

Friday morning, the Quitaque Fire Department was called to the Paymaster Gin to extinguish a fire in the burrs. The Turkey and Silverton Fire Departments were called in for assistancce. Luckily, the fire was confined to the loss of burrs, trash, some seed, and the major loss was a burr truck. The fire was fanned by high winds Friday, and the firemen were called back to the gin between 9:30 and 10:00 a. m. to help extinquish it again.

The winds laid later in the evening Friday, and the fire was finally brought under control about 6 p. m. according to manager, Terry Sperry.

Thursday afternoon at approximately two o'clock, fire broke out at the North Gin in Turkey with 137 bales of cotton and 27 trailers burning. The Quitaque Fire Department was called to assist in extinguishing that fire. According to reports, the fire was brought under control about 6 p.m. but several trailers of cotton continued to burn throughout the next day.




