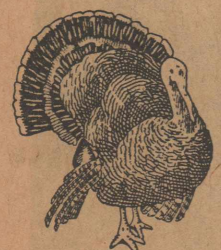

## Hearings To Be Held February 16 On Weather Modification Permits

The weather modification issue, which has stirred up much controversy and a great deal of opposition, will be debated in Lubbock on February 16 when the Texas Water Development Board conducts hearings on applications for permits to engage in weather modification and control operations in some parts of the High Plains.

Two groups, Plains Weather Improvement Association, Inc., and Atmospherics, Inc., have applied for permits to conduct weather modification, in which they claim will increase rainfall amounts and also reduce hail. The requested areas of operation of course would exceed the smaller target areas.

The 64th Legislature amended the Weather Modification Act to provide for a hearing in the area if 25 or more people requested a local hearing and it is reported that several hundred residents of the area have already protested to the Texas Water Development Board asking that the weather modification permits be denied. Gen. James Rose, TWDB executive director, has said that the hearings will be continued as long as necessary to allow everyone a

chance to speak. The Plains Weather Improvement Association, Inc. asks for a permit to make aircraft flights over parts of Hale, Lamb, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe and Floyd counties.

Local residents are firmly convinced that the cloud seeding operations have many times broken up cloud formations that have been moving in this direction from the southwest and depriving the area of much needed rainfall.

A meeting is scheduled to be held at the Quitaque Community Center tonight (Thursday) to make plans to protest the continued cloud seeding operations in this area. There is a petition at the First National Bank in Quitaque that everyone who wishes to protest the program should sign. Please go by the bank and sign the petition.

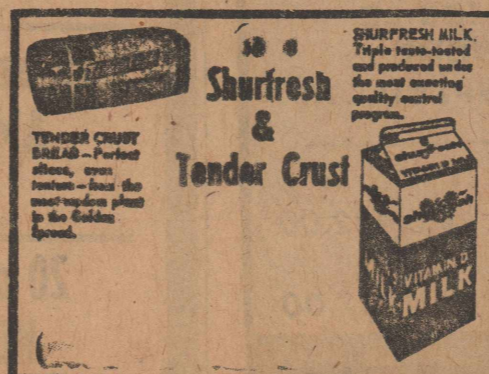
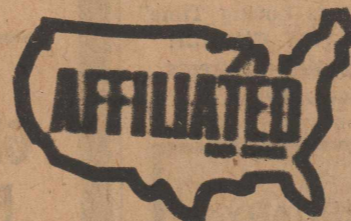

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**Aoudad Population Continues To Grow**

The aoudad population in the  
Panhandle continues to increase  
steadily, and as the herd grows  
so do the number of hunters.  
Although aoudads are found  
statewide, the only regulated sea-  
son is in an eight-county area ar-  
ound Palo Duro Canyon. In other  
areas of the state they are con-  
sidered exotics and may be hunt-  
ed year round, with landowner's  
consent.

This year, hunters took 134  
sheep during the week-long sea-  
son, according to figures tabulat-  
ed by Texas Parks and Wildlife  
Department field biologists.  
"Over the last several years,  
we have experienced an almost  
continual rise in the number of  
hunters that successfully hunt for  
aoudads and it relates back to the  
relative abundance of the animal,"  
says Charles Winkler, P&WD big  
game program director.

As has been the case for the  
last several years, the majority  
of aoudads taken this season were  
in Randall, Armstrong, Briscoe  
and Floyd counties. The largest  
reported ram during the Novem-  
ber 13-19, 1976, season field-dressed  
at 212 pounds with 34½-inch  
horn length. It was taken in Arm-  
strong County.

According to field biologist's es-  
timates, there are 1,500 aoudads  
in the Panhandle region. A 1974  
estimate placed the statewide pop-  
ulation at some 3,551 rams, ewes  
and lambs.

"Because there was a good lamb  
crop last year, the herd registered  
a 19 percent increase. This popu-  
lation increase stimulated hunter  
interest, which improved the hunt-  
er success ratio. Simply stated,  
hunter success rate is the number  
of hunters in relation to the num-  
ber of sheep harvested," said  
Winkler.

Population estimates of the Pan-  
handle herd show a steady in-  
crease from approximately 1,200  
sheep in 1973 to the 1,500 figure  
of 1976.

Hunter success rate on the 62  
sheep harvested in 1973 was 31
