MOST OF VALLEY ESCAPES VIOLENT WEEKEND WEATHER

Most of the local area escaped the real violent weather that hit many spots in the Panhandle, although it was a close call.

In Quitaque and Turkey proper, the average seemed to be two inches of rain, give or take a little, and no great amounts of hail have been reported to The Tribune, although there were some who reported that some hail fell but not enough to hurt much. Most farmers below the Caprock had not planted crops or they had not come up yet.

Most of the severe weather that hit the local area was north of Quitaque and Turkey. On Saturday afternoon late, the clouds started threatening and by 9:00 o'clock the storm was at its height with high winds and a tremendous thunder and lightning display. It has been reported that two funnels were sighted north of Quitaque. A twister did touch down east of Turkey and destroyed an empty barn on a farm owned by Winfred House. From about 12 or 15 miles east of Turkey northeast toward Memphis, tremendous amounts of rain along with some hail has been reported.

More rain has been forecast for the Panhandle for the next few days.

Bob Wills Foundation Has Meeting

The Bob Wills Foundation held a business meeting Monday night, May 22, at 8:00 p.m. in the cafeteria at the Bob Wills Center. Approximately 40 people were in attendance.

During the business session three new directors were elected to replace two whose terms expired and to fill the unexpired term of Homer Hawkins, who resigned due to his new position in the Peoples State Bank. The new directors elected were Byron Young, Mike House and Neil Guest. The holdover directors are Walter Geisler, Don Rickman and Red Williams.

Linda Ferguson was re-elected treasurer and Wilda Fuston as secretary. The Bob Wills Foundation voted to donate \$750.00 to the Dreamland Cemetery Association for the purchase of a riding lawn mower to help Mr. Ruiz in his work as caretaker.

Mayor Jay Eudy of Turkey read a letter from Captain Bob Russell of the Texas Highway Patrol as a result of the inquiries from the City of Turkey, as to why the DPS was not present at the last Bob Wills Celebration. Turkey was assured of their assistance in the future.

The Foundation also voted to purchase a Scotts Airpack for the local fire department at the cost of approximately \$525.00. The EMT's and Fire Department will also purchase one, because the state requires the use of two of these air packs at a time. They are self-contained breathing apparatuses which enable the firemen to enter burning or smoke or gas filled buildings in rescue attempts. They also allow the firemen to give oxygen to victims at intervals during the rescue attempts.

The Foundation voted to purchase a plaque to hang over the Bob Wills Museum entrance and to install one refrigerated air conditioning unit in the museum.

Linda Ferguson, treasurer, gave a complete financial statement. After all expenses were paid, including funds for souvenirs on hand, a total of \$6,000.00 was the net profit.

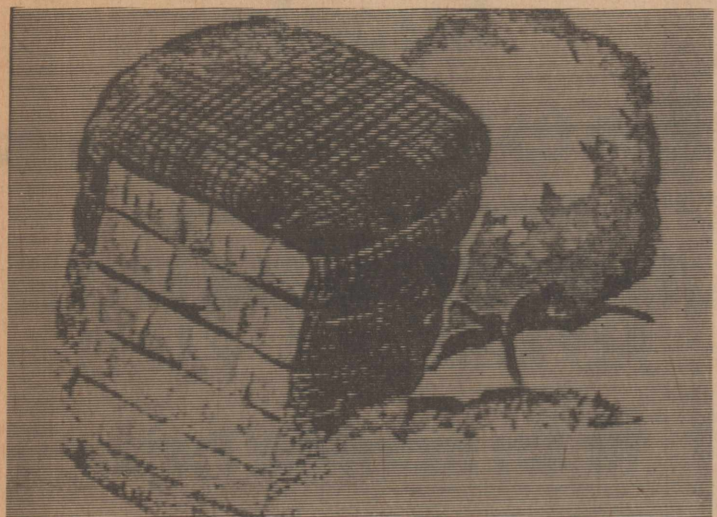

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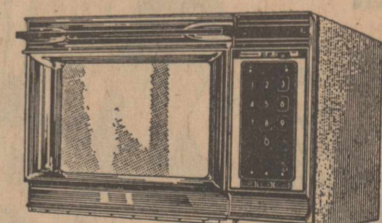
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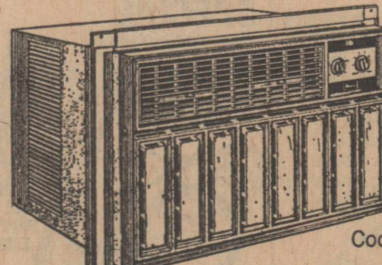
