A man stated to me that approximately 98 percent of the farmers borrow money from the bank or some other source from one year to the next in order to plant and produce and gather a crop. When prices are so low that they can't pay their loan, then the bank or other source can't keep extending credit without going under themselves. The banks and other sources in the area are standing by our farmers as far as they can go, but they can only go so far.
