven each, and Darrell Dowd and Kirk Proctor, two each.

The Valley teams go to Happy Friday for the start of the second half of the district schedule. Every game from here on in is a must for the Valley boys and girls, if they are to retain a chance at a district championship for both teams now have lost two games. The Valley girls appear to be safe for this one for they bombed the Cowgirls 81-43 last outing while the Cowboys won 59-49 but the Patriots are counting on getting back at the Cowboys and getting back into the district race.

Tuesday night of next week the local teams host Silverton for four games beginning at 7:30 and then the regular district schedule is all over unless there are playoff games necessary and that is very possible.

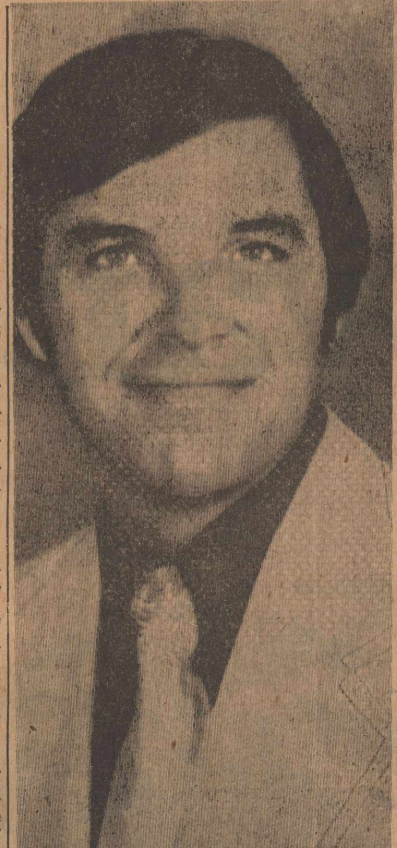
Boss Lion Melvin Clinton announced that the Lions will hold their annual Broom and Mop Sale

"Old Time Religion" Night Planned Here

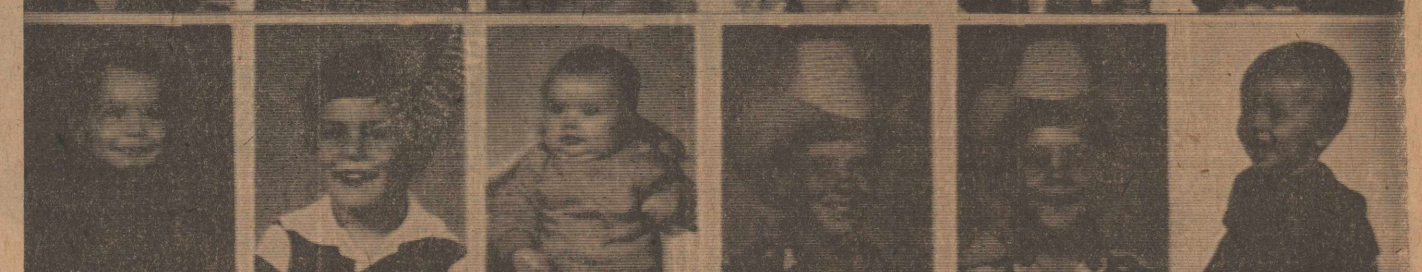

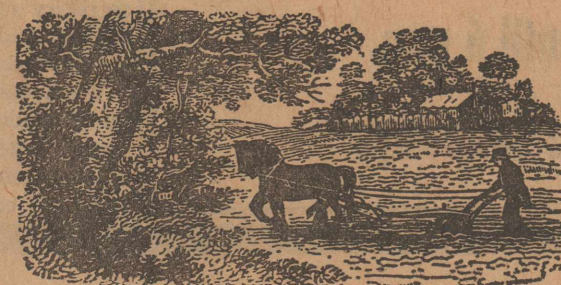

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Farmers Union Convention Held In Amarillo

The level to which the secretary of agriculture increases the price of wheat will be the first signal of whether the Carter Administration is good for farmers, said the president of the Texas National Farmers Union. The organization ended its annual meeting in Amarillo with a banquet and awards program.

"I say he should set the price of wheat at \$5 per bushel the first day he takes office," said Jay Naman of Waco, who has previously praised the selection of Bob Bergland to head the USDA. "If he listens to the trade or the Wheat Growers association and sets it at \$3 or \$3.50, we're in trouble."

The TFU helmsman, who was re-elected during the convention to the post he has held a number of years, was critical of attempts to substitute the words "cost of production" for "parity" in the new farm legislation.

"If using the words 'cost of production' is simply another way of saying 'parity,'" Naman said, "maybe we can rationalize the new approach. The parity formula is built into the law. We know what is taken into consideration in computing parity. The mechanics of determining parity are well-established. If the same criteria can be applied to a so-called 'cost of production' formula, then we're okay. If not, then we are embarking on an unknown, and we are in deep trouble."

Making a turn-around in farm policy won't be easy, Naman said, telling delegates that the administration for the last eight years in Washington has "effectively worked toward completely dismantling the machinery for administering farm programs."

"It won't be easy to repair the machinery," he said. "Farm policy has been turned over to the multinational grain traders and the domestic manufacturers. An effective wedge has been driven between the farmer and the consumer, and the farmer and the worker."

As for the Congress, Naman noted that the leaders "will be the most urban and the least informed on agricultural issues of any in our history."

"Both agricultural committees of Congress are still dominated by leaders who have proven themselves to be too timid about what they ask for farmers," he said.

Roy Holman of Ogden, Utah, president of the Utah-Idaho Farmers Union, said his group feels that a "new day" started with the inauguration of President Carter. "We now have people in high places who know agriculture, a secretary of agriculture who is a farmer, and we must expect 'better days ahead,'" Holman said.

When delegates got to the matter of policy, one major decision was to urge Congress to set price support commodity loans at least at 90 per cent of parity, adequate

levels of commodity loans and direct payments to assure no less than full parity returns to producers and that the escalator clause be applied to price support levels, "so that price supports written into the Act (Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973) will be adjusted upward to compensate for increases in all farm production costs which subsequently occur."

Congressman Jack Hightower was also to be main speaker at the Saturday night banquet. His plane was 30 minutes late in Dallas, then the radar went out for another 30 minutes and by this time, Amarillo Air Terminal was fogged in and so the congressman caught another plane home.

The disappointed escort committee missed the banquet and the address by National President Tony Dechant.

This was said to be the best attended State Convention ever held. Delegates from Turkey Farmers Union were Mr. and Mrs. James Fuston, Mr. and Mrs. Don Rickman, Mr. and Mrs. Neil Guest, Mr. and Mrs. Smith Guest, Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Blakney. Group Goes To Baptist Conference

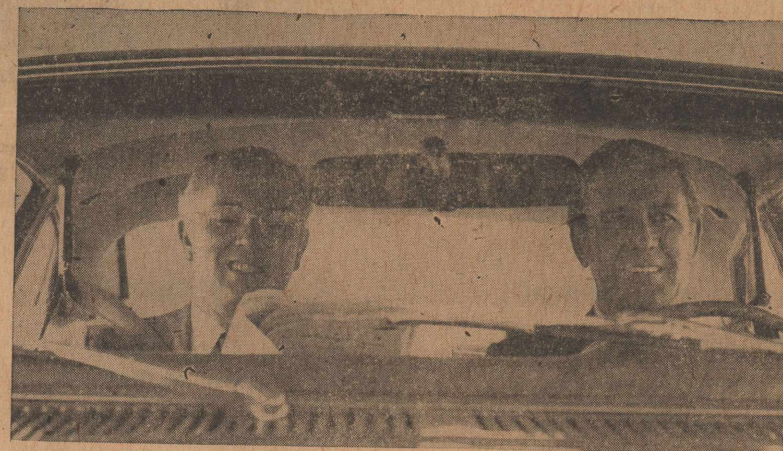
MISS MERRELL ON DEAN'S LIST AT WAYLAND COLLEGE

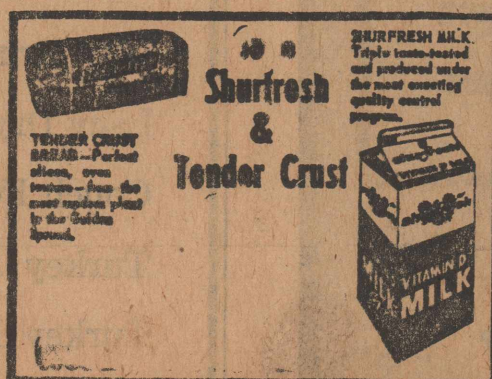
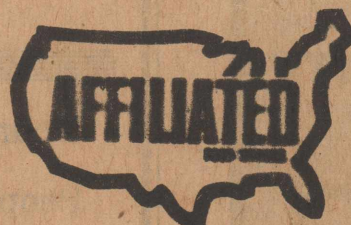

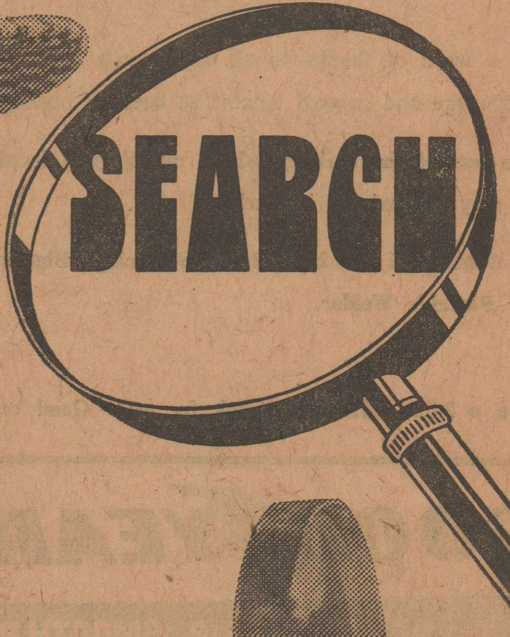
When finished it will be an up-to-date modern office facility that will be an asset to Silverton as well as a convenient facility to properly serve the people in the area.

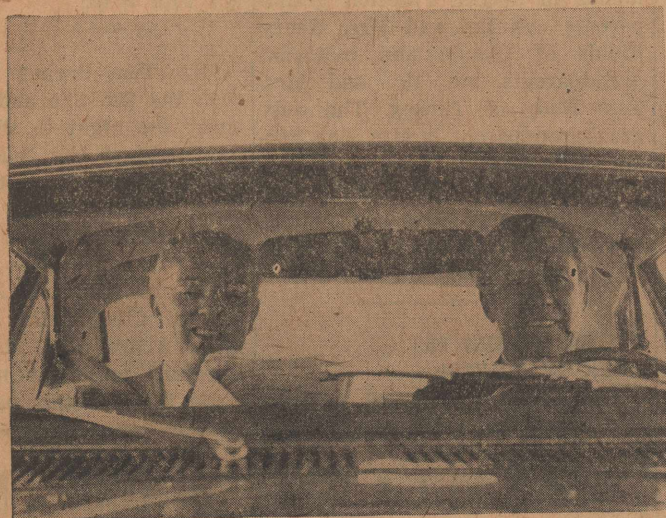
